The Office of Minority Affairs organized in 1976 is an expansion of the former Office of Black Affairs which began in 1969. Within the University structure, the department reports to the Vice President for Academic Affairs/Minority Affairs, Dr. Joseph McMillan. Charged with the overriding mission of improving minority relations for all within the University, the department has the following goals:

- To foster and facilitate harmonious relationships among individuals and myriad groups in the Uinversity community (students, staff, and faculty)
- To ensure equal educational opportunity for all in the University community
- To ensure nondiscriminatory access to the University and its many programs for all, regardless of race, color, creed, sex, national origin, or religious preferences
- To coordinate the design and development of specific academic and cultural programs for minorities
- To assess patterns of minority recruiting and retention in university units and initiate action to improve those patterns
- To coordinate the design and development of training programs for minorities
- To coordinate the activities of the boards and councils serving in advisory capacity to the Office of Minority Affairs
- To maintain liaison with civil rights and community service groups outside the university
- To accomplish these goals, the department is organized into two major components. They are:
- 1) Academic Services Program
- 2) Cultural Development Program

Our Community Bears His Name In Memoriam To Harvey Clarence Russell



One of the greatest tributes to man and especially to an educator such as Harvey Clarence Russell is to dedicate an institution of learning to the name, the memory and the accomplishments of that man.

Harvey Clarence Russell was born in Bloomfield, Kentucky, June 7, 1883. Educated in the public schools of Kentucky in early life, he later received his A.B. Degree from Simmons University, a Master of Education Degree from University of Cincinnati and did further graduate work at the Universities of Miami and Chicago.

Mr. Russell taught in the Louisville Normal School from 1913 until 1924, training many who later became teachers in the Louisville Public Schools. He was Dean of Kentucky State College from 1931 until 1937. He was President of West Kentucky Vocational Training School, President of the Kentucky Negro Education Association from 1917 to 1922, a director of the National Youth Administration and served one year in the Department of Education, in Washington, D.C.

Mr. Russell was an organizer of the Domestic Life and Accident Insurance Company and the Standard Building and Loan Association. At the time of his death, September 21, 1949, he was Business Manager of Simmons University.

While President of K.N.E.A., Mr. Russell worked successfully for the accrediting of Negro High Schools and the re-organization of West Kentucky Vocational Training School. Also, the P.T.A. was established as a part of K.N.E.A. in Kentucky, the Inter-High School Athletic Association was established and the Moon-Light School Movement won national recognition.

All six of Mr. Russell's children graduated from the school named in his honor.

Legacy from Mary McLeod Bethune:

"I leave you love—I leave you hope—I leave you the challenge of developing confidence in one another—I leave you a thirst for education—I leave you respect for the use of power—I leave you faith—I leave you racial dignity—I leave you a desire to live harmoniously with your fellowmen—I leave you finally a responsibility to our young people."

Since 1877 this has been the thrust of Plymouth. Plymouth Church was organized in the fall of 1877 from a group of people who earlier in the year left the Old Center Street Church following a pastor, a certain Rev. Mr. Martin, whom they loved. At first the name "Congregational Methodist" was used. Then hearing about "Northern Friends" who would help them financially if they became Congregationalists the Methodist part of the name was soon dropped. Worship services were first held at a location on Jefferson between Ninth and Tenth. Later a beautiful old synagogue on Jefferson above Preston was purchased and the church prospered under the leadership of Rev. Snell and his successors, the Rev. Smith and George M. McClellan. The latter served very effectively for a while, but after several years prospects for growth seemed discouraging and the building was sold with the idea of disbanding. But the church would not die. The faithful members would not give up, and soon, like the early Christian Church, were meeting in a little upper room over a lodge hall on Broadway near Ninth Street. With the help of a white missionary, Mrs. Evans, who came during the time of Rev. Snell, the life of the little group continued. Their pastor was the Rev. William Johnson, who later went to our church at Lexington.

In 1891 the American Missionary Association sent the Rev. E. G. Harris, a recent Howard Divinity School graduate, as pastor. He found the little group at the Ninth and Broadway location without means and with little promise, but full of faith and hope that a real church might be developed. After a few years Mr. Harris persuaded the American Missionary Association to purchase a little plot of ground on the corner of Seventeenth and Chestnut Streets. A small structure was built which later gave way to a conventional frame New England Congregational Church which served as a place of worship until razed for construction of the present edifice in 1929. After his first eight years Mr. Harris was advised to quit as a Congregational Church was a hopeless proposition in Louisville, but with his faithful wife by his side to encourage and a small group of loyal members, including Sister Annie Letcher, Patsy Haney, Charles Jones, William Phelps (first Sunday School superintendent), Elizabeth Simmons, Mrs. Worthington, Mary Smith, James Chipley, John Young, Logan Peterson, and William Bell, he set his face agaisnt this advice and stuck to the job. Later a former schoolmate, Dr. E. D. Whedbee, (first chorister), became a faithful worker. The membership increased to 114 in 1904 and 174 in 1908.

His effective work among domestic workers and successful activities among children soon won for the church and Rev. Harris many outstanding friends of both races and the church grew. Plymouth Settlement House was conceived in 1911 and erected in 1917 to house these activities and further extend the services of the church to its community.

A few years after World War I, Mr. Harris wrote: "The most urgent need is a new building in which to worship, the present building being a small frame structure built many years ago, and altogether inadequate for the growing congregation."

Together with a group of friends of both races and church officers Mr. Harris began planning for a new church building.

The first \$500.00 was raised in 1924. By the end of 1926 a total of \$11,141.99 had been raised. This rose to \$14,545.17 in 1927. An intensive campaign was launched in 1928 which brought the total collected and subscribed to \$47,099.24, and the architect was put to work on plans for the new building. The Congregational Church Building Society gave a grant of \$7,000.00 and made a loan of \$7,000.00 and members subscribed the balance of \$3,900.76 to erect a beautiful edifice costing \$65,000.00.

Dedicatory Services in the new edifice were held the last Sunday in November through the first Sunday in December, 1929, with services lasting throughout the week.

There was only a \$7,000 mortgage on the new building. The future looked bright and the interest with small principal payments were made regularly, but the depression deepened and it became increasingly difficult to raise scarcely enough to meet current expenses. Progress toward paying off the mortgage was at a standstill.

After forty-five years of fruitful service the Rev. E. G. Harris passed to his reward on December 10, 1936. One month later came the unforgettable 1937 flood. And the church entered eleven critical months without a pastor. However, a faithful remnant rallied under leadership of Edward A. Rogers, Chairman of the Deacon Board, and his partner, Clarence Young. Regular services were continued with visiting ministers filling the pulpit along with deacon Thomas M. Bond.

Early in September, 1937, the Reverend Theodore S. Ledbetter, Dean of Men and College Minister at Tillotson College, Austin, Texas, accepted a call to the pastorate and commenced services on the first Sunday in November of the same year. Many old members returned and a large number of new members was added. New interest developed and a warm spirit of fellowship and cooperation was manifest.

On September 28, 1938, significantly ten years after the first great campaign, the church met and organized a "Debt Clearance Campaign" headed by the following committee: G. D. Wilson, Chairman; James Bryant, V. L. Cooper, J. Everett Harris, Sallie F. Lively, C. H. Morton, Atwood S. Wilson. These were ably assisted by the following lieutenant canvassers: T. M. Bond, F. A. Cabell, R. M. Crume, W. B. Daniel, Jr., Edith Emerson, F. Louise Matthews, Louise R. Montgomery, F. N. Shelton, Byrdie Snyder, W. A. Tisdale, Maxine Whedbee and Rosa Wise.

Pledges were rapidly solicited and payments began. Practically every member gave in amounts ranging from \$100 down to \$5.00 and within the year \$2,223 was raised and paid the Church Building Society, which in turn gave a grant of \$2,000, leaving an unpaid balance of \$1,130 upon which there would be no interest charge for five years. Subsequently, successful bazaars in 1940 and in 1941 netted enough to pay off the balance.

Following the Mortgage Burning Celebration, December 14, 1943, we designed our program to vouchsale to Eternal Word and at the same time meet wartime needs. Many members are serving at the war front; others do the bit at home.

A Golden Anniversary was held October 3, 1943, for Mary Smith, Bertha Whedbee, Rachel D. Harris and Clarent Young, who had served for more than fifty years as members.

Our membership has grown to 377. The Boards and auxiliaries are active. Finances are on a sound basis. The charity, missions and service, together with the sacred worship of God and a warm fellowship with all who tone truly make this "The Community Church for Community Needs."

PASTORS AND THEIR COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT

The Rev. Mr. Everett G. Harris was the first pastor in the present edifice. He was responsible for erection of the Plymouth Settlement House (now known as Plymouth Urban Center). One of the main reasons for this building was to a home away from their place of employment. Mrs. Annie Rowan was the first matron. Rev. Harris was Superinvegetable gardens. Higher educational goals were encouraged and all graduates were recognized. His personal friends of God for people.

There were many other highlights during the pastorate of Reverent Harris. He organized the church membership into circles each of which in some way reflected Congregationalism. The seven circles were Beecher, Congregational, annual bazaars, boat picnics and moonlight rides up the Ohio involved all members as well as many people in the community. These affairs were a source of pleasure as well as a financial gain.

Plymouth purchased property surrounding the church making it possible for people in the neighborhood to have decent places to live.

Rev. Harris's wife, Mrs. Rachael Davis Harris was truly a pastor's wife. She stood beside him and supported him in for all services including Sunday School and Wednesday night prayer meetings. Along with her duties as organist, Mrs. Harris taught the Women's Adult Bible Class every Sunday morning.

When the new church was erected and a pipe organ installed, her position as organist was taken over by Miss Nannie Board. Mrs. Harris was then the first Black city librarian.

Their son, Everett, was a teacher and an attorney. He also served the church as a choir member and in many other capacities.

The Rev. Mr. Theodore S. Ledbetter came to the church from Tillotson College, Austin, Texas in 1937 as our pastor with his bride, Orelia. At this time the pastors of the church were also the Superintendents of the Settlement House. The surrounding community made extensive use of the Settlement House, and it was described as "bursting in the seams." These were the war years and the young men going into the armed forces kept a high patriotic feeling in the church. Many in the church and the city recall the Junior Church when young people of all ages from the Sunday afternoon. Even though his wife, Orelia was raising two of their three sons, she worked with him in the Junior endeavor. Various groups of the church and members visited the Veterans' Hospital and facilities. He served from 1937-1947.

The Rev. A. D. Pinckney was a Congregational minister before he came to Plymouth in 1947, and served uni March 15, 1966. He and his wife, Thelma, saw a community need and established pre-school nursery classes that metathe Settlement House. A camping program for young people flourished. Young people from the church with their add leaders attended out of state camps sponsored by the Congregational Churches. Touring groups from our norther churches made annual visits to Plymouth on their way to southern schools and churches. Cultural exchange visits across states and locally by members, youths, and adults. The Urban Renewal in the "West End" was of concerespecially its far reaching implications. During his pastorate the Men's Bible Class of the Sunday School flourished a some of the men were never church members. In 1957 the first church merger of Congregation and Disciples occurred Another merger with E & R Chuches took place and a new name was added-United Church of Christians. Reverei Pinckney was the first moderator of the Kentucky-Indiana Conference. Mrs. Pinckney sang in the choir.

The Rev. Dr. Benjamin Berry served the church from June 1, 1966 to July 7, 1968. He and his wife, Link sang in the choir. While he was a student, he had served as a volunteer social worker during the summer in Boston Massachusetts. The Settlement House was still an extention of the work of the church; and as his concern to especially with young people, he sponsored activities that kept the Settlement House filled with young people.

The Rev. Mr. Jonathan N. Robinson came to Plymouth February 16, 1969, and his pastorate ends November 1 1977, when he goes to Boston, Massachusetts. His community outreach has been through River Region, the program that help the troubled and disturbed. His community contacts have been far reaching. For afternoon cultural program the Presbyterian and Lutheran churches have been visited by the minister and choir. His services as a counselor we never restricted, available to any in the community who requested his help.

Reverend Jonathan N. Robinson, moved through local and national scenes, was appointed commisioner on the Human Relations Commission by Mayor Harvey Sloane; served as Chairperson, Plymouth Urban Center; Alcoholis Council of Louisville, Board of Directors; appointed by the Honorable Governor Julian M. Carroll to The Task Fore on Education, Commonwealth of Kentucky; Chairperson, Advisory Board of Emergency School Act Advisory Committee (ESSAA) Special Projects, system-wide Jefferson County Board of Education; Board of Directors for ALPHA (Activ League for Physically Handicapped); Member, Citizen Liaison Council, Jefferson County Board of Education, Consultar and Advisor to Superintendent Ernest Grayson; selected by peers to testify before U.S. Senate Judicial Sub-Committee on busing; President, West End Ministerial Alliance; Executive Director, Alcohol Abuse Services, River Region Mental Health/Mental Retardation Board; Program Officer, School of Business and Economics, University of Kentucki (O.M.B.E.); Panelist, Moral Side of the News, WHAS TV and Radio; Called to be Senior Minister, St. Male Congregational Church United Church of Christ, Boston, (Roxbury) Massachursetts. Rev. Jonathan N. Robinson was a exciter, renovator, builder and public relations man.

Rev. Robinson's wife, Ethel, has worked very hard and effectively with the young people in the church, stimulating their involvement in all church activities. Organization of the Young Adult and Children's Choirs has include participants that are not members. One of the most successful community involvements was restoration of the Bible School when over 50% of enrolled children came from the neighborhood. Another highlight was the International Te which netted over \$3,000 to renovate the entire lower auditorium. Mrs. Robinson has worked side by side with the pastor, attended all meetings pertinent to the church with him, was a member of the choir, member of most church

organizations, and worked for the success of any endeavor at Plymouth.

MUSIC

Musical programs, recitals, community choruses had their beginning with Mr. George McClellan. Under direction a public appearance at Leiderkranz Hall at Sixth and Walnut was given to help with debts for the church He had attended Fisk University, and he was a believer in good music for cultural benefit. Dr. Charles W. Snyder No. a chorister with musical ability. Dr. E. D. Whedbee sang as well directed the choir. Dr. Dan Lawson, a produ of Fisk University, served as chorister until he joined an Episcopal Church. Mrs. Nannie Board Crume who was a high school music teacher, was both organist and choir director for many years. Mrs. R. Lillian Carpenter, a music superi in Louisville Public Schools, was a director who brought in young soloists to augment the choirs, and the able organi was Mrs. Gertrude Wilson. A relative of Mrs. Crume who served the church in the music department was Mrs. Mrs. Eliza James Smith a graduate of Xavier University. Mr. Anthony Mayfield, a trained musician, was both organist at choir director, and choirs made public appearances on TV. Mr. Thomas Moxley developed a youth choir. Miss Shere Bentley served as director of youth. When the elected organist and director Mrs. Joetta Perkins was absent, Mil Alyce Holden and Mr. Wiley Daniel, Jr. also served as organist substitutes.

Mrs. Perkins has trained the choirs to lead the congregation in singing a spiritual, "Lord Make Me More h as a postlude to the service. This a cappela rendition, sung after the benediction, is an effective and impressive per

of the worship service.

There have been many beautiful voices in the choirs, but worthy of mention is a mother and her two daughts They were Mrs. Edna Hughes, deceased, her daughter Mina, deceased, who directed a children's choir, and Mo Abbey Hughes Fife who is presently servicing and training the small children. These children sing once a month Youth Sunday. Posted in the back of the hymnals is an original poem by Mrs. Ida Mai Whedbee, deceased. "Fath in Heaven" is sung by congregation and choirs in response to pastoral prayer

Philip Harris has always been a staunch member of the church as his mother brought him to church as a baby and he has been in regular attendance ever since. Nothing has ever kept him from coming to church. He has always willingly offered his services to any group that was having anything at the church. He can be dubbed "young Mr.

Plymouth."

Contributions-Individual and Collective-of Early Member of Church-Organizations, Commemorative Windows, etc.

Through a portion of the pastorate of Mr. Ledbetter the church membership was divided into circles. There came into being the Congregational Service Club (known as CSC), whose purpose was to be of service to the church and the community. There was also the Guild-Mrs. Henrietta Payne was instrumental in encouraging young members of the church as the then "Missionary Society" stalwarts were passing on. This was before the days of the Women's Fellowship, and the current trend (not fully adopted here) is that all groups no longer be restricted as either male or female. As a church member for sixty years and a consecrated deaconess, everything about the church was her concern. She was a frequent letter writer to the editors of the daily newspapers. Mrs. Payne had three daughters and two sons. Each of them were dedicated members of Plymouth. One daughter, Georgia J. Baughman, served as a teacher in the Sunday School. It was her pleasure to bring children in her automobile every Sunday. This continued until her illness and death in 1967.

A Patrician of the church was Mrs. Mary E. Wilson. Fifteen of her living relatives are current members of the

The family of Mr. Elias Wilson has three daughters still living who are members of the church. They worked in every capacity in the church. Mrs. Mary W. Crenshaw is still a teacher of the Ladies' Bible School Class and is an efficient and interesting leader. This family for sixty years made the Easter Crosses-sometimes as many as four hundred or more for the Morning Service.

The Mrs. Susie B. Schaeffer (who made communion bread) has relatives who are still members. Her son, Louis B. Schaeffer, (now deceased) when he retired came to the church as custodian. It was a labor of love for the church.

Mrs. Mary Stanford (deceased deaconess) gave a silver bowl to be used before the serving of communion.

Dr. Charles W. Snyder gave the baby grand piano.

Mr. Clarence Young willed shares of stock to the church.

Mrs. J. B. Speed at the time of building the church gave the pipe organ. She was not a member, but a benefactor to both church and Settlement House. Also Mr. Samuel Moon gave \$5,000.00 cash.

A church member, Mr. Ellis Whedbee, (deceased) was selling air conditioning, and gave his commission to the church. He was the son of Dr. Whedbee; his mother was Mrs. Bertha Simmons Whedbee; and his grandmother was the Mrs. Simmons who was one of the early members.

Mrs. Rachel Harris and her sister-in-law Mrs. Molly Ricks gave the church property on Oldham Street.

Mrs. Sylvia Harris and friends gave the loud speaker in the lower auditorium. It is installed so that services and music during worship can be heard throughout the church.

A devoted couple, Leonard and Laura Smith gave dishes and the lights on both lecturns. After her death an ongoing scholarship was established in her name.

Mr. R. Marcus Crume, a former member of the choir, made and gave the wooden screens in the choir loft.

Mrs. Lillie Graves, (deceased) long time president of the Missionary Society, helped to meet the unmet needs of the church.

The Guild was responsible for the furniture in the pastor's study, additional carpeting, Christmas decorations, and decorations for other special occasions.

Years ago the C.S.C. equipped the kitchen and paid for cabinets (made by Mr. T. H. McNeil). All of those things were worn out and the kitchen was refurbished by the church. Many individual contributions remain unidentified. Various church groups over the past few years made a three thousand dollar contribution to the Plymouth Urban Center when it had to have a new roof and also installed air conditioning.

As younsters, Cassie Wilson Bryant (deceased), and her sister, Mary Wilson Crenshaw, daughters of Elias Wilson, sold lemonade on the boat rides to make money for the church. The members of the Western Union Bank (augmented church members) gave their services, and many unheralded women cooked and baked to make every affair a success. The bazaars held in the Settlement House were a city wide event with a stage for performers, and decorated booths like a "fair." Also held were the annual boat rides, picnics, and the Fall Bazaar-when Mr. George Bullock (deceased) was still employed he always had a booth. To honor him in his last days the C.S.C. used a compilation of some of his poems as a Christmas remembrance to church members.

The men of the church who gave years of service to the Scouts were Atwood S. Wilson, deceased, son of Mrs. Mary E. Wilson, Mr. Irvin St. Clair, deceased, Mr. James Bryant, deceased, Mr. Horace Wise, Mr. Thomas Moxley, Carlos Fish and many others. The daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Clifford Williams, Miss Ann Ruth Williams was a paid director of the girl scouts, and Mrs. Maxine Whedbee was a volunteer leader as were others. (See the many Boy Scout trophies in cases in lower auditorium). Mr. Frederick Hines, N active church member, came into the church because of the scouting programs when he was a youngster.

Members extend the church into the community through the American Red Cross as volunteers and blood door. Mr. Kirby M. Hall has given over 11 gallons of blood to the Red Cross. Church members supported 17/76 the achievement funds for Black colleges, who were give financial assistance by the national body of U.C.C. Mr. Carl Hines was a member of the city and county school boards. Mrs. Mae Street Kidd is a member of the Commonwealth of Kentucky Legislature, and has been re-elected several times. Jessie P. Warders has served as Director of City Sanitation Department. John Leake is a member of Toastmasters and Cora Henderson Willis is a member of Toastmistresses.

Dr. P. O. Sweeney (deceased), a church member, filed the suit that "opened" the public parks and golf links. The suit of Mr. Lyman Johnson opened University of Kentucky and other educational institutions. City builded codes made the old wooden "flats" obsolete. The new apartment building now faces Plymouth Court, instead of Rest Alley. The name changed to Plymouth Court by ordinance of the Aldermen of the City of Louisville, and Mr. Charlotte Coffee knew what it did to school chilren to give their address as "alley."

A five hundred dollar scholarship is made to the church by Mrs. Lois Morton Williams with the stipulation is a high school graduate of this church is presented each June as a memorial to her father, Mr. C. M. H. Morton.

The Stained Glass Windows

It is generally agreed that few, if any, of the features of a church sanctuary add more to its beauty than stain glass windows. Plymouth Congregational United Church of Christ is no exception. The windows of Plymouth never to be admired by first time visitors to the church and are a source of pride to the members.

The church pews face the south while the pulpit and choir seats face the north side with its entrance doors. The is a large painted window in the wall behind the large aisle which separates the seats of the youth choir and sent choir. This window also overlooks the baptismal pool which is concealed except when in use. The painting is a Christ kneeling in prayer. It is a familiar one and makes Christians feel at home in the sanctuary.

The windows were sold to members of the church from the time of the completion of the building. Some owner had names printed at once on the blank space of glass at the lower part of each window for that purpose. Other identifying names were put on by failies or friends in whose honor the windows were purchased at the time of death.

No names have thus far been placed below the large window on the south side of the building. Church member however, know that it was purchased by the Harris family. The Reverend Everett G. Harris, first pastor of the church who raised most of the funds which paid for the new edifice, lived only a few years after its completion. He died 1936. His wife, Mrs. Rachael D. Harris was organizer and teacher of the Adult Women's Bible Class of the Sunda School. She worked for many years as assistant librarian of the Western Branch Library of the City, and later as a head librarian until her retirement. She died in 1969, having lived to be a centenarian. The only offspring of the and Mrs. Harris, Attorney J. Everett Harris, was the possessor of a beautiful baritone voice, and sang in the church choir. He graduated from Fisk University and received an M.A. Degree in English from Harvard. After teaching to few years at Central High School, he returned to Harvard where he received the L.L.B. Degree. As a student both I Fisk and Harvard he traveled with singing groups. He practiced law in Louisville until his death in 1957.

The eight windows on the east and on the west sides of the church are grouped into four pairs, and are sconnected that they resemble four come shaped double windows. Only the first two windows on each side deposition of the west side of the church, the first shows Jesus knocking at a door. Under the painting are in names of Mary Smith and Annie Letcher. "Sister Mary," as she was affectionately called, was a member of the ward group which met from house to house before a pastor was called. She also lived to be a centenarian. A large picture, her hangs on the wall of the entrance to the lower auditorium. Mrs. Letcher's membership seems to have begun a later than that of "Sister Mary" though she was an early worker in Plymouth. She is remembered not only as a devoke church woman, but also for her culinary skills which she so generously used on fund raising occasions.

The second part of the first pair of windows on the west side is dedicated to the Young and Bland families. Me Artie Young and Mrs. Adee Cable were the Bland sisters. The former was the wife of Mr. Clarence Young whose fath was also a member of the original group that later became Plymouth Church. The painting of this window should be a support of the Good Shepherd. He is holding a lamb in his arms and others stand nearby. The names of the Youngs at the Cables recall devoted church workers. Mr. Clarence Young, long a trustee of the church, was a postman died in 1950.

The first window of the east side shows Jesus ascending toward Heaven. Below it is the name "Cathem Woodson." This, the first window to be sold, was bought by Mrs. J. B. Speed, who employed Mr. and Mrs. Woodson She became interested in Plymouth church through the Woodsons and was a great help in fund raising for the rechurch. The purchase of this window in honor of Mrs. Woodson was a well deserved compliment to a fine woman at one good Christian from another. This faithful member of Plymouth died in 1958.

The second half of the first pair of windows on the east side, which shows an angel ascneding Heavenward, as purchased by the Elias Wilson family. Mr. Elias Wilson, father, died in 1921; his wife Mrs. Alice Wilson in 1947. They had six children, three of whom are also deceased. They are Sidney Wilson, who died in 1920, Walter Wilson in 1962, and Mrs. Cassie Wilson Bryant in 1972. Members of the family have contributed much to Plymouth through the years. Mrs. Armah W. Banks, Mrs. Mary Ellen Crenshaw, and Mrs. Cassie Bryant have sung in the church child Mrs. Banks, a former elementary and junior high school teacher, has served as Sunday School teacher. Mrs. Mrs. Mrs. Wilson Crenshaw who served a while as matron of female residents of Plymouth Settlement House succeeds.

Mrs. Harris as teacher of the Adult Women's Bible Class and is also a deaconess of the church. Mrs. Alferna Wilson Bryant is a regular attendant of the above named Bible Class and of the C.S.C. Club. She is the mother of a fine son.

The remainder of the windows on the first floor are of pale yellow glass mingled with white and are bordered by solid pale green glass. Each is decorated at the center with various objects of biblical significance such as musical instruments, a crown, etc.

Turning to the second pair of windows on the west side, window number three was purchased by Miss Lillian Hauser, now Mrs. Marshall, in memory of her sister, Miss Lottie A. Hauser who died in 1957. Miss Hauser as well as a younger sister who left the city, shared her beautiful alto voice by singing in the Plymouth Church choir. Miss Lottie Hauser taught in the Booker T. Washington School and in Plymouth Sunday School. She contributed her share of work to promote other church activities.

The adjoining window on the west side, number four west, was dedicated to the memory of the first born daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Tate, young Olive Mae, who died at a tender age. She was truly one of God's little Angels, whom he lent briefly to this world.

Window number three, or the first of the second pair of windows on the east side was of joint ownership. It records the names of Mr. E. A. Rogers, Catherine Johnson, and the Congregational Circle. Mr. Rogers was a devout deacon, a circle leader and one of Plymouth's most loyal members. He was head custodian at Central High School for many years. He died in 1953. The second name on this window is that of Catherine Johnson, a young mother of three children. She is remembered for her regular church attendance and her faithful work in the Congregational Circle. The third name on that window is that of the Congregational Circle, and represents the action of a loyal group willing to help defray this part of the church expense.

The next window which is the second half of group II east was bought by the widow and daughter of William B. Matthews to be dedicated in loving memory of the latter who died in 1940. Upon the death of his wife in 1957, the name Ophelia B. Matthews was added. The Matthews were transferees from the First Congregational Church of Atlanta, Georgia, and moved to Louisville after Mr. Matthews became principal of Central High School. Always very active in Sunday School work, he organized and taught a Men's Bible Class in Plymouth Sunday School. He served as a deacon in the church, and, upon the opening of Plymouth Settlement House, became the first Chairman of its Board of Directors. Mrs. Matthews was active in the Women's Missionary Society and served as its Secretary for several years.

The first half of the third double group of windows (the fifth window) on the west side was dedicated to Mr. E. C. Malone, a faithful trustee and later a deacon of Plymouth who died in 1930. He is remembered as a fine Christian gentleman.

The second window of the third pair (or the sixth window) on the west side was purchased by Miss Carrie E. Alexander in memory of her mother, Mrs. Sidney Alexander. Upon Miss Carrie's death in 1946, her name was placed on the window below that of her mother. Mrs. Sidney Alexander must have been a very fine woman to have had three such good daughters as Misses Belle, Emma and Carrie Alexander. Miss Carrie Alexander who taught English at Central High School was known far and wide for her kindness and generosity. A graduate of Fisk Unifersity, she aided countless young people with funds for their education there and elsewhere.

The first of the third pair of the windows on the east side was purchased by the two daughters, now Elizabeth Bright Alexander, and Mrs. Lillian Nixon, and the now deceased son, Mr. Andrew Irwin Bright, in honor of their parents Dr. and Mrs. Andrew J. Bright, and their infant sister Wilhelmina E. Bright. The Bright family moved to Louisville in 1919 when their father opened Bright's Pharmacy in the then new Pythian Building. Dr. Bright was among the pioneer Negro pharmacists in Louisville. The family suffered a tragic loss of their third daughter and fourth child in 1929. Dr. Bright followed in 1940, and Mrs. Wilhelmina Bright his sweet and soft spoken wife in 1958. Son Andrew followed in 1973.

The second half of windows group III east was bought by Mr. R. Marcus Crume in honor of his lovely wife, Mrs. Nan Board Crume, who died in 1955, after serving as organist of Plymouth Church for almost twenty years. She was also assistant choir director. A graduate of Howard University, she taught music at Central High School, and was one of the school's most beloved faculty members as well as one of Plymouth's favorite people.

The first half of the last window on the western side of Plymouth had multiple purchasers. It includes the names of Albert Smith, a trustee, William and Mary Foster, and the Puritan Circle. Mr. Smith, who died in 1930, represented one of the oldest Negro business firms in Louisville, The Guy W. Smith Movers and Packers, of which his father was founder. Mr. Smith lived within a half block of the church. He and his wife, Mrs. Linnie Smith watched Plymouth grow and liked what they saw. Hence, they joined the church and became good members. Mr. and Mrs. Foster were a dedicated couple, never too busy to help Plymouth projects. They lived within five blocks of the church and were always available for service. He died in 1930.

The Puritan Circle was composed of a group that just wanted to help. Hence they invested in the last third of his window.

The second half of the west window number four was the last available. The church voted to purchase it in honor of the late Dr. James Bond after his death in 1929. Dr. Bond, a graduate of Berea and a former Congregational Minister had been of invaluable aid to Reverend Harris in contacting several persons who contributed liberally to the Building Fund of Plymouth Church. At the time of his death he was serving as Director of the Interracial Commission and had definitely helped improve local race relations. Last but not least, his late son, Thomas, was a member of Plymouth. The family of the latter, Mrs. Thomas Bond, and children, and out of town members of the Bond family often worshipped at Plymouth when in town, so the last window on the west side bears the name of Dr. James Bond.

The first half of window number four east was given in memory of Mrs. Beulah Haskins Bolan who died in 1960, by her son Edmund H. Bolan, and her daughter Mrs. Lucy Bolan Wise. Mrs. Beaulah Bolan was a pioneer worker in

establishing the service of visiting teachers in the Louisville Public Schools. She taught for a while in Smith Grow, Kentucky and later became a librarian serving first in the City of Louisville Free Public Library system, and later a school librarian at Central High School until retirement. She was a loyal and active member of Plymouth Church to

many years until illness prevented her attendance.

The last half of window four east was given by Mr. Louis Schaefer in honor of his mother, Mrs. Susie B. Schaefer who died in 1943 and his sister Mrs. Essel Schaefer Wilson who succumbed in 1933, and both of whom were devot members. Mrs. Schaefer, a quiet, soft-spoken woman, served on the deaconess board for many years. Her daughts Mrs. Essel S. Wilson, a Fisk University graduate was married to Mr. Atwood S. Wilson, a former teacher of science at Central High, later principal of Madison, now called Russell Junior High, and later still of Central High. To the union five daughters were born. One later joined the church of her husband, another left the city, but three remain members of Plymouth, and two of these three are married to officers of Plymouth. (One to a trustee, and the other to a deacon). Mrs. Susie Schaefer was the first of five generations, three of whom now attend Plymouth Church.

The north side of the church boasts one window which is back of the seats in the church balcony. When the late Mrs. Edith Emerson nee Garrott, a YWCA executive in Chattanooga, Tennessee came to Louisville as the bride of the late Dr. J. A. Emerson, she joined Plymouth Church. She was so impressed with the one remaining window behind the balcony, she bought it in honor of her deceased parents. She later became a deaconess. The names of her parent "Curtis and Mary Garrott," remain an inspiration to all who see them. What more beautiful tribute could she have put to her parents?

A final observation is that many persons who were honored by having their names on the church windows a were donors have served as church officers.






He bestows upon us His holy spirit, creating and renewing the Church of Jesus Christ, binding in covenant Faithful people of all ages, tongues, and races.

The Plymouth Congregational Church, 630 West Chestnut Street, Louisville, Kentucky, assembled on January 20, 1971, in a regular church meeting and approved by a majority of the members present and voting the following resolution:

We, the members of said congregation, do hereby commit said church to fully support the Plymouth Apartment project. To this end we are willing to make available the church's resources and the congregation's efforts to ensure the successful construction and operation of this apartment project and the successful discharge of the apartment owner's obligations under the mortage. We are willing, ready, and able to raise and supply the funds for any necessary preliminary costs leading to a successful mortage loan. Furthermore, we instruct the Board of Trustees of this church to select necessary legal counsel, architect, contractor and management team and to monitor, and if necessary correct, the quality of their work. We instruct the Trustees, not only now but through the life of the apartment mortage, to use all reasonable means to assure the prompt payment of the mortgage until it is successfully discharged. We further instruct the Trustees to transfer to the Plymouth Redevelopment Corporation, which has been formed to construct and operate the above apartment project, the necessary land owned by the church on which the apartment project is to be located.


