Several days prior to his departure from Dallas, he had indicated that he was "getting itchy feet" and was ready to move on.

LARRY was described as white male American, about 23, sandy hair, 5'8" to 5'10", slender, and with four front upper teeth were missing.

Sir:

On November 22, 1963 Officer K.E. Lyon and myself were in the 300 block of East Jefferson assisting in the search for the person who shot and killed Officer J. D. Tippit.

We heard the police radio report that a suspect had entered the Texas Theatre. We went to this location Code 3. When we entered the theatre, we were told by a white female that the suspect was in the balcony.

We went to the balcony and searched it. While in the balcony, I heard someone shout that he was on the lower floor. We started down. Lyon slipped and sprained his ankle; I continued on down. When I arrived at the lower floor, Lee Harvey Oswald was resisting vigorously. Sgt. Jerry Hill, Officer M. N. McDonald, C. T. Walker, and Ray Hawkins and myself converged on Oswald. At this time I observed a pistol with the muzzle pointed in my direction. I grabbed the pistol and stuck it in my belt and then continued to assist in the subduing of Oswald. After Oswald was handcuffed we were instructed by Captain W.R. Westbrook to take him directly to the City Hall.

We removed Oswald from the theatre. When we were removing Oswald from the theatre, he was hollering that he had not resisted arrest and that he wanted to complain of police brutality. There was a crowd in front of the theatre yelling, "Kill the dirty 'Sob'." We put Oswald into police equipment #226 and drove directly to the City Hall. While enroute to the

City Hall, I released the pistol to Sgt. Jerry Hill. The officers who brought Oswald to the City Hall were myself, Sergeant Jerry Hill, Detective Paul Bentley, K. E. Lyon, M. N. McDonald and C. T. Walker. Enroute to the City Hall, Oswald was belligerent and said very little except that why was he being arrested other than for having a pistol.

Upon arrival at the City Hall, Oswald was taken to the Homicide and Robbery Bureau Office and there released to officers of that bureau.

On December 4, 1963, one brown shirt in color, which shirt had been previously obtained from Captain GEORGE M. DOUGHTY and Lieutenant GARI DAY of the Crime Laboratory of the Dallas Police Department on November 22, 1963, and which shirt had been examined by the FBI Laboratory on November 23, 1963, was exhibited on this day to the following individual:

BOB K. CARROLL, an officer of the Dallas Police Department, stated that upon seeing this shirt on December 4, 1963, that this was the shirt that LEE HARVEY OSWALD was wearing at the time he arrested him on November 22, 1963, following the shooting of Dallas police officer J. D. TIPPIT. CARROLL states that he accompanied OSWALD, after the arrest, to the Homicide Bureau of the Dallas Police Department, namely, to the office of Captain WILL FRITZ. At no time was this shirt removed from OSWALD and he was wearing this shirt at the time OSWALD was turned over to Captain WILL FRITZ on November 22, 1963.

BOB K. CARROLL, 6516 Marla Drive, Dallas, Texas, was interviewed to determine his relationship with RUBY since it was reported that he had been seen at the Carousel Club on several occasions.

CARROLL furnished the following information:

CARROLL is employed as Detective on the Dallas Police Department and works out of Special Services. In connection with his job with the Dallas Police Department, he has worked vice for a number of years, and through his official duties met JACK RUBY at the Carousel Club. He has known RUBY for six or eight years but has met him only on business and has never known him socially. On occasion when officers from out of town visit in Dallas, CARROLL has taken them by the Carousel Club to see the floor show.

LEE HARVEY OSWALD was unknown to CARROLL prior to the assassination of President JOHN F. KENNEDY. CARROLL knew of no connection whatever between OSWALD and RUBY. CARROLL indicated that RUBY had a speaking acquaintance with numerous officers from the Dallas Police Department, but he knew of no officer with whom RUBY was particularly close.

BOB K. CARROLL, Detective, Dallas Police Department, advised on January 27, 1964, that he received information on December 1, 1963, from JOHNNY SIMPSON, who is employed at the Simon Parking Garage at Field and Jackson Streets, Dallas, that LEE HARVEY OSWALD had applied for a job at the Southland Hotel Garage, a branch of the Allright Parking System at 1208 Commerce Street, Dallas, about two or three weeks prior to the assassination of President KENNEDY.

CARROLL made available a copy of a report dated January 23, 1964, which is hereinafter stated:

"Mr. Morrow stated that approximately six or seven days prior to the assassination of the President of the United States John Fitzgerald Kennedy SUBJECT came to the parking lot asking for a job. Mr. Morrow stated that while talking to him about the job, SUBJECT asked him how high the parking lot building was and if it afforded a good view of Dallas. Mr. Morrow stated that at the time SUBJECT was applying for employment he was dressed in a dirty white T shirt and blue jeans, and was carrying a newspaper, and that it was during the early morning hours. Mr. Morrow stated that the last time he saw SUBJECT he was waiting to talk with Mr. Claude Hallmark another one of the managers. Mr. Morrow states that the reason he remembers SUBJECT so well is that he wrote SUBJECT'S name down, and that he thought the name was Osburn, but that when he called SUBJECT Mr. Osburn, SUBJECT corrected him and told him that the name was Oswald. Mr. Morrow related that two of the employees also observed SUBJECT while he was at the parking lot. These employees are: Emmett Montgomery, N/M and Charlie Dabbs, C/M. Emmett Montgomery is still employed at the parking lot, but Charlie Dabbs is no longer there. Mr. Morrow did not know the residence addresses of these two employees and the personnel files were not available at the time of this interview.

"On January 23, 1964, the undersigned officer attempted to contact Mr. Claude Hallmark for interview, but Mr. Hallmark was not available. An interview was obtained with Mrs. Viola Sapp, cashier at the parking lot, whose residence address is 2728 Matur, FE-7-8264. Mrs. Sapp stated that she knows for a fact that SUBJECT did not ever talk with Mr. Hallmark and that SUBJECT never made a written application for employment.

Dear Chief Curry:

On behalf of the Commission I would like to thank you for the cooperation extended by you and your staff to representatives of the Commission in Dallas during the past week.

In my letter of March 18, 1964, which was delivered to Chief Estabrook, I set forth the names of various members of your Department to be interviewed or deposed by members of the staff. I am informed by Mr. Hubert and Mr. Griffin that a considerable amount of this work has already been completed.

Two additional members of the Commission staff, Mr. Joseph A. Ball and Mr. David W. Belin, will be in Dallas on March 31, 1964, and expect to remain for approximately a week. On behalf of the Commission Mr. Ball and Mr. Belin wish to take the depositions of various police officers who participated in the search of the Texas School Book Depository, the search of the Palace Inn in Irving, Texas, the search of the home at North Reddley, and the arrest of Lee Harvey Oswald. JOYCE LEE WITHERSPOON MC DONALD, also known as "Joy Dale", of 424½ West Tenth Street, Apartment 3, was interviewed at the Carousel Club, 1312½ Commerce Street where she is employed as an exotic dancer.

MC DONALD advised that she has known JACK RUBY for the past two years as two years ago she went to work for RUBY's sister as a waitress at the Vegas Club in Dallas. She began employment at the Carousel Club as a stripper in August, 1963.

MC DONALD described RUBY as a friendly, helpful person and stated that she had never heard him discuss politics other than that he made it known that he approved of President KENNEDY's physical fitness program. She advised that she last saw RUBY at 3 o'clock Friday evening, November 22, 1963, at which time she went to the Carousel Club. RUBY was sitting in the club crying. She mentioned to him what a terrible thing it was that the President had been killed, and he told her not to talk about it as it would only upset him further. She thought his actions to be strange at the time as she had never seen him cry before; that he usually attempted to project himself as a rough, tough individual.

MC DONALD was shown a photograph of LEE HARVEY OSWALD, and she advised that she had never seen him in the Carousel Club and that she doubted very much if the Master of Ceremonies at the club, BILL DE MAR, had ever seen OSWALD there as it is very difficult to distinguish faces in the club due to the lighting arrangements.

MC DONALD stated that RUBY knows numerous policemen; that he liked all policemen, however, personally knew Detective BOB CARROLL of the Dallas Police Department and also knew TONY ZALPY (phonetic), a reporter with the Dallas Morning News. She stated that she knew of RUBY's association with CARROLL and ZALPY as each had come to the club on numerous occasions and had gone to RUBY's office to discuss matters with him.

According to MC DONALD, around October 11, 1963, RUBY met a fellow by the name of LARRY (LNU) and got him a

At about 1:25 p.m., while at the Texas School Book Depository Building, 411 Elm Street, Dallas, Texas, I, SA ROBERT M. BARRETT, heard a radio broadcast on a police car radio that a police officer had been shot in the 400 block of East Jefferson Street and that a suspect had been observed fleeing from the area. I proceeded immediately to the area and learned that the shooting had actually taken place in the 400 block of East 10th Street. While there I overheard police officers interviewing the female witness who stated that she had first observed a young white male about 27 years of age leaning on the front door of the passenger side of a Dallas police car, talking to the police officer through the open window. The officer got out of the car, according to this witness, and walked around the back of the car. As he did so, the young man stepped back, took a gun from his shirt, fired twice at the officer hitting him. The woman ran to the aid of the officer and was told by the gunman to leave him alone or he would shoot her. According to this witness, the gunman then fled in a westerly direction.

I noted, however, that the blood from the fatally wounded officer was near the left front fender of the squad car, indicating that he had walked around the front of the car. I also learned that the first report of this shooting had been received by the police dispatcher at 1:19 p.m.

At approximately 2:00 p.m. I heard a police broadcast from one of the nearby squad cars advising that the suspect had possibly been sighted at the Texas Theater in the 200 block of West Jefferson. I proceeded immediately to this area and along with numerous other law enforcement officers entered the theater to assist in the search for the suspect. As I entered the seating area on the main floor, I heard a police officer, later identified as M. N. MC DONALD, shout "Here he is". At this time about 12 police officers converged on this area. I observed Officer MC DONALD, along with Detective BOB CARROLL, Captain W. R. WESTEROOK, and numerous other officers, struggling with a young man, later identified as LEE HARVEY OSWALD. I heard OSWALD yell in a loud voice, "kill all the sons of bitches".

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One of the officers took a .38 caliber snub-nose revolver out of OSWALD's right hand and handed it to Detective GARROLL. I then heard OSWALD yell, "I'm not resisting arrest, I'm not resisting". The officers then led OSWALD from the theater after handcuffing him, and as they did so OSWALD started yelling, "They are violating my civil rights".

At no time did I observe any officer strike OSWALD, abuse him, or use any more force than was necessary in subduing and handcuffing him in view of his resistance and the fact that he had a weapon in his possession.

Later at police headquarters, I observed the .38 snub-nose revolver and noted that it was a Smith and Wesson, Serial Number 510210. On the chamber hinge was the number 65248. I was also shown the six cartridges taken from the weapon and noted that one of them had an indentation on the primer. I was told by Officer MC DONALD that when he first approached OSWALD, the subject attempted to pull the weapon from his shirt, at which time MC DONALD grabbed the gun with both of his hands. MC DONALD stated that OSWALD did pull the trigger once, but that the gun did not fire. MC DONALD also stated that when he was holding onto the gun, OSWALD hit MC DONALD in the face with his fist, knocking MC DONALD against the seat and causing him to receive a scratch on his face.

At approximately 2 p.m., November 22, 1963, I was informed by an unidentified policeman of the Dallas Police Department that a suspect had been seen entering the back door of the Texas Theater.

I immediately proceeded to the Texas Theater, 231 West Jefferson, and entered the front door and stood in the lobby to see that no one left the theater, since there were no officers on guard there. A minute or two after arriving in the lobby, a Dallas County Deputy Sheriff ran by me from inside the theater stating "they have him", and within a minute thereafter, I observed a young man with his hands cuffed behind him in the midst of a group of Dallas police officers being hustled out the front door of the theater. As he passed through the lobby he shouted "police brutality".

This man was a white male, age about 22, 5' 8", 160 pounds, brown hair, and was wearing a white shirt, dark trousers, and a reddish brown jacket with zipper open all the way in front.

From photographs observed later in the day on November 22, 1963, I identified this individual as LEE OSWALD.

Six Revolver Cartridges Found in  
the Revolver at the Time of Oswald's  
Arrest, C51 - C54 and C137 - C138

On June 11, 1964, Sergeant Jerry Hill, Dallas Police Department, Dallas, Texas, was exhibited revolver cartridges, C51 - C54 and C137 - C138, by Special Agent Vincent E. Drain, Federal Bureau of Investigation. Sergeant Hill identified these cartridges as being the cartridges he removed from the gun, a .38 revolver, which was in the possession of Lee Harvey Oswald at the time he was arrested at the Texas Theatre, Dallas, Texas, on November 22, 1963. Sergeant Hill stated he participated in the arrest with Dallas Patrolmen M. N. McDonald and B.K. Carroll. He stated at the time Oswald was seized in the Texas Theatre he was attempting to pull this gun from his clothing. The gun was seized by B. K. Carroll and M. N. McDonald in Hill's presence and was wrenched away from Oswald and handed to Sergeant Hill. Sergeant Hill stated he kept this gun in his personal possession until he arrived at the Dallas Police Department Headquarters where he placed his name on each of the cartridges. Sergeant Hill advised these were positively the cartridges he had removed from the gun in the possession of Oswald on November 22, 1963, at the time of Oswald's arrest.

Four of these cartridges bearing the name of Hill were subsequently delivered to Special Agent Vincent E. Drain by the Dallas Police Department on November 22, 1963, for delivery to the Laboratory of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, Washington, D. C., for comparison purposes. The other two cartridges bearing the name Hill were released to Secret Service on November 26, 1963.
