
Built for ABNER GOODHUE Blacksmith

By 1830

17 Beckford Street Salem, Mass.

By Joyce King July 1978 This three story, hip roof, wood frame house was built by Abner Goodhue, blacksmith by the year 1830. Mr. Goodhue purchased this land on 17 Apr 1793 from William Pickman Esq. for the sum of 36 pounds, 3 shillings and 11 pence. This lot contained about 18 1/2 poles of land:



Beckford Street was called a lane in 1657; street or lane, 1677; street or highway, 1679; lane or highway that leads from ye main street to ye north river, 1696; Beckford's lane, 1773; Kitchen's lane, 1783; Turner's lane, 1793; and Beckford Street in 1797. (Essex Antiquarian, vol. 7 page 116)

Mr. Pickman had purchased a large parcel of land from Edward Kitchen Turner, physican, containing 102 poles, partly in 1778 (book 136 page 137) and another part in 1779. (book 138 page 78) This land had been in Edward Turner's family for over one hundred years. When Mr. Fickman divided this large parcel into small lots, Abner Goodhue bought the lot adjoining land he owned on Federal St.


The first mention of a house on this lot is when on 22 Jan 1830 Abner Goodhue mortgaged his Beckford St. house, barn and other buildings on the lot to Amos Choate for \$500. In this mortgage he (Goodhue) states that a narrow strip of the lot is now enclosed with his other lot. (book 255 page 168) The year 1830 is also the first time Abner Goodhue is taxed for his house and land on Beckford St., valued at \$1,500. (Salem tax records)

On 5 Nov 1833 Mr. Goodhue mortgages the same lot, this time to his son Abner Goodhue Jr., mariner, for \$627 but still subject to the Choate mortgage. (book 271 page 149)

Abner Goodhue, blacksmith (b.18 Jan 1762) married Frances Bott (b.5 Jul 1770) daughter of James and Dollea (Newhall) on 10 Jul 1796. The Salem Vital Records show the couple as having seven children:

On 13 Jun 1834 Abner Goodhue, blacksmith and wife Frances of Salem, sold to Abner Goodhue Jr., of Salem, mariner, for \$900 land and buildings:



subject to mortgage of Amos Choate for \$500 and mortgage of Abner Jr. (book 276 page 149)

Three years after selling the property to his son, Abner Goodhue Sr. died (17 Aug 1837) his estate was insolvent. At the time of his death, Abner Sr. owned a house on Federal St. valued at \$2,000 and two lots of land on Hathorne St. valued at \$450, all had to be sold to pay off the debts.

Capt. Abner Goodhue Jr. married Lucy O. Luscomb (b.10 Oct 1807) daughter of William and Mehitable (Mansfield) on 30 Jun 1828. The couple lived in the house with their family until on 16 Dec 1846 Capt. Abner Goodhue the master of barque "Merlin" died on passage from Marseille to Gibraltar, at the age of 46. (just five months after paying off the Choate mortgage) (book 255 page 168)

Note: The journals kept by Capt. Abner Goodhue while on two of his voyages are at the Essex Institute Library.

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On 15 July 1850 Lucy O. Goodhue, of Salem, widow, the guardian of her five children, sells for \$2,800 the property on Beckford St. to William D. Northend and granted him a mortgage for \$2,000. (book 431 pages 256 and 257)

After selling the property Lucy and her children moved to 2 Liberty St. (Salem Directory 1850) The Federal census taken in 1850 shows living in ward one:

Information obtained from the obituary of W.D.Northend in the Salem News 30 Oct. 1902:

He was one of the best known citizens of Salem, a prominent criminal lawyer in his time. Died very sudden at his home 14 Lynde St. He was born in Newbury 26 Feb. 1823 the son of John and Anna (Titcomb). Attended the Drummer Academy and Bowdoin College. He lived in Peabody for a few years and was a partner of George F. Choate the Mass. Senator 1861-62. Mr. Northend campaigned for mayor in 1877 but lost by 500 votes to Henry K. Oliver. He married 2 Nov. 1846 Susan Stedman Harrod of Newburyport. Leaves his widow and three daughters, Louisa, Mary and Susan.

On 8 June 1858 William D. Northend and wife Susan sell for \$1,000 to Sidney Bancroft of South Danvers (now Peabody) the same property sold to them by Lucy O. Goodhue. (book 572 page 24) Sidney Bancroft owned a great deal of property in South Danvers, Lynn and Lynnfield. He probably bought this house as an investment.

The Salem Directory for the year 1861 shows Capt. James T. Hiltz living at 17 Beckford St.

On 8 May 1861 Sidney C. Bancroft, counsellor at law and his wife Margaret, of South Danvers, sell to John Grant, grocer, of Salem for \$3,000 the same property sold to them by William D. Northend. (book 622 page 171)

Just after moving into the house, John Grant died on 18 Nov. 1861, at the age of 70. Mr. Grant operated a grocery store on Boston St. for many years.

Real estate:

a house and farm adjoining in Ipswich \$3,500 a house and land Beckford St. 2,500 part of a dwelling and shop and land on Boston St. 1,500

Eliza took as her dower share the Boston St. property (Probate #40780)

On 28 Nov. 1864 John W. Grant, by straw deed, conveyed his 1/4 share of the land and buildings on Beckford St. to his wife Margaret S. Grant for \$625. (book 677 pages 128 & 129)

On 2 Aug. 1865 John N. and Hannah R. Felton in her right, of Colchester, New London Ct.; Francis H. and Eliza Ann Wade in her right of Ipswich; Joshua B. Grant, of Ipswich; and John W. Grant of S_a lem, sell the property to John Dwyer, merchant for \$2,700. (book 690 page 124)

(John W. Grant signed his share twice and his wife Margaret S. Grant never signed her share to John Dwyer, this created a cloud on the title that was cleared up on 5 Feb. 1920, when Margaret's heirs release their rights) (book 2440 page 457)

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John Dwyer was a very wealthy merchant, he had his business in Boston, but lived in Salem at 336 Essex St. On 2 Feb. 1866, John Dwyer sold the dwelling house and land on Beckford St. to his daughter, Mary Louisa Ashton, wife of William F. Ashton, free of the control of her said husband William, for \$3,600. (book 697 page 264)

The Federal Census for 1870 shows:

The Salem Directories 1866-1876 show the Ashton family living at 17 Beckford St. After 1876 they moved into her fathers house at 336 Essex St. and rented out the Beckford S_{t} . house.

Mary Louisa Ashton died in 1914, her heirs John D., Joseph N. and George F. were left all her estate. In her will she says, "The omission of my husband William F. Ashton is intentional, not by accident. As I believe, on account of the share of my estate that my husband has heretofore had, that it is just that my remaining estate go to my children." William consented to the provisions.



On 6 Feb. 1920, Mary's heirs sold the land and buildings on Beckford St. to Sarah W. Symonds of Salem for \$1 and other valuable consideration. (book 2440 page 458)

- 3 May 1968 Sarah W. Symonds, unmarried, sold to William H.K. Donaldson and John A. Driscoll. (book 4911 page 383)
- 21 Mar. 1973 William H.K. Donaldson, of Salem and John A. Driscoll, of Feabody, sold to Richard and Rita Savicky (book 5958 page 131)
- 30 Apr. 1975 Richard and Rita Savicky sold to Jay and Gail Turner. (book 6143 page 517)
- 31 Oct. 1977 Jay and Gail Turner sold to Miciajiah P. Clough IV (book 6410 page 240)

Reference to book and page are the deed books at the Registry of Deeds and Probate numbers can be found at Probate Court, both located in the same building on Federal St. in Salem.





Built about 1884

The above building at the corner of Federal and Beckford Streets, is shown as it appeared about 90 years ago, shortly after John Chandler acquired it from his father, Joseph Chandler, in 1883. The son had been living in his father's house and operated the store at least a few years before he purchased it. At about the time he acquired it, he tore

down some of the old buildings and put up some new, of lesser size. The handsome architectural style would be consistent with buildings erected about 1885. Tax records can be traced to John Chandler back to 1878, thus the property has been a home and store for at least 100 years.
