Recently Old Dominion's campus was invaded by members of the state and Norfolk city police to arrest persons accused of selling narcotics. The same occurred at William and Mary in what seems to be a state-wide drive to stop the "drug problem." The means the police use to achieve this end are the implanting of informers to infiltrate the "sub-culture" and, after using the methods by which one gains trust and friendship, has those involved arrested.

It is pathetic to see such ignorance running rampant for there is a widespread popular belief that arrests and convictions will "solve" the drug problem.

Rules of the Game

When President Bugg spoke at the Student Senate meeting just before spring break he mentioned that he had withdraw the disciplinary procedures proposal from consideration during the last Board of Visitors' meeting pending review by the students. It is far more likely, however, that they were withdrawn because of criticism by the Board since the proposed procedures would eliminate the Honor Court, which is close to the hearts of many citizens of Ye Olde Commonwealth.

The students are reviewing the proposed procedures now, as well as the new rules of conduct which were passed by the Board and are in effect until June, not so much at the president's request as from the fear that the procedures will be adopted with the same disregard for student rights which accompanied the appro-val of the rules of conduct.

The president justified the rules of conduct on the basis of recent court decisions which would make the University liable for suit in certain instances unless it has definite regulations governing the behavior of students. The disciplinary procedures were justified on the grounds of the limitations and weaknesses of the Honor Court.

Students have recoiled against both documents for various reasons. The rules of conduct smack of the tyranny inherent in any catch-all laws which give the governing body the right to interpret them in any way which suits the purposes at hand. Many students are concerned over certain areas of the procedures proposal and want the rights of the accused strengthened. Probably one of the most valid complaints is that all of these measures are being instituted on a campus which has been peaceful and the students have shown a high level of responsibility in dealing with the problems that aris For their efforts they have been rewarded with distrust.
