ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE Describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within the community.

The 2-story, 5-bay building is an example of typical massing which would last from mid 18th to early 20th century in Granville. This example is elaborated at the cornice line by modillions. A narrow door marks the entrance surrounded by pilasters supporting a triangular pediment also enhanced by modillions. A fanlight segmented by lead muntin hangs above the door.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE Explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community.

This house was the residence of Jesse Spelman who served the town as its Clerk and also was a member of the corporation that considered the possibility of a turnpike through Granville in 1801. The pioneers who traveled to Granville, Ohio left from this house after a final blessing by Dr. Timothy Cooley.

Silas Noble was listed as the occupant in 1855. He joined with James D. Cooley to form a drum manufacturing company which is currently still operating.

S.H. Whitney was the occupant in 1870 and M.B. Whitney in 1894 and 1912.
