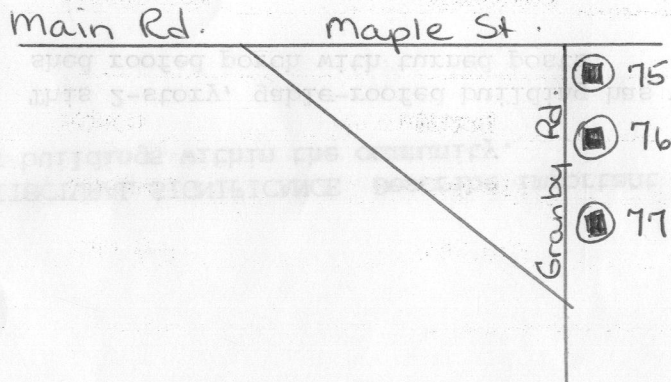

ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE Describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within the community.

This 2-story, gable-roofed building has very little ornamentation other than the shed roofed porch with turned posts.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE Explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community.

The building was used by the Methodist Society for socials and church suppers given by the Church. (1894-1912 map). A singing school started by some of the local residents was often held in this building. In 1928, the building began to be used as a Grange Hall. That organization has disbanded and it is now owned by the Town.
