Captain William¹ Terrett of Stonington, Connecticut, and Some of His Descendants

3. GEORGE WASHINGTON³ **TERRETT** (*Capt. William*²⁻¹) was born in Stonington 18 February 1800^[146] and died in Pittsfield (residence Granville, west parish), Massachusetts, 24 May 1876, aged 76 years, 3 months, after falling down cellar stairs at the home of his daughter Maria Lloyd; he was buried in West Granville Cemetery. He married in Halifax, Vermont, 3 November (not December) 1822, **PRUDENCE CHESEBROUGH DENISON**, [148] born in Stonington 15 December 1799, [149] daughter of Benadam "Adam" Denison (*Nathaniel*⁶, *Joseph*⁵, *George*⁴⁻², *William*¹ [Roxbury, 1631]) and Rhoda⁵ Randall (*Joshua*⁴, *Lt. John*³, *John*²⁻¹ [Newport/Stonington, 1667]). Prudence died in West Granville 1 May 1884, aged 84 years, 4 months, [151] and was buried with her husband.

In early spring 1823, less than five months after his marriage, George W. Terrett of Granville bought his uncle John Terrett's half interest in a 130-acre farm in Colebrook, Connecticut, which the uncle had owned in common with his brother Charles; other purchases there followed. [152] About April 1826,

George returned to Granville, where he remained.^[153] A Hampden County history depicts him thus:^[154]

GEORGE W. TERRETT, late a prosperous farmer and prominent citizen of Granville, . . . spent his boyhood days in Stonington. His first attempt at earning a livelihood was in his father's store, but the removal of the family to the farm at Granville caused a change in his occupation. At that time, he took up farming and, finding himself adapted to it, adopted it as a life vocation. He was one of the most successful farmers in this part of the town and added to the old farm so that at one time he owned 460 acres. [155] Mr. Terrett was a loyal Republican and was selectman of Granville for some time and also held minor offices. He was a member of the Methodist Episcopal church, in which he was an ardent worker and to whose support he liberally contributed. He died . . . while on a visit in Pittsfield at his daughter's home.

The 1870 U.S. census lists the value of George Terrett's real estate as \$6,500 and his personal estate as \$9,000. [156]

Children of George Washington³ and Prudence Chesebrough (Denison) Terrett; i, iv–x born in West Granville, ii–iii born in Colebrook:

By 1854 George had joined uncles Dudley and Horatio Terrett at 251 Front Street, Manhattan, as an importer/dealer of wine and liquors, in which occupation he remained. In 1856, meanwhile, he was an agent in the Wall Street office of Keystone Insurance Co. In 1870 the value of George's estate, real and personal, was \$14,000 and \$4,000, respectively. His will, dated 30 Dec. 1869 and proved 28 Feb. 1873, left everything to his wife, Anna. The latest record found for her is from the latter year.

Prior to their double wedding, Maria and her twin sister, Mary, taught school in the Granville vicinity. [172] Lemuel came to Pittsfield at age 15 and, after a six-year apprenticeship with a maternal uncle, became a highly skilled cabinetmaker. He later established a furniture business and was also Pittsfield's leading undertaker. A "friend of the poor," he was "highly prosperous" and of "unquestioned integrity." [173]

Eliza and Sylvester, with two infant children, went west by covered wagon to Chatfield in 1856 and the next year settled on a farm in Elmira, an adjoining, rural township. About a year before Sylvester's death, they moved back to Chatfield, where he engaged in the lumber business. [192] For many years following his death, Eliza often stayed at the Elmira farm

When Delia and Edwin married, she was a schoolteacher and he a peddler. [201] In 1870 they were living in Southwick; he was a farm laborer. [202] In 1880 they were living in Granville; his occupation was "farming" (distinct from *farmer*). [203] Prior to her death, Delia had been a dressmaker. [204]

field 21 or 22 Nov. 1918, aged 80 (81?) years, 10 months, 1 day, bur. Pine Hill Cemetery. $^{[210]}$

Initially a farmer, Frank owned and operated the Terrett House, a hotel in West Suffield, which he bought in 1869 with the assistance of his wife's sister; his widow and namesake son sold it in 1893. [211]

- viii. WILLIAM D[ENISON?] TERRETT, b. 26 Feb. 1836; [212] d. West Granville 5 Sept. 1837, aged 1 year, 6 months, bur. West Granville Cemetery. [213]
 - ix. Charles William Terrett, b. 19 March 1839; [214] d. unmarried, Westfield 20 May 1923, bur. West Granville Cemetery. [215] He served in the Civil War from 20 Sept. 1861 to 27 Sept. 1864 as a private in Company F, 27th Massachusetts Volunteer Infantry. Between fall 1862 and spring 1864, he was treated several times, once for some months in a military hospital, for malarial dysentery, piles, and rheumatic fever. At the Battle of Cold Harbor, Va., on 3 June 1864, he suffered a severe gunshot wound in his left side. [216]

Charles took over his father's West Granville farm and remained there until about five years prior to his death, when he moved to adjacent Westfield. He was a "very successful farmer[,] . . . manage[d] a large dairy," was a "well-known horseman," and for many years was the Hampden Co. deputy sheriff for the town of Granville. $^{[217]}$

family farm, in West Granville, and the remaining 34 in the Pittsfield home of her sister Maria Lloyd and the latter's grandson, Lemuel G. Lloyd. [221]

APPENDIX A

William Territt of London and America (see note 1)

At the Old Bailey, London's central criminal court, "William Territt late of London Labourer [called watch engraver in trial testimony]" was on 15 September 1767 sentenced "[t]o be Transported . . . for burglariously breaking and entering" a residence in the London parish of Allhallows Lombard Street, Bishopsgate, and stealing from a watchmaker's shop therein 30 watches (most with gold or silver cases) and gold coinage, valued at £118 in total. [222] Territt was thereafter kept at the infamous Newgate Prison until December, when he was taken to St. Katherine's Dock and deported to America on the Neptune, which set sail in January 1768. [223] Territt was among some 50,000 English men, women, and children who between 1614 and 1775 became involuntary American immigrants for offenses ranging from theft of a handkerchief to bigamy and highway robbery.[224] Although the Neptune's specific point of arrival is unknown, it had in February 1744 delivered its first cargo of felons to Maryland. [225] This, with Virginia, was the destination of ships transporting convicts, most of whom would toil as plantation laborers for up to seven years before gaining their freedom.^[226]

The proximate English origin of convict Territt and of William¹ Terrett was London. The former, moreover, had arrived in America about three and a half years previous to the latter's New York City marriage. One therefore might wonder if the deportee of 1768 was identical with the young man who reached New York City by 1771 and became the progenitor of the New England Terretts. New York City, however, was rarely a destination of migrants from Maryland or Virginia. And as above, court records describe defendant Territt as a laborer and watch engraver; William¹ Terrett, by contrast, was then a leather-breeches maker and glover. The "transported" man was probably

the person recorded as William Tarrat, when, as an inhabitant of Island Hundred, Queen Anne's County, Maryland, he took the Oath of Allegiance in 1778. [227] He was also probably the Pvt. William Terrett whose Revolutionary War records show his receipt on 10 February 1779 of \$100 bounty for a three-year reenlistment in Capt. John Hawkins's Company, Fifth Maryland Regiment of Foot, commanded by Col. William Richardson. [228]

APPENDIX B

William Tarre(t)/Terret(t) of New Hampshire (see note 1)

Predating the Stonington Terretts in New England was a Portsmouth, New Hampshire, family of a similar, occasionally identical, surname. William Tarret(t)/Terret(t) of Portsmouth first appeared on that town's tax lists in 1718. [229] In 1726, he sold the right to property in Barrington, New Hampshire, granted to him in 1722 as a four-year Portsmouth taxpayer; the deed calls him a mariner. [230] At Portsmouth's South Church on 17 August 1729, his wife, Ruth (Partridge) Terret, "renewed ye baptismal Dedication[,] & her 4 children, William, Charles, Benjamin & Mary" were also baptized. [231] The name William Tarret(t) continued to appear on Portsmouth tax lists until 1740, when that of Charles Tarret took its place. [232] Charles then regularly appeared on the tax lists through 1758, in which year his assessment was zero; on the 1757 and 1758 lists, the word *dead* appears in the margin opposite his name. [233]

While a genealogical connection between Portsmouth Tarretts and Stonington Terretts is not evident, they do have certain commonalities: Like Capt. William¹ of Stonington and two or three of his sons, William of Portsmouth was a mariner (Charles Tarrett's occupation is unknown). William Tarrett's first two sons' names, William and Charles (listed first and second in the aforementioned baptismal record), were also those of Capt. William¹'s first two sons.

Less readily apparent is another attribute shared by these two families: premature death. Charles Tarret of Portsmouth, perhaps his father, and several male Partridge relatives died early. Assuming that Charles was no more than 18 when baptized (1729) and no less than 21 at his first appearance in Portsmouth tax records (1740), he would have been between 38 and 46 when he died (1757). Charles's maternal uncle, John Partridge, died at 34; his mother Ruth's grandfather William Partridge was almost certainly under

40; her uncle Nehemiah Partridge was 45; and his son, Ruth's first cousin Nehemiah, was 46. [234]

Among Capt. William¹ Terrett's descendants who died by middle age were two of his sons: one was 36, the other about 50. Of William²'s seven sons, two died at 37 and one at 49. George³ Terrett had two sons who died at ages 47 and 49, respectively; and there were others. In 1988, James C.⁶ Terrett Jr. of Westfield, Mass. (1920–2013) (*James C.⁶*, *Benjamin F.⁴*, *George W.³*, *Capt. William²-¹*), repeated to this writer his father's assertion that the Terrett family's medical history is littered with cases of heart disease. The causes of death among Portsmouth Tarretts and Partridges are unknown.

Several persons whose surnames approximate William¹'s resided in or near New York City following his presence there. At New York City 15 or 16 August 1778, widow Elizabeth Terrot married Sgt. Maj. Robert Mara, 1st Battalion, Grenadiers. [235] At New York City 14 September 1780, Sarah/Salah Terrat/Terrot married Abraham Stout. [236] On 3 November 1781, Peter Terrat shot a man dead at Elizabeth, New Jersey. [237] The 1790 U.S. census for Smithtown, Long Island, enumerated the households of Isaac Terred and Isaac Terred Jr. [238] Mary Terret married Nicolas Vancleve on Staten Island 1 April 1805. [239] The aforementioned Isaac Tered Jr. was perhaps also Isaac "Ferrett," listed as a head of household in the 1810 U.S. census for New York City's Fifth Ward. [240] (Two lines above Ferrett is Otis "Faft," almost certainly identical to Otis Taft, enumerated in the same ward ten years later.) [241] No evidence of a connection between William¹ Terrett and any of these persons has been found.

APPENDIX C

William Terrett of London and Virginia (see note 1)

Sometime during the mid to late 1830s, William¹ Terrett's grandson John Cotton Terrett (no. 2.vi) paid an extended visit to Oakland, a plantation near Alexandria, Virginia, belonging to another Terrett family whose American progenitor had come from London.^[242] Previously unknown to each other, the

guest and his hosts related their respective family histories (John's father was "able thru the mails to add particulars to his son's recollections"), agreeing thereafter that the two families were "of one and the same stock." In or about 1902, John C. Terrett's daughter, Isabel, related her version of what had been learned through correspondence with the Virginia Terretts: William Henry Terrett, the Virginia family's immigrant agnate ancestor, came to America just before the Revolution accompanied by a brother, who settled in New York and founded the Northern Terretts. [243]

William Henry Terrett was indeed the progenitor of the Virginia Terretts, but he immigrated long before the Revolution. On 17 November 1720, he was discharged from Christ's Hospital, a London school for orphans, and apprenticed to his uncle Thomas Arne and another man to serve as a clerk for lawyer William Beverley of York River, Virginia. [244] His Bible and Prayer Book (held in 1906 by Thomas Terrett of Fairfax County, Virginia, but since lost) contains his birthdate, 19 April 1707, written in his own hand. [245] Complementing this record is that of his baptism, at All Hallows the Great Church, London, 4 May 1707; his parents, Henry and Mary (Arne) Terrett, had married at Lincoln's Inn Chapel, Holborn, London, 1 November 1705. [246]

As above, the Northern Terretts' progenitor did settle in New York City a few years before the Revolution but removed to Stonington about the time it began. And from the roughly 40-year difference between his age and that of the Virginia immigrant, it is clear that they were not brothers. The proposition that they were of the same stock seems tenable only in the broadest sense.
