The profits also enable us, along with membership dues, to keep a healthy balance in our account for operating expenses and for added things the library might need during the year.

## **Library Renovation/Expansion**

### Foundation Set Up to Receive Donations to Capital Campaign

The Falmouth Public Library Foundation, Inc., a Massachusetts non profit corporation, was established on July 7, 2006. The foundation was created to receive and hold donations to the library capital campaign. It has applied to the Internal Revenue Service as a sec. 501(c) (3) organization so all donations will be tax deductible.

The purpose of the foundation is to promote and advocate for the improvement of public library buildings in Falmouth. The immediate goal is to raise \$1.5 million dollars for the renovation project, primarily for furniture and equipment of the new building. The secondary goal is to form the basis of an endowment from any funds left over after immediate needs are satisfied

The initial officers and directors of the foundation are drawn from the trustees, the capital campaign and the Friends. Members of these organizations will remain directly involved in the foundation. The foundation is intended to supplement the Friends' programs and to raise funds from sources not easily solicited by them. The Friends remain front and center as the library's public support agency. The two have the same objective but operate in different environments. Together their efforts will support a great public library in Falmouth.

# Friends Contribute \$19,535 to Fulfill Library's Wish List 2007

In a letter to the Friends, Assistant Library Director Lynne Mulvey thanks the Friends for their help and discusses how the funds will be spent during the coming year.

### Interim library needs laptop computers

First and foremost we will need laptop computers for use by the staff and the public at our new locations. With additional laptops we will be able to take advantage of wireless capabilities and not be as dependent on hardwiring as we are now in our permanent facility. Laptops are mobile and can go with us to various locations and will facilitate communication between sites. We currently have \$4,818 carried over for computers from the last fiscal year. With the addition of \$10,875 this fiscal year we will have a total of \$15,693, enough to purchase nine laptops.

### Library programs and Museum passes

During the renovation, the children's and adult librarians will continue to present quality programs at the interim library and at various locations around town. We are asking the Friends to support the library's programming efforts because the staff feels that it is very important to maintain this service, especially when other services will be impacted by the move. We are also seeking the same amount of funding for museum passes. In the eyes of the state, a renovation is not an excuse to miss state standards. We must maintain our current book budget, which is 13% of the entire town budget. In the past the Friends' materials funding has helped the library meet that standard and we hope to carry that support forward this year.

#### Importance of library Web Page

During the renovation our patrons will depend even more on our Web Page to keep informed about library programs and to follow the construction process. The library recently invested in a software program called "Event Keeper" which allows patrons to view what events are going on at the library and to register for programs from their home computers. We propose to purchase a digital camera to load pictures of library programs on to the web site. A digital camera is vital for documenting library events and promoting programs.

# **Questions and Answers**



We are aware that Friends' members and patrons of the library have many questions as the library prepares to close and move to a temporary location while the renovation and the addition take place. The following questions and answers may help you to sort out what is about to begin:

> Where will the temporary library be located? 15 Carlson Lane

#### Where is that?

North on 28 and turn left at the bridge to Sippewlssett off of Palmer Avenue. Take a sharp left as you exit the bridge, and the library will be on your right. A map is available at the library.

When will the move take place? It will begin October 2<sup>ND</sup> and continue until October 22<sup>ND</sup>.

> When will the temporary library open? October 23RD.

Where will the Reference Department be? 15 Carlson Lane

Where will the Children's Department be? 15 Carlson Lane

> What about the computers? 15 Carlson Lane

What about the Rental Collection? 15 Carlson Lane

What about the book collection?

Most of the popular fiction and non-fiction will be at 15 Carlson Lane. The overflow will be at the East Falmouth Branch.

Can the books being stored at East Falmouth be checked out? Yes. Patrons must fill out a slip to request the titles

Will the front door of the library be reopened? Yes. It will add new handicapped access and reorient the building to Main Street and the Library Lawn.



#### What else will the renovation and addition include?

- · Current space will be improved for public use
- 3000 feet of book space will be added.
- Antiquated heating and air conditioning will be replaced
- Windows and leaking skylight will be replaced
- A modern fire safety system will be installed
- Computer and electrical wiring will be upgraded
- Three meeting rooms and a reference room in the new addition
- Expanded children's room

Self check-out station will be added.

The building will be fully insulated for greater fuel efficiency.



What is the total cost of the renovation? \$9.2 million





How much will the state pay? \$2. 7 million

How much have the Trustees of the Falmouth Public Library pledged to raise in private funding?

\$ 1.5 million



#### For what will the private finding be spent?

- Restore historic elements of the original building
- Furnish the new larger Children's Room
- Expand the library's computer system
- Provide added equipment for the disabled
- Incorporate state-of- the-art audio-visual equipment
- Add comfortable seating and study areas.



# Funds that remain once the above needs have been satisfied will be used to . . .

Establish an endowment to support future programs for children and adults at the Main Library and the East Falmouth and North Falmouth Branches.

Where will the funds raised be deposited?

In a Falmouth Public Library Foundation set up specifically for the purpose of receiving and investing the funds.

What is the difference between the Foundation and the Friends?

When will the fundraising begin?

Professional fundraisers have been hired to work with a committee already established, and fundraising is underway.

A public kickoff of the campaign is expected sometime this fall.

Where will the Friends' Donation Box be located?

Negotiations are in progress. The new location will be announced soon.

Are the Friends expected to make a contribution?

The Friends have made a significant contribution to the campaign. The generous amount will be announced at the kickoff this fall.





# ★ Let's Go to the Movies ★

There is a veritable feast of good movies out there judging by the difficulty getting a ticket. It took me two tries to see both The Devil Wears Prada and Mrs. Palfrey at the Claremont.
