




SUNDAY MORNING WORSHIP at 10:45.

"The Sun" was first published in 1877. William G. Snow, publisher and proprictor. The paper was issued the 1st an 15th of every month, at the corner of Main St. and North Lanc, West Granville. Mass., at the low rate of 40 cents Per Annum, -- and entered as second-class matter at the Westfield, P.O. The follow ing excerpts are from the issue of April 15, 1881, through the kindness of Mrs. Cooley.

THE MOOD FOR PUBLIC WORSHIP

SUN Let God and the Church be in your
thoughts before you set out for worship.

One cannot suddenly plunge into the mood
of worship. It tust be cultivated. A

valuable preparation for worship would
be to read quietly a devotional chapter
in the Bible before coming to Church.

MON Come to Church expectantly. God is there to greet you if you are prepared to commune with Him. His promise is "Ask and it shall be given unto you, knock and it shall be opened unto you." Even our Lord could do no mighty works in a certain village "because of their unbelief."

TUE When you take your seat, bow in prayer for God's blessing upon the congregation and the minister as well as for yourself. This will lift you out of yourself and the consideration of your

own problems, into the atmosphere of desire for the success of the service for the sake of others. You will find it a heartening and a wholesome thing.

WED Try to remember that Church wership is a social thing, involving the entire congregation. What you do during the hour of wership has its effect for good or evil on other wershipers. If you bow during prayer, sing heartily, and enter wheleheartedly into the responses you help every wershipper around you. Wership, therefore, in the spirit of our Lord when He said: "For their sakes sanctify I myself."

THU Come to Church to give, as well as to got. We serve God by thanksgiving and praise quite as truly as by work. The spirit of giving in worship will also help to save you from the critical mood. If the service does not happen to touch you on a particular Sunday, remember that it may be helping others.

FRI Listen to the sermon not as to a lecture but as an aid in discovering the will of God for you. There are three elements of effective listening: (1) Attention. (2) Sincerity. Prejudice false-pride, and egotism should not be allowed to distort the message. (3) Obedience. The sermon will take on life, meaning, and interest if you listen to it carnestly as something to be applied to your own life. It is not the preaching of the Gospel, but the preactice of the Gospel that blesses mankind.

SAT Take the Benediction out into life with you. The Benediction is not mærely a signal that worship is over, but a prayer of peace for the worshiper. The supreme test of all worship is whether the worshiper establishes a connection between it and the life which awaits him beyond the Church door.
