

ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE Describe in other buildings within the community.

This 2-story, 3-bay, gable-roofed residence features a central entrance enhanced by 1/2 sidelights and a semicircular blind fan. Architectural features (like the door treatment) and the polygonal 1-story bay, which was probably added after 1850, accentuate this house plan which is recurrent in Granville.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE Explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community.

The property was in the Robinson family from 1855 until sometime after 1870. The Robinson family was another of the first families coming from Durham, Connecticut to settle in West Granville. Henry Robinson, whose name appears on the 1870 map, was a deacon in the West Granville Church and made a donation to establish the West Granville Academy there. Gilbert Miller appears as the occupant in 1894 and 1912.
