Prominent economist, Dr. Harry Johnson, delivered a lec-ture in Kaufman Hall this week on "Economics in Our Contem-porary Society"."

The visiting scholar from Chicago emphasized in his opening remarks the importance of economics as a social science, "Economics began as a social science and will remain so." America's Imbalance

Almost four hundred years ago, America was a word that represented both the unknown and the promise of a bountiful future. Today, America is settled densely and the once promised land is now threatened.

The United States is beset by multiple problems - water pollution, air pollution, noise pollution, naming but a few - all of which fall into the vast category labeled the pollution problem.

What is being sought is the solution to the problem of what is an ecological imbalance. The answers which are being examined must solve the most important of questions - will man survive?

The problems that ecologists face are directly related to the problems that social workers, psychologists, consumer protectors, and urbanologists confront. The problems of ecology are an indication of the decline of the quality of life, as are the decay of the inner cities and the sharp rise in mental illness. The United States is a victim of its own illusions and suffers from introspective blindness. the inability to see itself as it really is.

Spiro Agnew, the vice president of the United States, recently said that the problem with Yale University president Kingman Brewster was that he was "more interested in fighting pollution than fighting evil." The trouble with the vice president as well as many others in this country is that they fail to equate pollution with evil and that they are more interested in the forms of evil as found in the realm

The world is, for all of its technological glory and intellectual achievements, still a place inhabited and ruled by ignorant, primitive peoples of which at this time in history Americans happen to be the foremost. The problems of an ecological imbalance will not and cannot be solved fully until solutions are sought by reason and not by politics. The United States is burdened with the

greatest responsibility in creating the solution to the restoration of the ecological balance. This burden unfortunately carries with it no military glory, no political or economic gain, only the ability of those who are born today to live tomor

The problem of ecological imbalance will only be met by a holding action until this country moves away from its current atitudes which make military power and monetary considerations more important

The United States might be the death of us all, every man, woman, and child that walks upon this earth. Unless it will grant life to those who live now and hope to live beyond this decade, unless it will grant hope to those who would bring life into the world that they would have a chance to live, then in the words of Grace slick, "I would rather have my country die for me."






