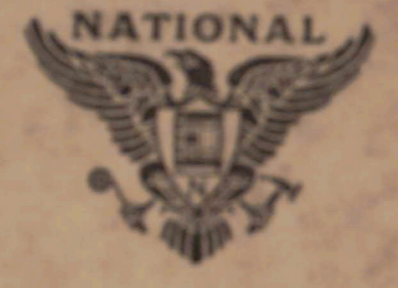

Motion carried to make Dr. E. D. Whedbee life deacon. Trustees E. C. Malone, R. W. Oliver, W. M. C. Taylor, Ernest Lively, Samuel Woodson, Jas. Lively. Report received, nominees elected. Chorister, W. S. King - accepted; Supt. S. S. J. E. Harris, accepted. Treasurer, J. C. Owens. Clerk Amah Wilson. Accountants Dr. C. W. Snyder, V. S. Cooper - accepted.

Louisville, Ky. January 28, 1923.

Officers of Plymouth Congregational Church on above date with C. C. Malone presiding. Meeting opened with prayer led by Rev. E. G. Harris.

Minutes of annual meeting were called for and clerk failing to have same was ordered to bring them to the next business meeting.

Report on flats was called for and pastor reported nothing new since the annual meeting.

Old business was called for, there being none the body dissolved and Rev. E. G. Harris was chosen temporary chairman. Mr. C. C. Malone was unanimous choice for chairman and Mr. King was appointed to escort newly elected chairman to his seat.

Chairman made a very interesting speech expressing his appreciation of honor shown in unanimous choice and having a king as escort. He pledged his best efforts for the welfare of the church.

A plea was made by the pastor for business methods in conducting the affairs of the church. He suggested as a basis for efficient work:

Officers who want a Congregational Church.  
willing to spiritually interest and entertain every member; officers who want to serve with a view to a larger, stronger church; officers willing to sacrifice ability, time and money; officers willing to make and back church programs; officers willing to study the national program and observe the same; officers willing to attend all services of church.

Motion to appoint a committee to draft rules and regulations for government of board, carried.

Payment of bills was ordered. Checks were given to pastor and sexton and organist for January salaries amount \$134.50. A bill for printing annual report was ordered paid.

Chairman appealed to circles to be prepared to report work as an inspiration and suggestion of new work to others.

Superintendent of Sabbath School reported a large attendance but a scarcity of teachers. A young men's class had been formed which gave promise of being a large and useful asset. Pastor reported flats clear of debt and a balance of \$97.18 on hand. \$1520 was turned over as net proceeds of an entertainment. A motion to use balance in treasury from flats to clean and repair church was carried.

Moved and second bills of month be paid carried. Bills: Conference dues 2<sup>00</sup>¢, Coal, Dinner and roofing. Secretary was instructed to write an order for same.

Chairman of building committee asked for names of additional members. Cong'l circle gave Mr. Luther Harris. Other circles failed to give name of chosen representative.
