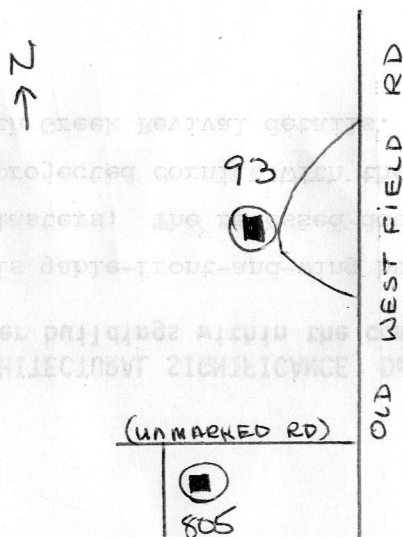

ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE Describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within the community.

This gable-front-and-wing building is elaborated by a pedimented gable, frieze and corner pilasters. The recessed door is enhanced by columns supporting a full entablature with a projected cornice. With the exception of #103, it is the most elaborate doorway surviving with Greek Revival details.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE Explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community.

The residence was owned in 1855 by the King family. Timothy Clark is shown as the owner from 1870-1894. M. Peterson was the occupant in 1912.
