ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE Describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within the community.

This building relates to #26 and #91 because of form. This 2-story gable-front-and-wing is enlivened by later additions of a one-story polygonal bay on the gable end facade and a 1-story, shed-roofed porch. The porch extends from east of the bay to the end of the wing and is enhanced by lattice work in the spindle valance and turned ballusters in the railing.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE Explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community.

R. Barlow, a wealthy farmer was the occupant in 1855. He owned this property as well as #80 & #82 in 1855. A. #80 & #82 in 1855.
