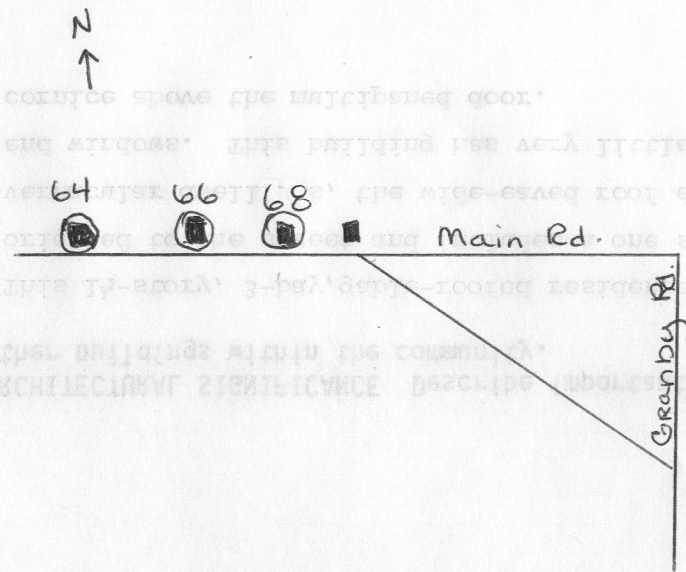

NATIONAL REGISTER CRITERIA STATEMENT (if applicable)

ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE Describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within the community.

This 1 1/2-story, 3-bay, gable-roofed residence in Granville in which the gable front is oriented to the street and includes a one story wing. In many of these mid-century vernacular dwellings, the wide-eaved roof ends at the mid-point of the 2nd floor gable end windows. This building has very little ornamentation other than the low peaked cornice above the multipaned door.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE Explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community.

This residence was owned from 1870-1912 by Simon N. Henry. Henry was a wheelwright and made wagons in a shop on this property.
