
Book 100 page 132 August 1, 1752 Thomas Wallis of Boston, attorney to Mary Earthy and Anne Earthy, single, the only surviving children of John Earthy and Mary his wife, who was the only surviving child of Thomas Salloes, sold this lot of land to Benjamin Gerrish, merchant. The land was bound: Northwest - on Ye Main Street Northeast - Joseph Swasey Southeast - William Becket Southwest - William Becket This conveyance included "all ye trees, fences, wood, stones, rocks and minerals standing, lying, being or growing thereon." (There was a house on this lot as early as 1655, apparently removed

John Gerrish sold all his rights, derived by the will of his father Benjamin Gerrish and of his mother Elizabeth, to William Lynde.

before this transaction.)

Benjamin Lynde, on account for William Lynde, conveyed all rights to Timothy Wellman.

Book 104 page 211 August 7, 1758 Timothy and Rebecca Wellman sold the lot of land, containing 70 poles, to Clifford Crowninshield.



Clifford Crowninshield built a new house shortly after purchasing the land. This is substantiated by the List of Houses Built in Salem From 1750-1773 (Essex Institute Historic Collections), which lists Clifford Crowninshield, along with four other men, as building a house in 1759.

Clifford Crowninshield was the son of Dr. John and Elizabeth (Allen) Von Kronenshelt, born Dec. 10, 1699; died April 4, 1776; married first, May 15, 1721, Martha, dau. of Joseph and Rachel (Allen) Hillard; she was born April 4, 1704; died Aug. 30, 1736; married second, Jan. 6, 1736/7, Christiana, widow of William Cash, and daughter of Robert Bray Jr.

Children by his first wife:

Joseph born about 1726, died young

John born in 1728

Mary born about 1730, married Capt. John Byrne

Children of Cristiana by her first marriage:

William Cash died young

Mary Cash born about 1726, married Thomas Dean

After several bequests, Clifford Crowninshield, left the remainder of his estate to his wife, Christiana. Widow Crowninshield then willed half of the dwelling house (15 Essex St.) and the land adjoining to John Crowninshield's children. The rest of the real estate was bequeathed to her daughter, Mary Dean.

Book 156 page 3 1792 Thomas and Mary Dean released their rights im the house and land to the heirs of Clifford Crowninshield. This was done to avoid an unpleasant law suit initiated by the Crowninshield heirs.

Book 170 page 76 August 28, 1799 Clifford Byrne conveyed his share of "my grandfather Clifford Crowninshield's estate to Clifford Crowninshield (b. 1762 the son of John Crowninshield). This conveyance was for three parcels, one of which was 15 Essex St.

Book 170 page 75 Feb. 21, 1801

Mary Molloy, Elizabeth Moseley and Margaret Murphy conveyed to Clifford Crowninshield their interest "in the land of their father John Crowninshield, formerly the land of their grandfather Clifford Crowninshield."

Captain Clifford Crowninshield died on June 3, 1809. His heirs, namely: his sisters Anna Foote, Mary Molloy, Elizabeth Moseley, Martha Palfrey, Margaret Mansfield, Sally Devereux and the heirs of his deceased sister Abigail Very sold their shares of Clifford's estate to Joseph Moseley (book 188 page 72).

Book 188 page 71 Dec. 20, 1809

Joseph Moseley sold the land and buildings to his mother Elizabeth Moseley:

Northwest - Essex Street 81'



Book 214 page 211 Nov. 18, 1817 \$200 Elisabeth Moseley, widow, sold a portion of this land to Theophilus Sanborn.
"Lot or garden situate on the east part of Essex St. formerly part of the estate of Clifford Crowninshield."

Book 274 page 34 Oct. 4, 1833 John Moriarty, executor of the will of Elizabeth Moseley, sold the land and dwelling house to Thomas W. Taylor. "Part of the estate of Clifford Crowninshield and included in a deed from Mary Molloy et al to Joseph Moseley recorded in book 188 page 71 and deed of Joseph Moseley to Elizabeth Moseley."



Book 271 page 189 March 4, 1834 Thomas Taylor, trader, sold the land and dwelling house to Isreal Ward Jr. a tailor.

Book 316 page 290 Jan. 29, 1840 Isreal Ward Jr. conveyed the land and buildings to George Peirce. The same premises conveyed by Thomas Taylor by deed book 271 page 189.

Book 321 page 242 Dec. 2, 1840 George and Hannah Peirce sold to Ezekiel
Needham the land and buildings 15 Essex St
(This also included 17 Essex St. which
was formerly a barn, afterwards a store
and then converted into a dwelling house.
This building was removed around 1965.)


Book 415 page 59 August 7, 1849 \$3,000 Ezekiel Needham, of Groton, sold to The Salem Charitable Building Association the "Crowningshield Estate" consisting of two dwelling houses and out buildings. The same estate conveyed by George Peirce on Dec. 2, 1840.

The same premises conveyed to said Corp. by Ezekiel Needham on August 7, 1849.

Book 2666 page 93 Jan. 4, 1926 Jacob and Rose Katz, of Beverly, sold to John Vasilakopoulos the land and buildings "Being the same premises conveyed to us by the Salem Charitable Building Assc." Book 2671 page 252 March 2, 1926

John and Catherine Vaselakopoulos sold the land and buildings to William J. Stewart, of Peabody. "Being the premises conveyed to me by deed of Jacob Katz on Jan. 4, 1926."

Book 2684 page 196 June 16, 1926 William J. and Henrietta Stewart sold the property to Sadie Stillman. "The same premises conveyed to me by John Vaselakopoulos."


Book 5251 page 132 March 11, 1965 \$12,000 Jean Walters and Harry Stillman, trustees sold to William H. K. Donaldson and John A. Driscoll the land and buildings being Lot #1 as shown on plan (appendix A).

Book 5972 page 658 April 13, 1973 William H. K. Donaldson and John A. Driscoll sold the two parcels, Lot #1 and Lot #2, to John J. Connelly III and Brian M. Connelly.

Book 6059 page 302 April 8, 1974 John J. Connelly III, of Danvers, and Brian M. Connelly, of Salem, trustees of the Gerrish Place Realty Trust sold Lots #1 & #2 to Edmund L. and Marguerite Phelan, of Marblehead.

Reference to book and page are deed books at the Registry of Deeds. Probate numbers are cases at Probate Court. Both offices are located in the same building on Federal St. All maps in this report are not meant to be exact, just for illustration purposes.
