NATIONAL REGISTER CRITERIA STATEMENT (if applicable)

ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE Describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within the community.

This building is related to (#31, #43, #47, #48) because of the degree and quality of ornament. The 2-story, 5-bay, gable-roofed structure is symmetrically arranged. Two-story, paneled pilasters enhance the buildings four corners and define the central bay. The recessed door, flanked by sidelights and transom, is topped with a lintel supported by paneled pilasters incised with a Greek key design at the top and bottom.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE Explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community.

This house was built by Timothy Spelman an early settler of Granville. A photograph from the late 1900's (in possession of Wilhelmina Tryon) shows that the pilasters once had Ionic capitols and the door surround had a heavy cornice. These were probably removed in the 1960's. B. Andrews was the occupant in 1855 and W. Brown in 1870. This was the location of a large Irish settlement and the property was occupied by a P. McKenny in 1894 and 1912.
