**ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE Describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within the community.**

The 2-story, 5-bay, gable-roofed residence with a center chimney is related to #45 and #48 because they share the same stylized triglyph motif. Because of the synthetic siding, features other than the entablature with the triglyphs and the plain window and door trim are obscured.

**HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE Explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community.**

The owner of the property is shown as A. Clark in 1855 and 1870. Mrs. D. Clark appears as the occupant in 1894 and 1912.
