ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE Describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within the community.

This 2-story, 3-bay hip-roofed structure has a roof line broken by 2 hip-roofed dormers. The most notable feature is the system of porches on the main facade. A one-story full width hip-roofed porch crosses the front facade and a 2nd story pedimented porch grows from the central bay.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE Explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community.

Ben Gibbons, son of John M. built this house. He became Postmaster after his father in 1901 and retired in 1941.
