

HOUSE HISTORY

Both of the houses of Joseph Ross descended to his only surviving child, Joseph Jr, who, with his large family, probably moved into this house scon after the death of his father -- if not before. Joseph Ross Jr, a housewright like his deceased father, and his wife Alice (Poor) had ten children: Henry, Sally Felton, Joseph Jr, Abigail, Nathaniel, William, Hannah, Philinda Cotton, David, and Alice Jr. Again, it is unfortunate that very little information exists concerning Joseph's life. On 7 Jan 1823 he mortgaged this homestead for \$255 to Joseph Andrews, Salem merchant (230:196); Mr Andrews discharged the mortgage on 24 June 1823 (230:196). Mr Ross then sold the premises for \$500 to James Stone, Salem mason, on 8 Ap 1823, only three months after taking out the mortgage, which Er Stone was probably required to pay (233:11). Joseph Ross went on to mortgage his Federal Street house twice in October 1825; On 20 Dec 1825 he died of "phthisis pulmonalis" at the age of 56 years. He left an estate worth \$1328 to his wife and ten children (#24219).


James Stone, mason, owned the house for 17 years, selling the premises 7 May 1840 for \$1150 to John Henfield, Salem gentleman (318:190). Mr Henfield, actually more of a trader than a gentleman, owned the homestead for 10 years, and then sold it 2 July 1850 for \$1100 to Stephen Curran, a Salem mason formerly of Danvers (431:85). Mr Curran, having turned in his trowel for a test tube, was styled a chemist when, on 24 May 1852, for \$1100 he granted the premises to John D Chapple, Salem tobacconist (461:41). Mr Chapple sat back, lit his pipe, and stayed for 19 years, selling the estate on 6 July 1871 for \$1750 to Ann McMahan, a Salem widow (828:179).

The McMahan or McMahon family lived here for nearly a century. Ann McMahon granted the place 6 Jan 1877 to (her son?) Michael McMahon, Salem laborer, reserving to herself the north-westerly front room and bedroom in the second story of the house, and the easterly room in the attic, as a life estate (969:40). Then on 1 Sept 1880 Ann leased these same rooms to Michael, who was occupying them, for a rent of \$6/month paid to her for the rest of her life (1043:27). Michael McMahon and his wife winifred lived here for several years; on 29 Nov 1905 Mr McMahon died, childlessl leaving his wife and a sister and brother who also lived on River Street (#97829). Soon after his death, the house was rented out to Messrs Littlefield and Moynihan, and it stayed rental property for some time.

At last, on 26 July 1972 the last of the McMahons, Rita M, a.k.a. Margaret M McMahon and Margaret E McMahan, sold the old family house for \$20,000 (along with adjoining property) to trustees of Old Salem Realty Trust (5889:170); this outfit in turn sold the house 26 Aug 1975 to N.L. Withum, trustee of 12 Lynn Street Realty Trust (6175:649); Ms Withum then

This gambrel-roofed house was built by Joseph Ross, a housewright, in 1795.

Throughout the first three quarters of the 18th century, this lot was part of a relatively large tract owned by Salem's Beckford or Bickford family. Part of this tract was sold for 230 li on 17 Sept 1778 to Benjamin Goodhue Jr, Salem merchant, by Benjamin Bickford, a yeoman (farmer) who had moved from Salem to Canterbury, New Hampshire (136:200). Mr Goodhue proceeded to lay out a road (now Lynn St) through this 1½ acrefield, and on 15 Oct 1782 he sold the present house-lot for 22.13.4 to Thomas Phillips, a Salem mariner (142:50). In this deed, River Street is referred to as "the road leading from Bickford's Lane," and Lynn Street is called "the new road laid out through my field;" this corner lot contained 11 1/3 poles, and still does.

Mr Phillips did not build on the land, selling it six years later, 17 Mar 1788, for 10.10.0 to Edward Southwick, Danvers tanner (147:131). Mr Southwick conveyed it for the same amount on 3 June 1788 to Robert Wallis, Salem cabinet-maker (153:253). Like his predecessors, Mr Wallis failed to build on the land, selling it 7 Feb 1792 for 11.8.0 to Joseph Ross, a Salem housewright (155:151).

Mr Ross already owned a small house that he had built on lower Federal Street in 1771, so there was no pressing need to build on this lot. Up to the year 1795, the town assessed Joseph Ross for a house and land worth from \$100-\$200. On 1 Ap 1794, his eldest son, Joseph Jr, married Alice Poor; it seems clear that Joseph Ross Sr (probably with the help of his son Joseph Jr, who was also a housewright) built this house for himself, enabling his son to move into the smaller house on Federal Street. This situation is borne out by the Salem assessment for 1795, in which Joseph Ross Sr was assessed for a house valued at \$700. The jump in assessment from \$200 in 1794 to \$700 in 1795 implies that Mr Ross had built a new house.

Very little has come down to us concerning Joseph Ross. He was living in Salem and working as a housewright as early as 25 June 1770, when he bought a Federal Street lot from Alice Blaney (127:234); he and his wife Sarah had six children (at least) between 1770 & 1786; only two of the children survived to maturity: Joseph (1770-1825) and Nathaniel (1786-1815). Mr Ross was deacen of the Tabernacle Church as early as 1809, and probably before; his wife Sarah (1745-1809) died in Salem 18 Aug 1809, aged 64 years, and Deacon Joseph followed her to the grave (thanks to a case of "lung fever") on 25 Mar 1818, at which time he was either 76 years and 7 menths or 78 years of age.
