This 2-story, gable-front-and-wing residence features wide eave overhangs, frieze board trim, a side hall entry and plain trim around the door and window. A l-story enclosed porch was probably adde in the early 1900's.

The residence was owned in 1855 by the Noble family. E.F. Roberts is shown as the owner from 1870-1912. He served as a Selectman from 1886-1890.
