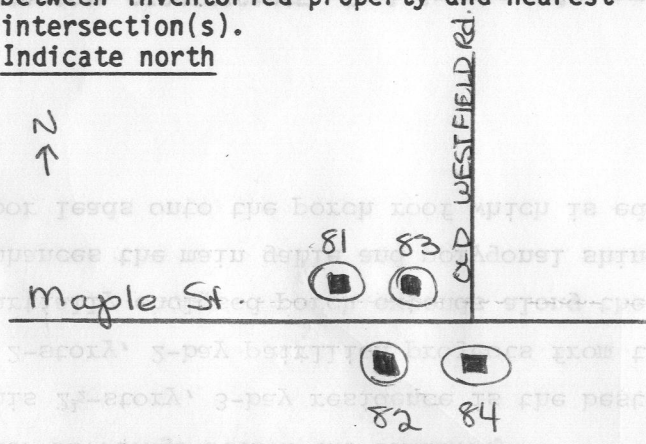

NATIONAL REGISTER CRITERIA STATEMENT (if applicable)

ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE Describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within the community.

This 2 1/2-story, 3-bay residence is the best example of the Queen Anne style in Granville. A 2-story, 2-bay pavillion projects from the main facade and a wrap around 1-story partially enclosed porch extends along the front facade. A Palladian style window enhances the main gable and polygonal shingles are found in all gables. A second story door leads onto the porch roof which is edged with a turned post and spindle ballustrade.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE Explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community.

Fred N. Gibbons, son of John M. Gibbons, built this house. He served Granville as a Town Clerk from 1901-1903.
