



# BOOK REVIEWS

## Austin and Mabel by Polly Longworth

Remember how we were always told that the Victorians were very proper people? Well, forget it. What went on behind closed doors was fully as erotic and often as clandestine as affairs of today.



Let's go back to Amherst, Massachusetts in 18 and meet Austin Dickinson, the strikingly handsome, aristocratic treasurer of Amherst College, the leading citizen of the town and the brother of Emily and Lavinia Dickinson who lived next door to him. He was happily married with three children and there was nothing to suggest that he might not remain that way. That was before he met Mabel.

Mabel Todd, who moved into Amherst with her astronomer husband, was pretty, petite, outgoing, an accomplished pianist and a trained soprano. She soon met the Dickinsons and became a part of the musicals given by Austin's wife Susan. The sparks evidently flew when Austin and Mabel



met, and it was not long before all of Amherst rocked with the news of their liaisons. However, being proper people, they looked the other way, reluctant to admit that such a thing was going on under their noses. An added piece of spicy intrigue is where the lovers held their trysts. It was in the closed off dining room of the Dickinson sisters who were willing to help out their big brother.

Be prepared for a lot of gushing in Mabel and Austin's love letters. They take up half the book.

If you haven't been already, you must take a trip to Amherst, about a two and a half hour drive, and take the hour and a half tour of both houses. Austin's was going through extensive renovations last year, but you could still see parts of it. The docent we had was one of those passionately dedicated people and she took great pride in making the whole story come alive. My companion who had been bored with the whole idea, never missed a word she said. Be sure to check but I believe both houses open to the public some time in April and remain open until Thanksgiving. # Reading in between the Lines Invitation to Poetry by R. Pinsky & M. Dietz

In honor of Poetry Month I checked out **Invitation To Poetry** by Robert Pinsky and Maggie Dietz. It is the selection of the What's Falmouth Reading Committee and it includes the work of 200 poets.

Truth be told I never was fond of poetry with the exception of Emily Dickinson whom I admire. This anthology does include two selections of Dickinson's, but it was time to explore other poets. I found other familiar names including Adrienne Rich, Ezra Pound, Anne Sexton and Margaret Atwood.

I liked Conrad Alken's **Discordant** written in memory of his mother. I found Yehuda Amichai's **Inside the Apple** to be filled with fascinatlong imagery and description. His poetry would make a good topic for discussion.

Another poem my finger stopped at was **Men At Forty** by Donald Justice. I forwarded it to a 40 year old friend in hope of getting his opinion, but have not received an answer as yet. Perhaps it was a sensitive subject or he chose to ignore it altogether.

People who live in a fantasy world may not want to read William Wordsworth's famous sonnet The World Is Too Much With Us Late And Soon. The first line says it all.

A romantic and touching poem by Percy Bysshe Shelley is **Love's Philosophy**. A note at the top of the poem tells how a woman included this poem in her wedding ceremony,her husband reading the first half and she the bottom half.

I also found Sir Walter Scott's poem Helvellyn a definite eye catcher.

I liked the lines written above the poems by people who particularly enjoyed the poem and explained why.


