

DEATH OF KOLICK

MAY BENEFIT BORASKY

Question of Mental Condition Has Bearing on Motion for New Trial.

As a result of Anton Kollick dying of a mental affection it is probable that Atty. Joseph B. Carmody, counsel for Stefan Borasky, who also was convicted of murder in the first degree for killing Mrs. Rose Umansky of West Granville, will base his strongest argument for a new trial on the contention that Kollick always was insane and that because of this mental condition his testimony against Borasky should not have been admitted.

Although Dr. C. P. Hooker, who, with Medical Examiner S. J. Russell, performed the autopsy on Kollick's body, announced that the prisoner died of an acute attack of the disease, it may be contended in behalf of Borasky that this mental condition existed for many months or years.

If it can be shown that Kollick was mentally affected at the time he and his companion were on trial for their lives it is more than probable that the court will allow a new trial for Borasky. Judge Henry A. King will hear Atty. Carmody's argument on his motion for a new trial probably next week.
