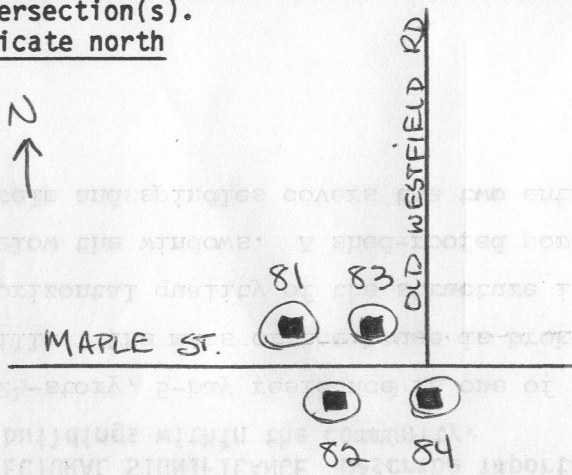

NATIONAL REGISTER CRITERIA STATEMENT (if applicable)

ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE Describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within the community.

This 2 1/2-story, 5-bay residence is one of the few examples of multifamily housing in Granville. The mass of the house is broken by a central, front facade, wall dormer. The horizontal quality of the structure is accentuated by continuous clapboards above and below the windows. A shed-roofed porch with central pediment, turned porch posts spandrels and spindles covers the two entries.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE Explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community.

M. Holcomb was the occupant of the house in 1912. This was the residence of Dr. Clifford A. White who practiced in Granville from 1912 - 1935.
