This is the seder's fulcrum,

our collective memories of
slavery and turns them
into collective obligation...
Our own retelling of the narrative
of slavery pushes us toward
taking public action to
end slavery in our time."

Historical Note: Labor Seders

The Freedom Seder and subsequent social justice seders have their roots in the often overlooked early 20th-century history of secular political seders such as communist "red seders" and union-themed "third seders," communal gatherings held on the third night of Passover.
