The magazine in question is Evergreen. in which the Supreme Court justice was reporting, quite accurately, an attitude which is prevalent among the young peo ple of this country. The attitude is mere-ly the belief that the government of this country due to its insulated nature, owing to its self-servicing bureaucracy, led by mediocre politicians with narrow, stifling prejudices, cannot fulfill the responsibility of government as traditionally seen by Americans - government of the people, for the people, and by the people.

This move towards impeachment comes on the heals of the rejection of Harold Carswell's nomination to the Supreme Court. It is obvious that those who supported the administration's eminently unqualified candidate were angered and decided to vent their hostility upon the good judge. Without realizing it, they have merely fed fuel to the flames - the volatile feelings of youth towards government which Douglas had described in his

The Supreme Court throughout the Sixties has been continuously criticized for its decisions, which have been labeled, in the relatively as inine spectre of American politics, as "liberal". Decisions, which favor the rights of our citizens over the processes of government or peoples thoughtless prejudices have incurred the wrath of some who are in positions of power in government. The gathered anger of reaction is now surfacing; it is beginning to fertilize the seeds of fear that this might be another McCarthy witchhunt in the state of birth.

With all the monumental problems facing this society it would be an act of stupidity for the government to be stalled in the cesspool of questions of loyalty based on the ring around the rosy rhetoric of gesture patriotism. This country needs to be united in its efforts toward solving its problems. This country does not need the vulgar hysterics of politicians out to satisfy the needs of their petty souls. Let us hope that the legislative branch of government will put aside this nonsense about William Douglas and begin to work towards satisfying the needs of this country. Let us hope that the fair Congress of this land still is run on a basis of common sense and has not been siezed by

If you want information you either have to be authorized first or represent a gang. Authorization is the group's way of letting you know that you do not count without them. It means that you are insufficient. Afterall, what if everyone wanted...

At the present time the worst influence of this sort of thinking is the administration's view of the student off campus. A student off of the campus, according to their view, is a representative of the University and anything he does which reflects adversely on the University is grounds for at least questioning the continuance of that representation. At the moment one can be thrown out of school for using drugs off campus. There is indication in the procedures for trying a student that the president submitted to the Board of Visitors that a student could also be tried for other off campus escapades. According to members of the Honor Court it looks as if the no double jeopardy right means that you can't he tried by the same group twice for the same crime, but you can be tried by different groups. So legally it seems that a student could be dismissed from school for off campus activities regardless of what the courts do about him.

A student off campus is himself, an individual, who bears rights and responsibilities only to himself and that part of society that he is dealing with at the time. He is not a representative of the University anymore than a garbageman is a representative of the city after hours. You are more you than you are a member of a category. That you do go to school does not mean that you are something. On campus you affect the campus; off campus you affect the state, the city, or whatever. You do not affect the campus. Others may generalize from your actions and they may affect the campus, but the University should hardly punish someone for crimes of others

Which brings us back to statistics. Looking at people as if they were cate-gories, seeing a student just as a student, a redneck just as a redneck, etc. is one of the commonest violations of personal rights and freedoms, the right to be treat-




