

## Joy of Learning Schedule of Courses for Fall 2001

The Friends of the Falmouth Public Library will offer five new courses which will begin Monday, October 15, 2001. Classes will meet one hour per week for four weeks. The classes are free and open to the public. Note: The Joys of Genealogy will meet 2 hours each week.

#### THE COURSES ARE AS FOLLOWS:

#### Mondays, October 15, 22, 28, and November 5

10am to 11am.

GETTYSBURG: This class will cover the prelimimary campaigns and each of the first three days of the largest battle ever fought on American soil. The course will address some of the common misconceptions, myths, legends and lesser known actions of the battle. A video will be shown of the battlefield as it is today. Efforts to restore more of the battlefield to its original state will be included.

THE MIDDLE EAST AND HOW IT GOT THAT WAY: This course will focus on shifting Great Power rivalries: the rise of Arab Nationalism; Arab-Israeli conflict and how these strands have been woven into the Near Eastern Tapestry we see today. This course will be a reprise of one given in the fall of 1999 but with information added due to the timeliness of the subject.

HOW WE REMEMBER OUR LIVES: Using recent scientific discoveries, Susan Baur will present a survey of how autobiographical memory works, how it helps us, how it feels, and how we rely on it for a sense of identity, for maintaining relationships, for guiding our behavior and stabilizing our moods. She will also discuss how it feels to live with the contradictory experiences that memory gives us.

Susan Baur is a psychologist and author. She lives in North Falmouth and is currently working on a book called In The Shadowlands of Memory: How We Remember Our Lives.

2:00 pm to 4:00 pm.

THE JOYS OF GENEALOGY: This course will offer 2 one hour presentations on each class day. The offering will include: Getting Started, Using Internet and Computer programs, Vital Records, Church Records, U. S. Census, LDS Records (Mormon), Land and Probate Records, Military Records, Passengership Lists and Immigration Records.

Several members of the Falmouth Genealogical Society, all of whom are experienced genealogists, will give the presentations.

Some time after the World Trade Center disaster I heard that Dan Rather had cried on the David Letterman show. The second picture is the 9/24/01 cover of the New Yorker. At first glance it is entirely black which in itself would have been very effective, but tilt the cover to the left and get the light at just the right angle and you will see the Towers. The title of the cover is simply 9/11/01. If you have not seen it I am sure the library has a copy. Study it and cry along with Dan and all of America.

librarian extraordinaire and one of the best friends the Friends has ever had


