needed repairs is a baby stone for 3 year old Mary A. Griswold, daughter of Homer and Abigal. Homer was the blacksmith in Granville for a time. Another stone, laying completely on the ground, is the marker for





Frank and Lillianetta, children of Joseph and Margaret Phelon.

With summer now in full swing, it seems appropriate that we tell of the summer residents who not only vacationed here but were a big part of the fabric of our town in the early 1900's and forward. They volunteered, they contributed financially and they shared their expertise. They enjoyed the hills and dales and beauty of the countryside...and cared deeply about Granville. Some of them so loved the town that they opted to stay for eternity; some have descendants who still live here today.

Woodlands Cemetery is the final resting place for Dr. Austin Scott and his wife Anna Prentiss Stearns Scott as well as two of their children, Anna and Seargent. The Scotts were from New Jersey, where Austin was president of Rutgers University. They purchased their summer residence at 692 Main Road....the home that James Cooley built in the 1700's.




Dr. Scott died in 1922 and his wife Anna in 1933. The children continued their summer sojourn to Granville. Daughter Anna eventually married William Cooley from West Granville and son Seargent became an institution in his own right. Seargent was seriously physically disabled and mentally exceptional. He stayed involved in all things Granville and became a permanent Granville resident, living in the small Cooley Law Office, the saltbox at 688 Main.




The Scott family remained active and enthusiastic summer residents and were involved and supportive of Woodlands Cemetery. The *Granville Center News*, the
