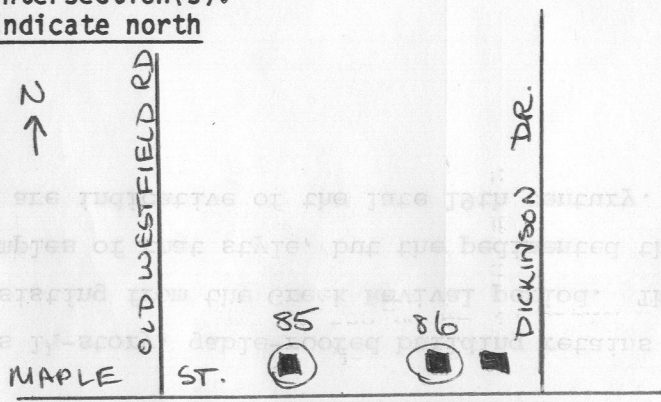

NATIONAL REGISTER CRITERIA STATEMENT (if applicable)

ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE Describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within the community.

This 1 1/2-story, gable-roofed building retains features common in vernacular structures persisting from the Greek Revival period. The gable return and side hall entry are examples of that style, but the pedimented through-cornice dormer and the 1-story bay are indicative of the late 19th century.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE Explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community.

L. Cook was an occupant in 1870 and M. Peterson most likely one of the Danish immigrants resided there in 1894. W. Brooks owned the property in 1912.

Tradition states that Ellis Goodrich lived in the house in the 20th century. He was a photographer whose work appears on many postcards of Granville.
