


"It was rewarding to see the results of months of hard work," continued Maura. "I think all who came enjoyed themselves."









Students Allied for Gender Equality

S.A.G.E. was an organization for women and men that actively worked to promote equal representation, opportunities, and rights for both sexes, mainly for women. April Boulton held the first meeting for students interested in fighting sexual discrimination as a response to incidents that occurred on Centre's campus. At midnight on April 9, S.A.G.E. sponsored a candlelight vigil on the steps of Olde Centre in protest of the tens of thousand rapes of Bosnian women by the Serbian military. This was the climax of a week's events to draw attention to the issue. Members wore black ribbons of dissent and circulated petitions that were sent to Congress and the United Nations to make rape a documented war crime. S.A.G.E. invited more female speakers to talk about diversified topics. Projects also included improving campus security and establishing a selfdefense class as a P.E. class.

CENTRE COLLEGE CHOIR

Members of the student body, faculty, staff, and community were the sensational songbirds that composed the 1992-1993 Centre College Choir. Directed by newcomer David Schildkret, the choir worked on a number of projects of vocal prestige. The choir was heard at both the opening convocation and at commencement. But far more impressive was the choir's two mid-year performances.

At the Columbus Day Concert, the College Choir, along with Centre Singers and Women's Voices, performed a number of songs to celebrate the quincentennial anniversary of the discovery of America. Toward the end of Spring Term, the choir rehearsed for their performance of Verdi's Requiem with the Louisville Orchestra in May. Performances were held in Louisville as well as at Centre College. We look forward to the continued success of the Centre community and Danville community efforts in the coming years.

S.A.G.E. held its first retreat at faculty advisor Dr. Mykol Hamilton's house. Topics focussed on feminist issues, but canoe and hiking trips were also taken. S.A.G.E.'S 1993 Officers were April Boulton, President; Tiffany Clark, Vice-President; Kimberly Brunk, Treasurer; and Jennifer Olvey, Secretary.



The Interfraternity Council, more commonly known as IFC, was very successful during the 1992-1993 academic year. During the Fall term, IFC, together with the Panhellenic Council and the college's administration, jointly signed the Statement of Mutual Responsibility. This document outlined the roles of the Greek organizations active on campus. Also during this time, IFC sponsored its annual Smoker, which brought out over fifty men interested in rushing a fraternity. As the term ended, talk of the new Greek park spurred the selection of the site of each new fraternity house.

It was also the time for formal men's rush preparations. The week directly following Christmas Break was designated as men's Rush Week. Approximately 130 men rushed this past year and 115 men actually pledged a fraternity.



Panhellenic Council



The Council also was active in the pursuit of better inter-sorority relations, as well as with the fraternities.

This past year Greek Week, Junior Panhellenic, Panhellenic Dance, All-women's cook-out, and Rush team sweat-shirts were among the major accomplishments of the Panhellenic Society. 



Phi Beta Kappa

The Phi Beta Kappa Society honors achievement in the liberal arts. It was founded by students at The College of William and Mary on December 5, 1776, making it the oldest academic honorary organization in the United States. In 1779 the Society voted to authorize the founding of branches at Yale and Harvard, which followed in 1780 and 1781. More branches soon were established; by 1876 some twenty-four had been founded. Women were admitted to membership starting in 1875. Originally the Society was a secret organization, but this stipulation disappeared by the 1840s, and today its initiation ceremony is open to the public.

As of 1991 there were 242 active chapters in the nation. the presence of a Phi Beta Kappa chapter is a mark of special distinction among institutions of higher learning. Centre college, which received its chapter in 1971, is one of the smallest institutions to house a chapter of the Society. Each year students are selected from among the top fifteen percent of the senior class and the top three percent of the junior class. To be elected to Phi Beta Kappa is a signal academic honor. Usually the chapter also sponsors each year a visiting scholar of national repute to address a convocation and conduct several classes. The visitor for the 1992-1993 school year was physicist Freeman Dyson.

Black Student Union

The Black Student Union of Centre College was organized in 1966 and has developed over the years a threefold purpose. It's first objective was to provide social and financial support programs for black students enrolled at Centre. Social support programs involved activities among the group and with Black Student Unions on other campuses. By informing its members of scholarship and summer opportunities for minority students, information which would otherwise not be available, this network of financial support aids in retention of some of the financially pressed students. This was an important program to help students make the transition into the Centre community.

The second objective was to assist in the recruitment of minorities at Centre. The organization believed that true education and empowerment cannot take place in an isolated environment and realized the importance of multiple perspectives in educational pursuits. The BSU hoped to increase the number of minority students by targeting schools and college fairs.

The third and final objective of the BSU served educational purposes as a functioning student organization of the college. Membership within the group was not exclusive to blacks and other minorities. All students were welcome in an effort to work together for the betterment of race relations, Brotherhood-Sisterhood, and Black History awareness. Most activities of the BSU were funded by Student Congress and sponsored in conjunction with other organizations. Securing speakers, films, and documentaries were used to encourage discussion about relevant concerns and how they relate to individuals, the College community, and the nation.







The 1992-1993 Residence Life staff was selected last Spring after participating in the RA Roulette and interview process. The staff has benefited from the experience and expertise of 21 returning members, and from the new ideas of 20 new staff members this year.

In August, the Residence Life staff continued an intensive week-long orientation which helped to prepare Resident Assistants in areas such as: community development, wellness programming, peer counseling and making referrals, assertiveness, diversity issues on campus, stress management, liaison between students and staff, and responding to problematic situations. Members enjoyed getting to know one another better through some unique activities. The staff adopted the theme of "risk-taking" for the adventures ahead of them in the coming year.

In the months that followed, RA groups presented wellness-related topics at all staff meetings as part of their continued training. Throughout the year, RAs tried to meet resident needs and interests through creative wellness programming. Students had opportunities to attend events such as cookouts, resume workshops, self-defense sessions with the Danville Police Department, pizza parties, hall movies, a variety of sex discussions with Allis McLaughlin, Sunday Dinners, tea parties, Christmas and birthday parties, tailgate parties, and self-esteem seminars.

In the Spring of 1993, the current staff assisted in the selection process of next year's staff. At the RA Roulette, the RAs conducted small group exercises and then observed/evaluated candidates' potential effectiveness related to the Resident Assistant position. The Resident Assistants and Residence Directors worked well as a team in the year marked by the transition of Nancy Lackey from Director of Residence Life and Counseling to Dean of Students.











Studying Psychology

The academic side of Centre College is extremely demanding and the importance of these endeavors are realized by all. Research projects are popular in all academic divisions at Centre. Through these projects students gain academic knowledge with hands-on experiences outside the classroom walls.





Intrafraternity Council, Peer Counselors, RA, CARE, LIFT, and Habitat for Humanity as well as many other academic and social organizations.





Four Freshman had stellar performances. Michael Stempkovski won the shot put with a throw of 46 ft. 4 in. He also placed second in the discus with a personal best throw of 147 ft. 6 in. Chris Garrett won the Men's Long Jump with a distance of 21 ft. 9.5 in. Trevor Ray won the Men's Triple Jump with a school record leap of 45 ft. 1 in. and also placed second in the long jump. Matt Krug pole vaulted 12 ft. 6 in. for a first place spot and placed sixth in the 100m dash.

Junior Dave McGee continued his winning ways with two second place finishes in the 800m and 1500m. His personal best of 1:56.6 in the 800m will make him a strong contender in 1994.

Sophomore Chris O'Bryan broke a twenty-four year old record in the High Jump with a 6 ft. 4.5 in. leap. He also had memorable performances throughout the year in the 400m dash, 1600m relay and 400m relays. Other notable performances in the SCAC meet was Freshman Rob Johnson's second place finish in the 400m intermediate hurdles.

A predominantly young team, the Centre College Men's Track Team is looking forward to coming years. Provided that the weather is normal and injuries are minimal, the men's track and field team hopes to again contend for the SCAC in 1994.













The Men's Basketball team tied for a share of the Southern Collegiate Athletic Conference championship, the eleventh consecutive season that coach Tom Bryant's Colonels have won or tied for the conference title.

The Colonels were 5-0 in the SCAC before losing in overtime to Millsaps College and by two points to Rhodes College, both at home. Centre later visited Millsaps and defeated the Majors, but again lost at Rhodes College, giving the Lynx a seemingly untouchable conference record of 11-1. 



The talented singing group known as the Hitmen have been entertaining audiences both inside and out of the Centre community for four years. The group's nine members (all belonging to Sigma Alpha Epsilon fraternity) believe that their participation in this group has added greatly to their years at school, as well as to their wallets. During an interview in February, four of the Hitmen answered questions and shared some of their fondest memories of their experiences with the group. Here's what they said:

Ten Questions with those DREAMY Hitmen

Q: How did you get your start?

A: "The original group started out as a quartet during my freshman year," says Troy. "We sang 'You Are My Sunshine' and 'Blue Moon'."

Q: How much time do you spend rehearsing?

A: "If we've got a gig or something coming up, we'll practice every night that week," says Greg. "But steadily," adds Troy, "we have an hour and a half rehearsal every week on Sunday nights."

Q: What have been your most important performances?

A: "Last spring we did a board of trustees dinner for the state Chamber of Commerce at the Beaumont Inn," says Troy. "And that was the first time we really travelled any

distance, and that gig got us the one for the Governor which was our big one."

Q: What was that all about?

A: "That was a state Chamber of Commerce Small Business luncheon and the Governor was the keynote speaker," says Pat. "There's a company in Lexington that organizes conventions ... and when people don't know what entertainment they want, they've got our name and will sometimes call us," adds Troy.

Q: What else has come out of this?

A: "The national fraternity has just started an award for the chapter for singing the fraternity songs," comments Greg, "and we made a tape to send off for the contest, and we won." "And for me," adds Troy, "being a music major, it's been an incredible learning experience, just in terms of how to run a rehersal, how to..." "Teach us how to sing," grins Greg.

Q: Why do you do this--what do you get out of it?

A: "We like the satisfaction it gives the crowd," says Pat. "We like to see the crowd go nuts. It's a rewarding experience to finish a great song." "It's a lot of fun," says Troy. "We're really close; we're really a tight knit group. We hang around together a lot and we get to go different places ... and these places where we go usually feed us. They treat us like kings; it's great! This has definitely been one of the things I hold most precious that I have done here at Centre College, and it's one of the things that I am most proud of." yeah baby!" agrees Pat. Q: And you also get paid?

A: "Yeah," says Troy. "It kind of keeps you going through the low points. "It's great spending cash," comments Pat, "but I have a feeling that if there weren't money, we'd still be doing it." "I agree," says Troy. "But it's really nice to get paid for what you love to do."

Q: So were you all singers in the beginning?

A: "No," says Pat. "None of us have any real music experience, except for Greg and Troy." "It's amazing," interjects Greg. "I was in a barbershop ensemble all through high school and, from that experience, I would have never thought you could take guys from the backgrounds that we have.

But a lot of people have inherent talent, it's just bringing it out that can be hard." "That's the thing that really makes me proud," says Troy. "We've been able to take a group of people with no training and make them sound the way they do."

Q: So how do you find your members?

A: "The way we discovered Damon and Scott was during pledging, because they have to learn fraternity songs and that's an easy way to get a miniature audition. Or a lot of times people will express interest and will come in and sit there and listen to us rehearse, and decide that this is something they want no part of," laughs Troy. "A lot of our brothers don't even know how much goes into it," adds Greg. "They see us get up there and throw down on some-

thing--they see a lot of the fun part. See, I was really worried after high school that I would never ever be in a ny kind of choral setting like I was before, like an a cappella men's group. And I came in and saw them come up from the lift on that opening convo my freshman year and I was just like 'Damn! That's me!' I was ready to join right there."

Q: Any closing comments?

A: "The admissions office loves us. They can ask us to entertain and that's something that's going to stick out in a prospective student's mind. And also, they can ask us questions about the school, about college life, because we're all involved in a lot of stuff--which most Centre students are anyway. The college likes to use us in that way," says Troy. "With the admissions office," continues Greg, "to brag about it, I think they would love to be able to tell people: 'fraternities at Centre are like THIS.'" "It's a real positive light on the Greek system," adds Troy. "People shouldn't look at us as an exception," finishes Greg, "because we're more publicized, and just because our activity is singing and that's in -Sara Pearson '96 the light."

An Imaginative Learning Experience

In reviewing my acting journal entries up to the arrival of Lynn Redgrave, I find one word describes my emotional state at the time-nervous. Each segment involves trying to pick apart my monologue, "Mistress Quickley's" from Henry V, attempting to find a spark that would make my workshop performance really happen. Underneath that search, however, was a fear-a fear of acting for someone whose family is counted among the theater's nobility. In fact, my final journal entry before the workshop reads, "I'm just so nervous about tomorrow. Performing Shakespeare for Lynn Redgrave, the daughter of Sir Michael


and the sister of Vanessa, and a wonderful actress in her own right, has got to be the most intimidating thing I've ever done... I just want to do well."

As it happened, I had no reason to feel intimidated. From the moment she arrived, Redgrave endeared herself to everyone with her friendly, straightforward attitude. She shook hands, hugged the actors, and even jumped into some of the performances. It was a very pleasant surprise to find that someone with her fame and talent can be so normal and "down-toearth."

Actually, performing for her was not as difficult as I had expected. Although concentration was in and out during the first run of the piece, I felt much more at ease after taking her direction. The second time through it felt wonderful, especially when she told me that she found my work "totally believable." To hear those words from someone whom I admire so much was undoubtedly one of the greatest experiences of my life.

The best part of the day. however, had nothing to do with the workshop. Glancing at the program for her performance, I noticed that one of my favorite Shakespearean monologues, "O! For a Muse of Fire," was included in the show. When I mentioned to her how much I love the piece, she regretfully informed me that she had been forced to cut it from her performance because of time constraints. That night, though, she put it back in-TWICE!




