Delta Tau Delta; Miami University, '26, '27; Honor Roll, '27; Track, '27, '28.

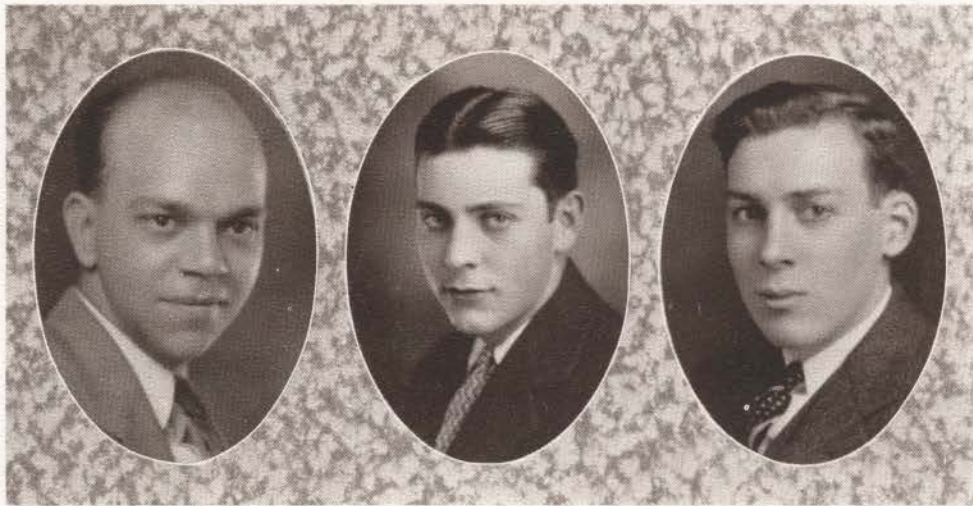

## Junior Class History



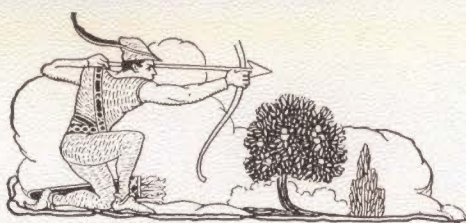

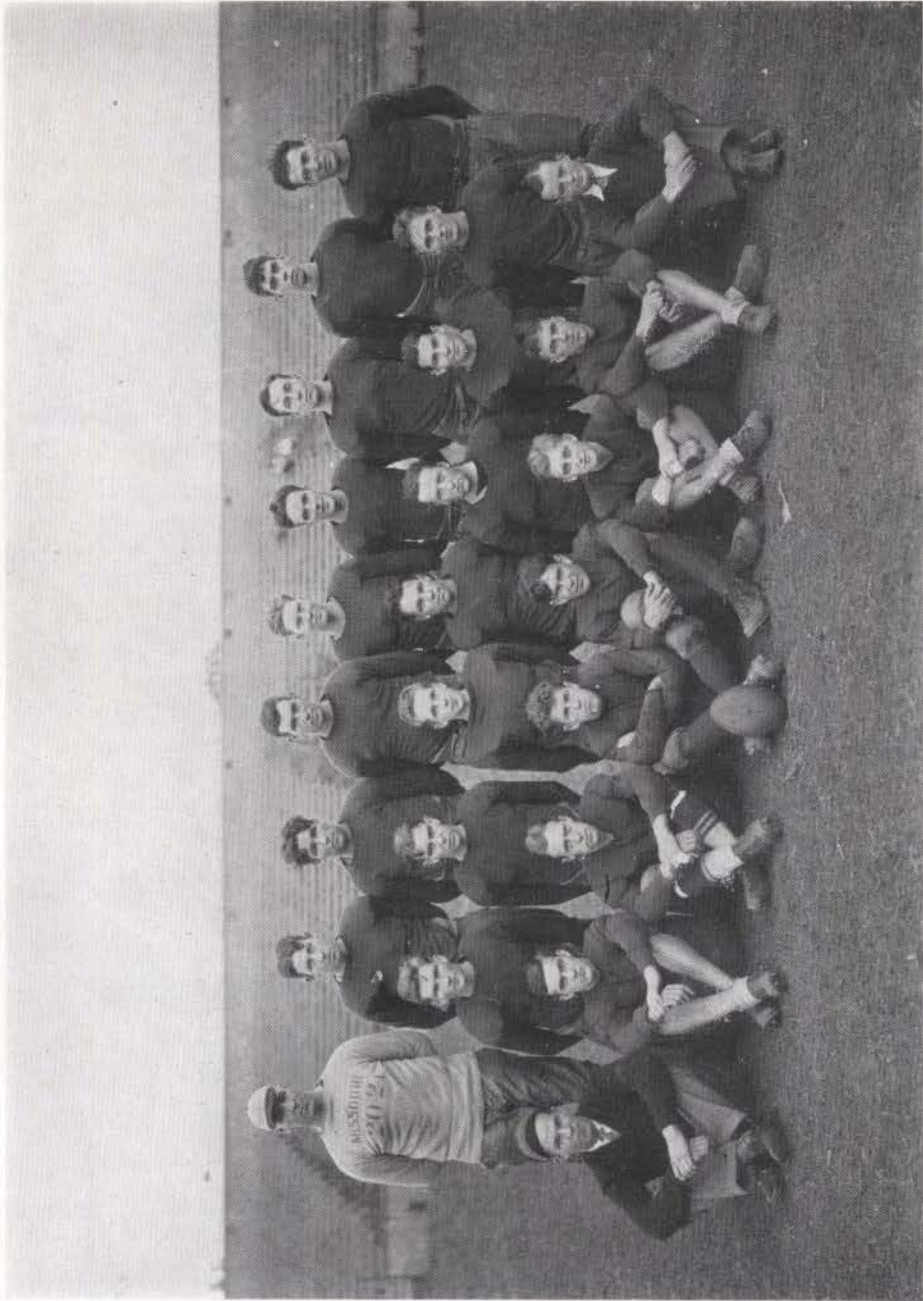
The team, composed mostly of inexperienced men and facing a too ambitious schedule, carried on nobly and deserves the commendation of all supporters.

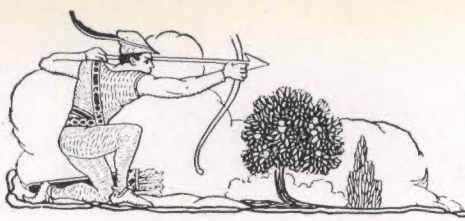
Under the guidance of Edwin Kubale, who is to be Head Coach next year, we may expect the Colonels to find themselves and regain their lost laurels in victory after victory.

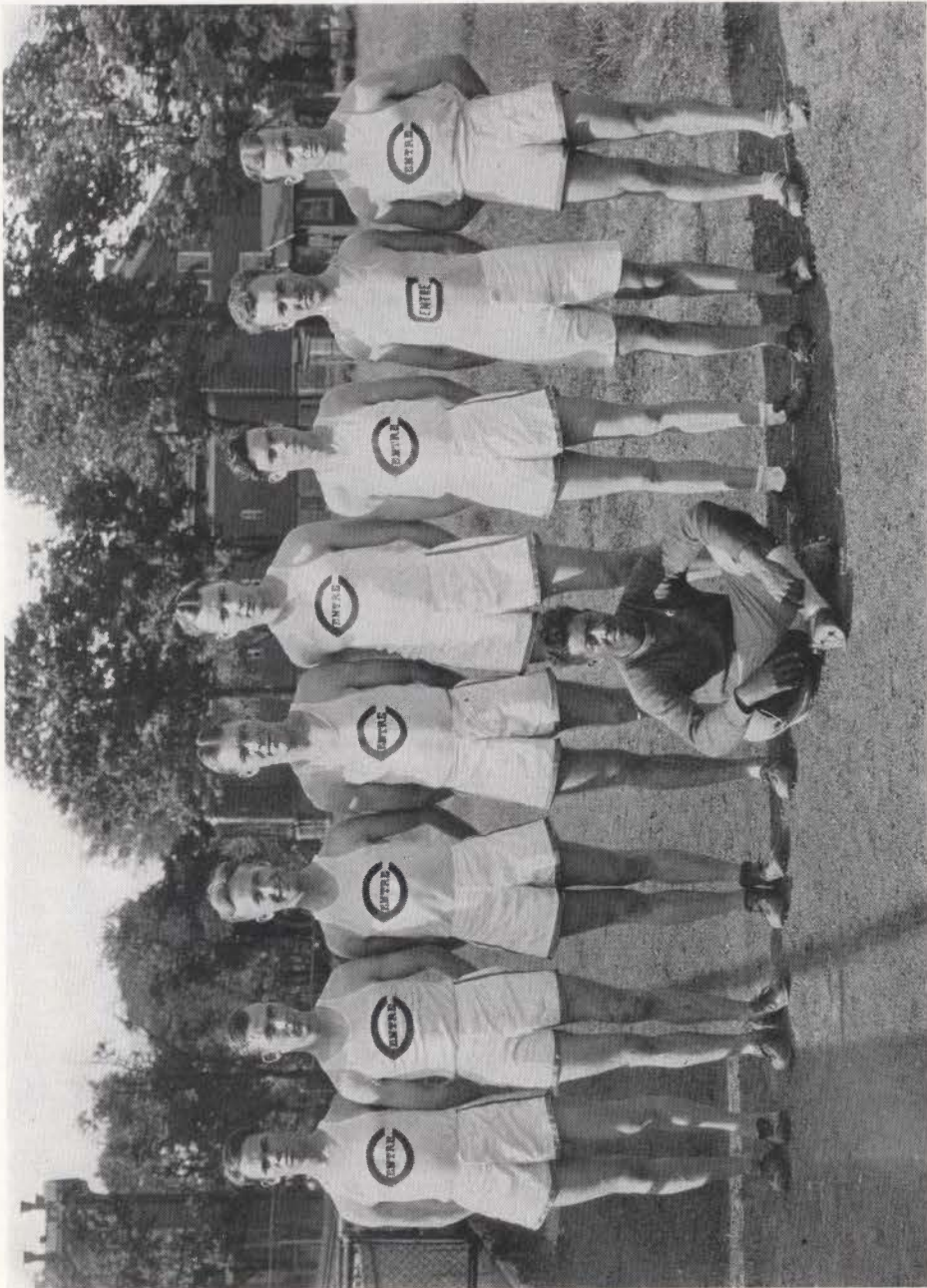

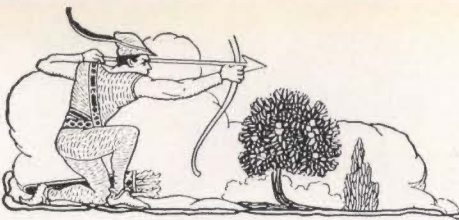
Red Thompson, captain of the team, made a remarkable record, by playing fourteen full games and made but one error.
