

Sunday saw two contestants participate in the Spring Sing on the steps of Olde Centre.
























Colonels snap 13-game



ALTHOUGH THEIR 3-6 record may not indicate it, the Centre College football team had a highly successful 1974 regular season campaign.




Colonel runners win Invitational



Their 4-5 CAC record was good for a fourth place finish. Except for a few points in some crucial games, they could have finished as high as second.





Centre was defeated in the CAC match by the Sewanee Tigers. Bob Luppino and Ken Stewart were crowned individual conference champs.













The team, which has been growing in popularity over the last few years, took a big step by playing some of its games in Alumni Memorial fieldhouse.
