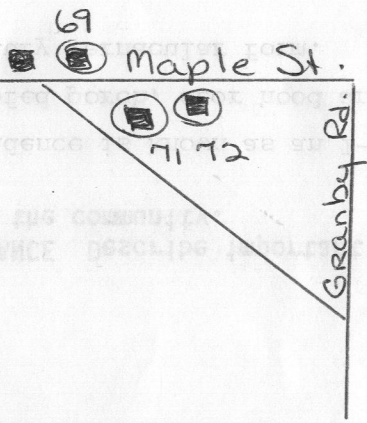

ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE Describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within the community.

The form of this residence is known as an I-house which is 1 room deep by 2 rooms wide. The 1-story, shed-roofed porch, door hood and plain window surrounds individualize this common 19th century vernacular form.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE Explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community.

In 1894, M. Spelman was the resident and in 1912 M.E. Seymour owned the property.
