## Distorted priorities

The Student Allocations Committee has decided that interest glubs on campus will not be allowed to receive school funds. The basis for the decision lay in the "impossibility" of funding all the interest clubs on campus. Even assuming that all would ask for money, they're wrong.
There are about twenty-five interest clubs on campus. Few have much money. For $5 \%$ of what we spend on basketball scholarships alone we could give $\$ 100$ to every interest club, more than doubling number of their annual budgets. But the Allocations Committee and the preseident have decided that financing the golf team is reasonable, whereas helping the Graduate English Society bring in speakers for the campus is not. The Russian Club cannot be subsidized $\$ 100$ for showing Russian films but the Flick Society can get two-thirds of their money from general student funds, over $\$ 4000$.
The fact is that interest clubs are a tality of this campus. Not only do they
propogate interest in their own field, but they are a major means of acquainting the university community with new concepts in their area. To say that the Rugby Club (bless it) contributes $\$ 1000$ worth to the university but that the History or Psychology Club aren't worth a nickel is rubbish.
Rather than spend $\$ 750$ on a student interest survey (and we hope it won't reflect the Allocations Committee's previous biases by not including interest clubs) it might have been wiser to split $\$ 600$ among twelve clubs and hire the So-
ciology or Psychology Club to do the poll for $\$ 150$.
We do have enough money to subsidize interest clubs and there is no reason why good projects should be turned down simply because they originate from an interest club. The university could stand to do more to encourage organized intelligence on this campus than produce more rules and restrictions which have been, thus far, the primary offering of the administration.
