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
NATIONAL REGISTER CRITERIA STATEMENT (if applicable)

ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE Describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within the community.

This 2-story, 3-bay residence features a lateral eave and gable end overhang. Because of these features, it is possible that the door surround of sidelights and pilasters supporting an entablature was added later. A projecting portico with monumental columns stretches across the main facade which was added in the 1950's.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE Explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community.

The building was built about 1800 by Nathan Curtis who was a tavern keeper in West Granville in 1816 and 1817. The property then passed to T. Curtis in 1855. A later owner, Joseph Welch, (1912) also owned the Curtis House (#18).
