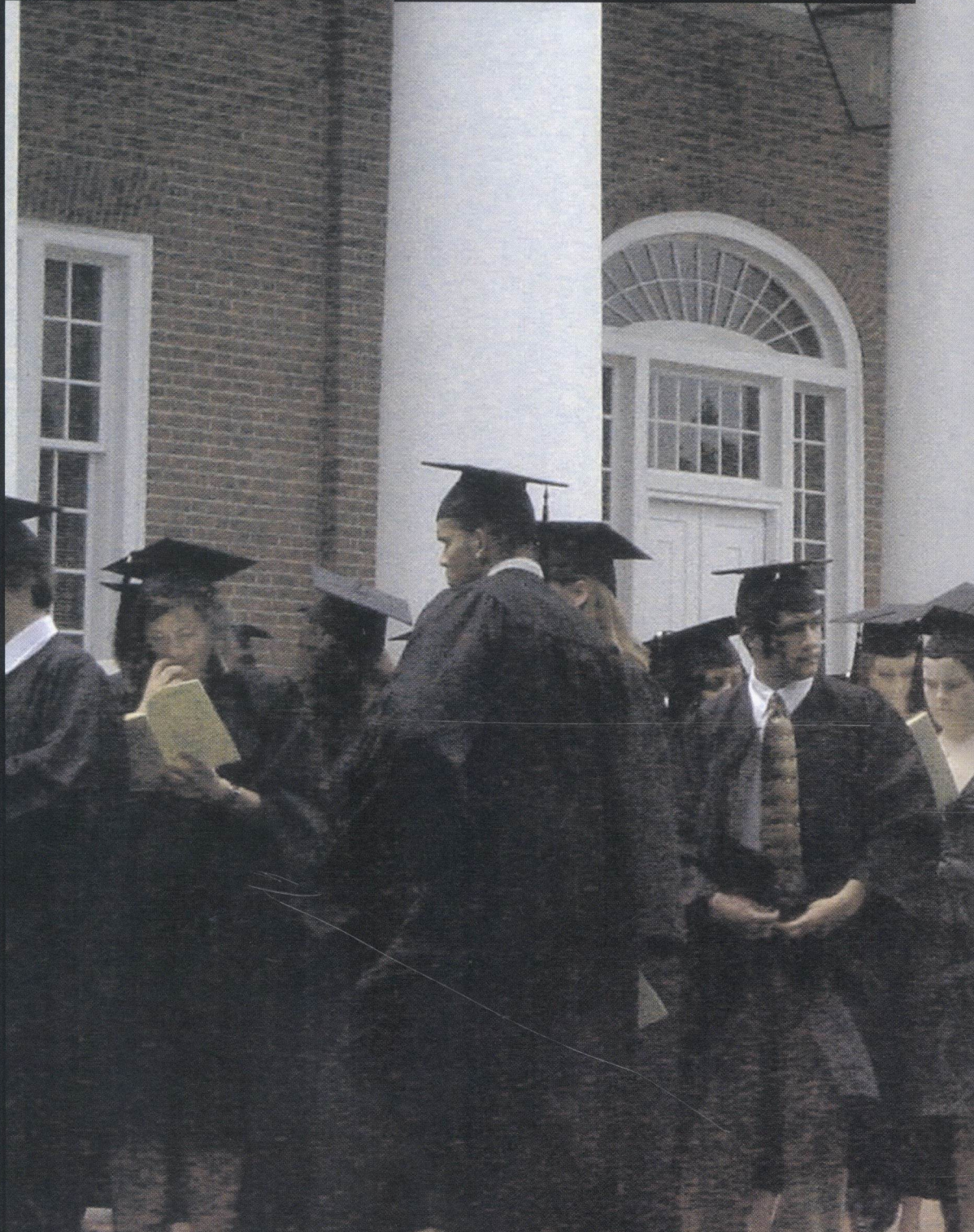
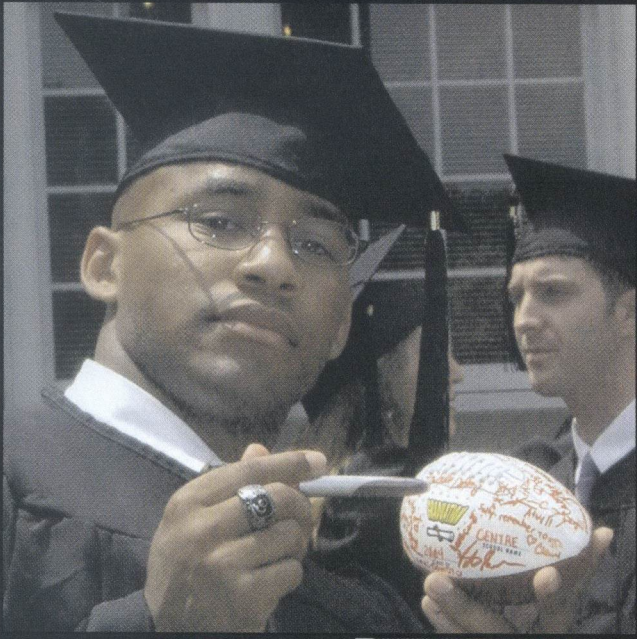
A More Perfect Centre

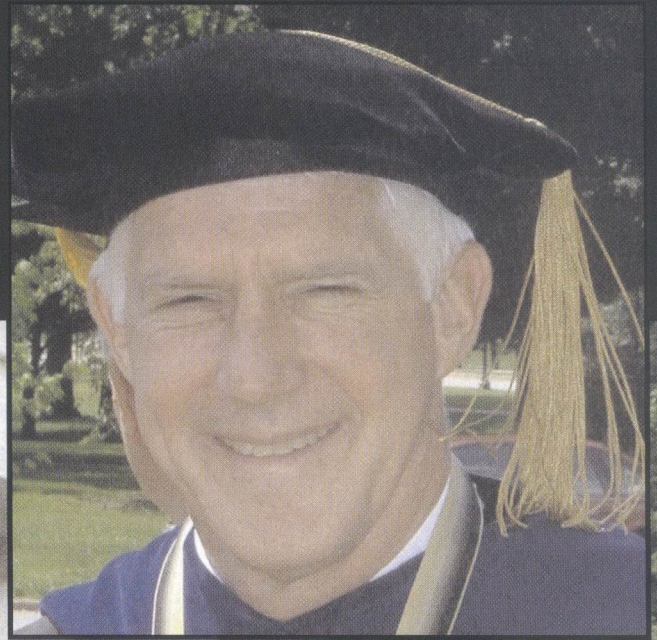


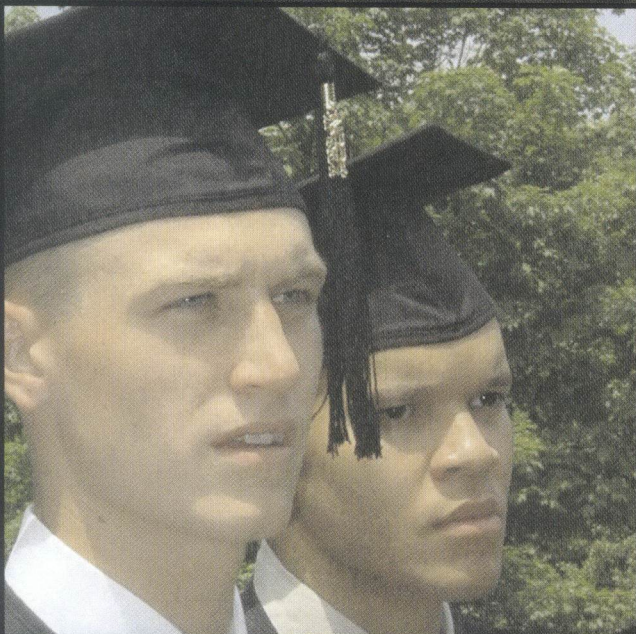
The Grace Doherty Library is receiving an entirely new facade in addition to new classrooms and offices.

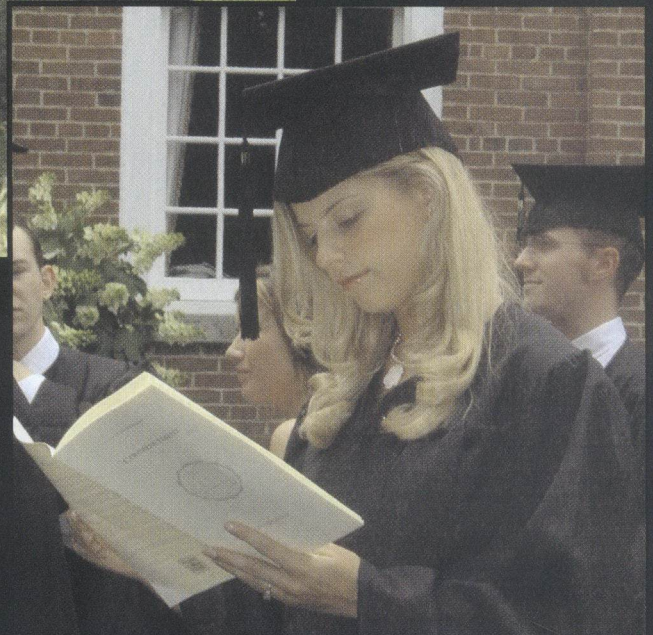
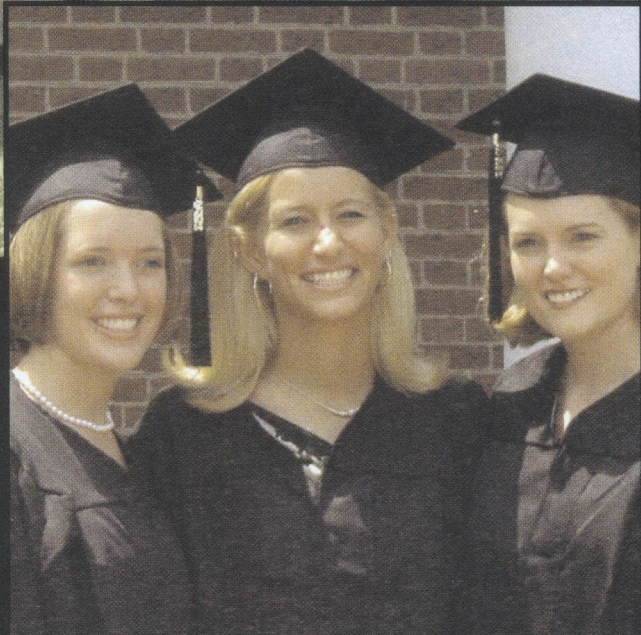

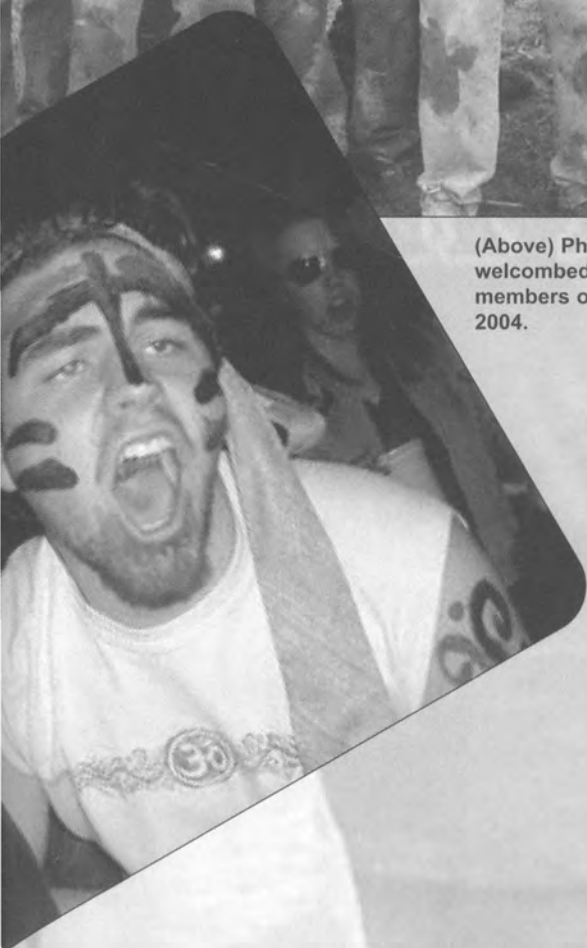

SIGMA ALPHA EPSILON

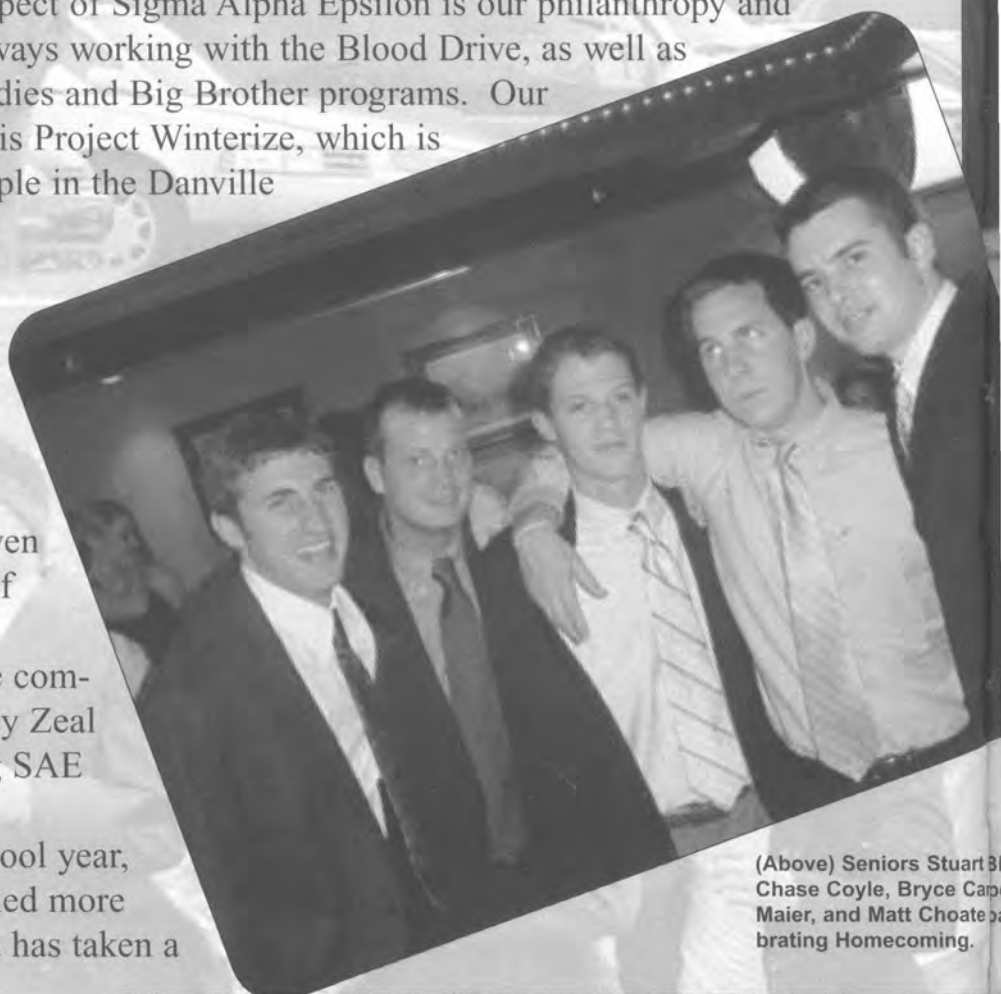

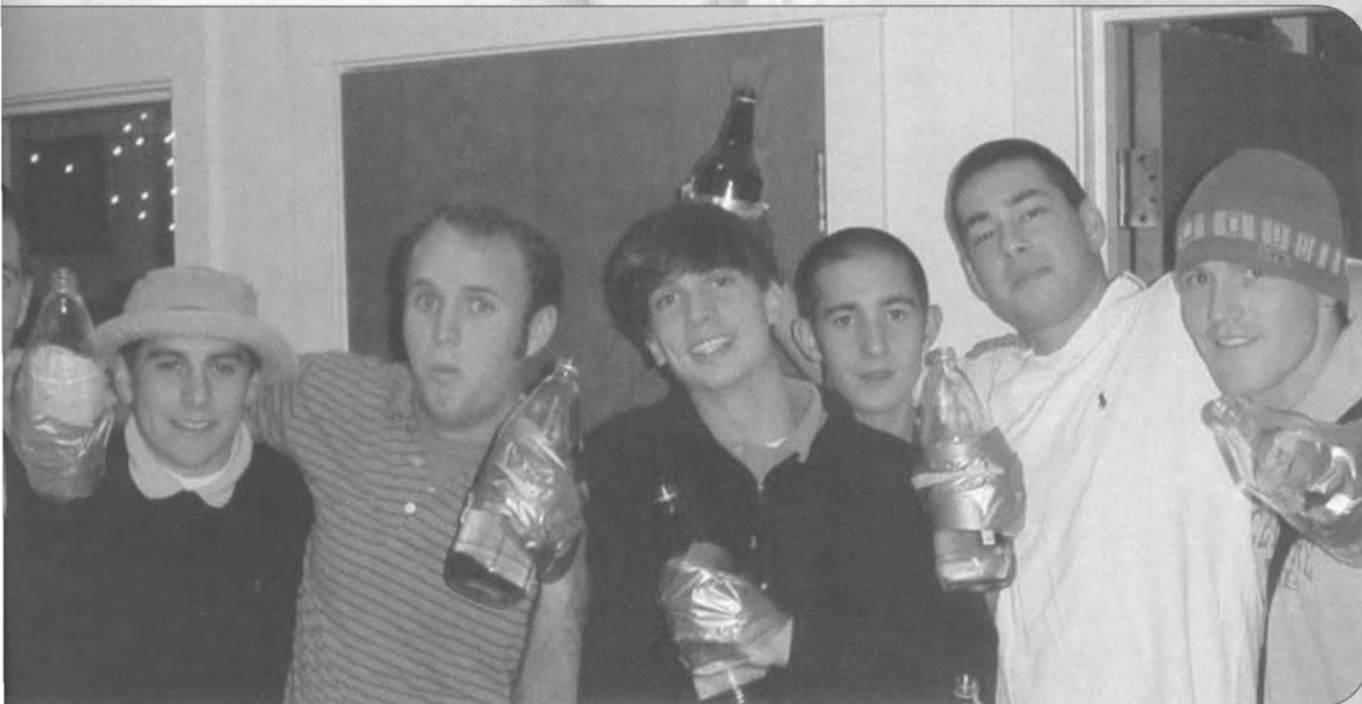

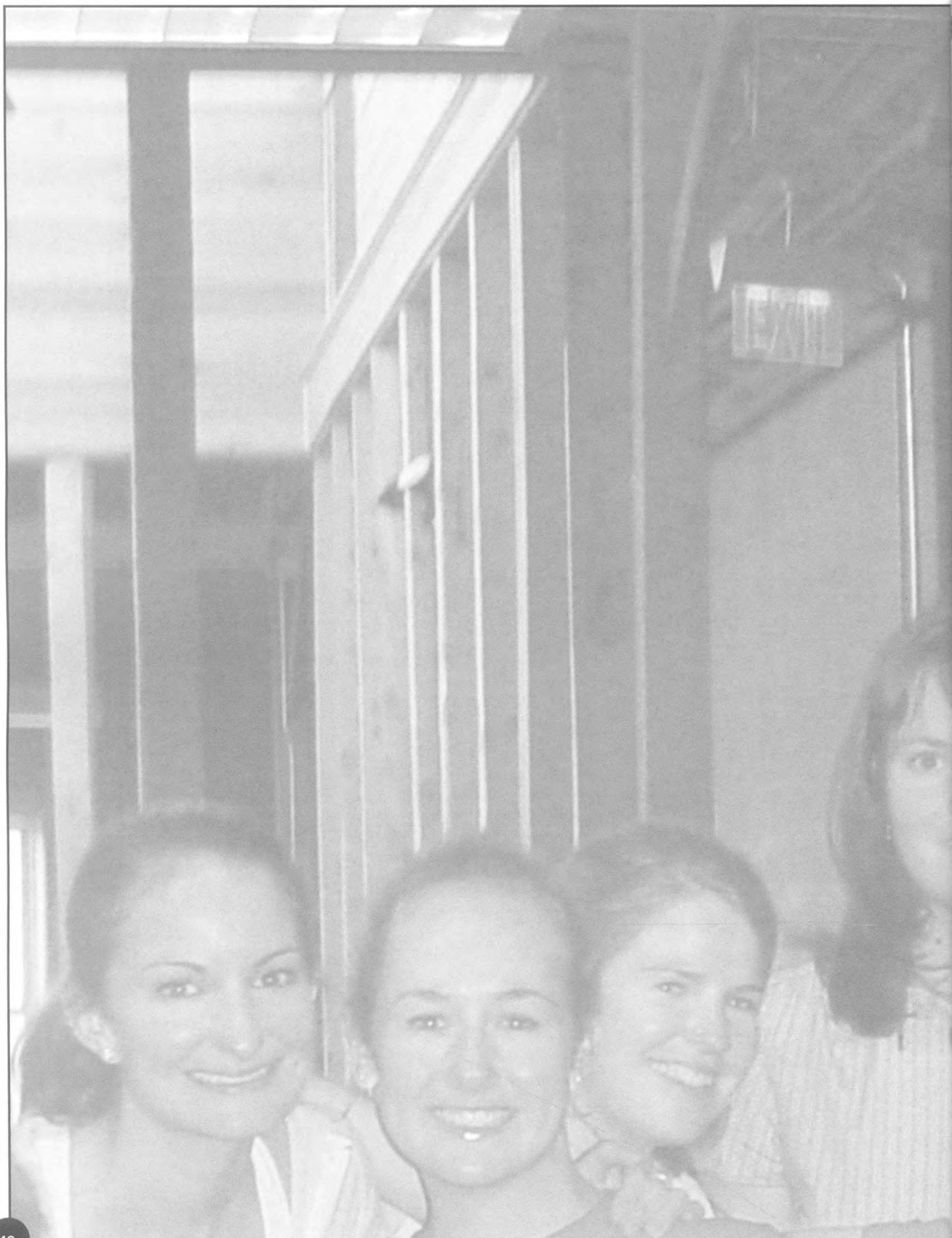

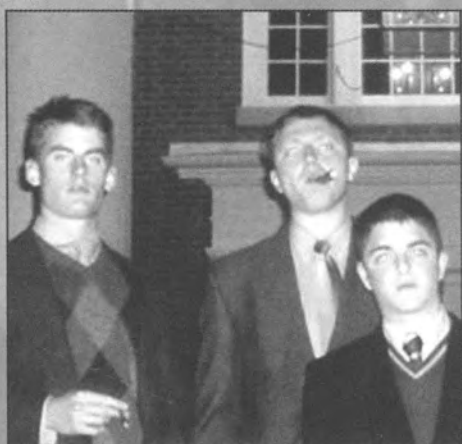

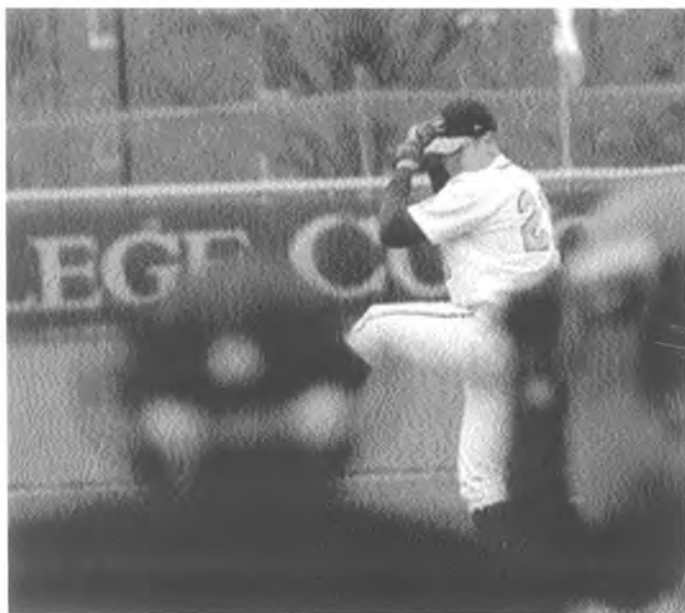

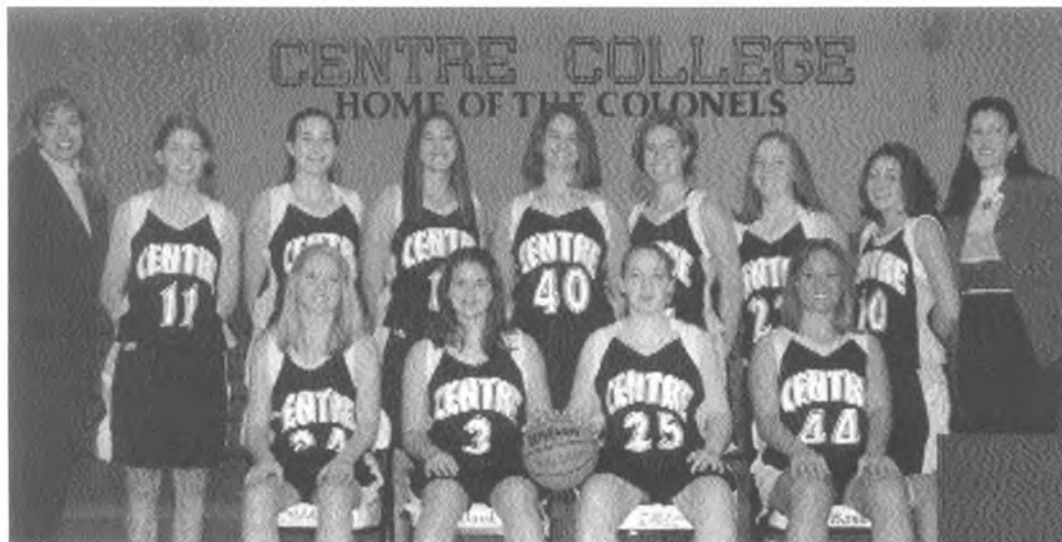


(Left) Freshman Eric Moore prepares to catch the ball in order to tag out a runner.

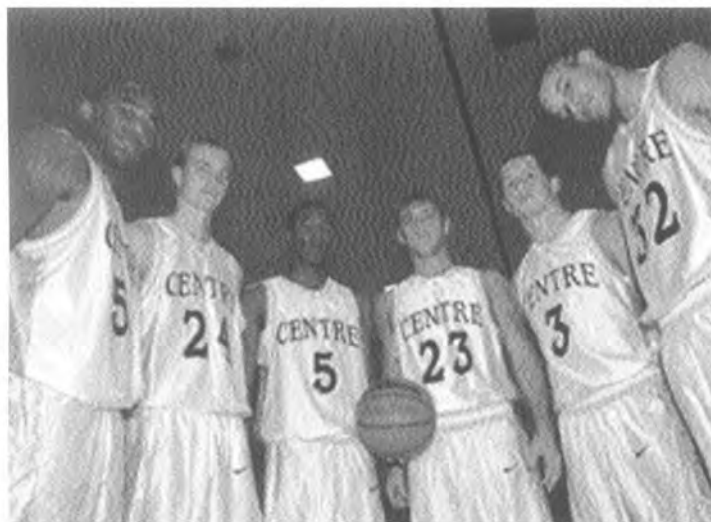

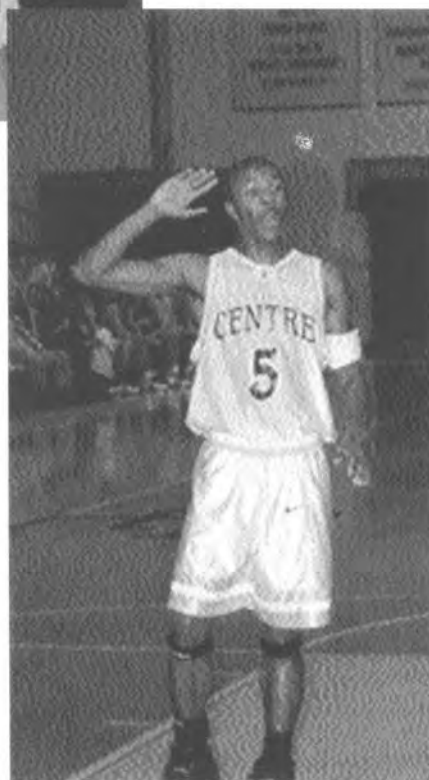

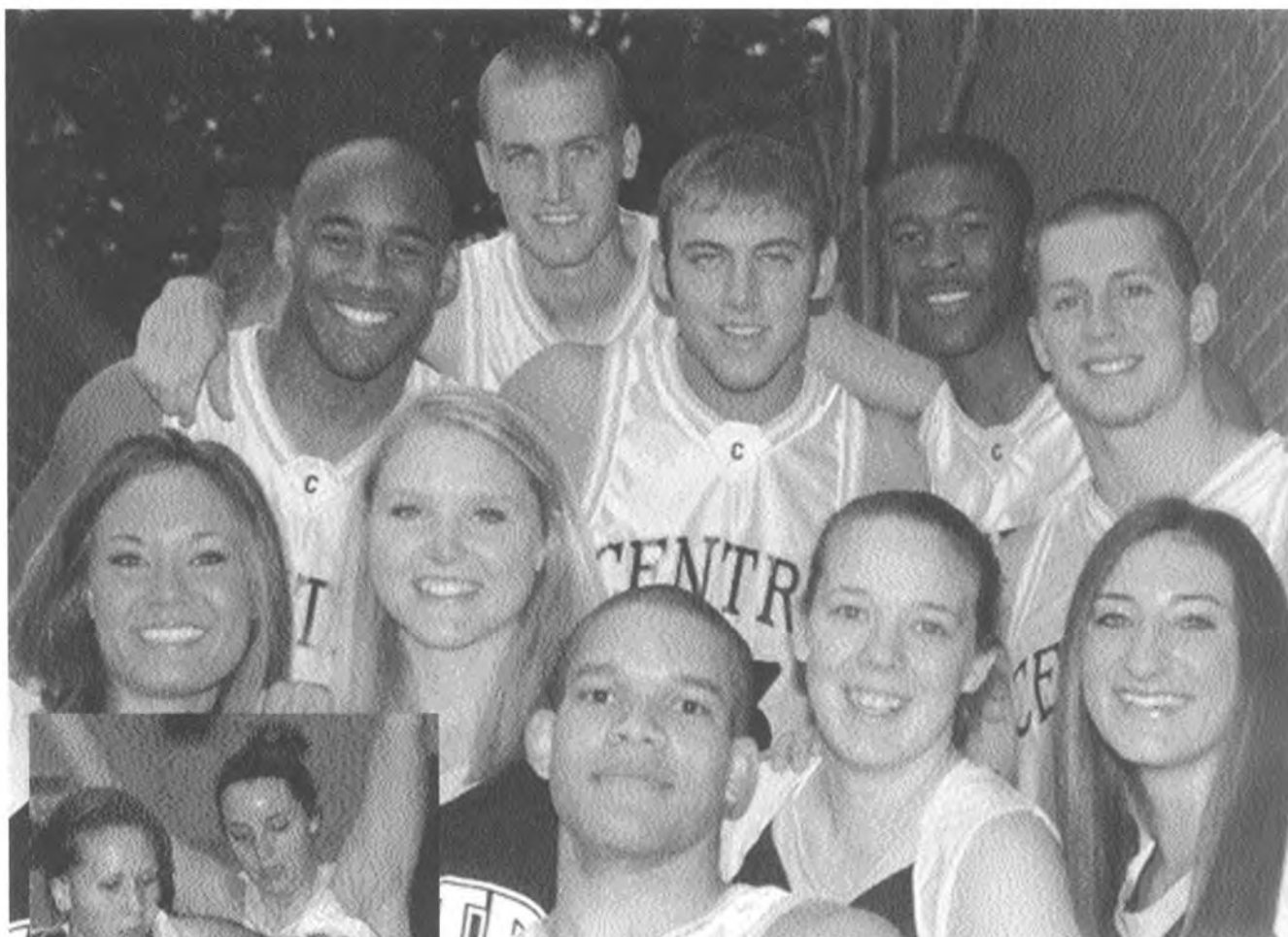

Centre College Cross Country

Fall 2003 was a strong season for the young and talented Centre Men's Cross Country team. The men managed to beat Rhodes and Trinity for the first time since 2000 and accumulated many wins at various invationals. Eight of twelve team members achieved personal best times, two runners made the all-conference team, and two runners made the all-region team.

Senior Colin Muehlenkamp made the all conference team (8th place) and the all-region team (22nd place) while teammate Mark Noll achieved the same feat (9th place) at conference and regional meet (17th place). Both runners had tremendous seasons and shared the Most Valuable Runner award. Freshmen Eric Hack, Andy Newsom, and Anthony Lippert also made their presence felt this season by all consistently finishing in the top six for the team.

The men finished a disappointing 4th (1 point behind Rhodes) at the SCAC Championships, but rallied back at the Regional Championships beating Rhodes and finishing a strong 6th place out of 32 teams (the best Centre men's regional finish of all time).

Fall 2003 was an extremely good season for the Centre Women's Cross Country team. Eight of fourteen members achieved personal best times, three runners were named to the all-conference team (Eileen Schilling, Lauren Arnold, and Kristie Kachler), one runner was named to the all-region team (Eileen Schilling), and one runner qualified for nationals and achieved all-American status (Eileen Schilling).

Freshman Eileen Schilling led the Centre women all season. Schilling broke the school record in the 5,000 meters with a time of 18:40. Schilling also broke the Centre course record (19:03), and the Berea course record (18:53).

The strong performances of freshman Eileen Schilling, sophomore Lauren Arnold, and sophomore Kristie Kachler led the women to a second place team finish in the SCAC Championships. This was the women's best finish since 1997. The women also finished a strong fourth in the region out of 32 teams.

Centre College Field Hockey

The Centre College Field Hockey team had a very exciting season highlighted by eight overtime games-of which two went into stroke competition-and a third place finish at the last KIT Tournament in history.

The Colonels began their season by dropping their first three games to tough competition by Denison University, College of Wooster (1st OT), and DePauw University (2nd OT). The team relied strongly on the play of goalkeeper Liz Lowe (Louisville, KY-Sacred Heart Academy) as many players adjusted to new positions and a new system of play under first-year head coach Tom Hobbs. The Colonels won their first game against NAIA powerhouse Lindenwood University in another exciting over-time thriller capped by the game-winning goal from sophomore forward Jessica Rublein (Louisville, KY- DuPont Manual). The winning ways continued as Centre ran off three more wins in a row defeating Bellarmine University (1st OT), Sewanee (Strokes), and Transylvania University. The streak gave the Colonels a lot of needed confidence, and the realization that they could play with and beat some of the best teams in the KIT conference and the Great Lakes Region.

After a scrimmage with the University of Kentucky Club Team, Centre lost its next three games-Rhodes College (1st OT), Lindenwood, and Sewanee. The streak was broken with a win at Bellarmine University, but picked up again with losses to DePauw and Kenyon College. Spirits were low as the Colonels struggled to find their stride, but one thing that remained constant was their ability to compete. With outstanding leadership from seven seniors, the team decided that competing wasn't going to be enough to reach our goal of winning the KIT tournament.

To end the regular season, Centre played at Transylvania. While the Pioneers had struggled all season, they did give the Colonels a scare earlier in the year. Using the game as trial-run for the KIT tournament, Centre jumped on top only five minutes into the game and never relinquished control from then on.

Seeded fifth going into the KIT, Centre faced a determined Rhodes team in the very first round. After regulation, Rhodes and Centre were tied 1-1. The colonels played very well in both overtime periods and finally won the game in penalty strokes. Lowe stopped all but one stroke from Rhodes, while Gina Preston (Louisville, KY-Assumption H.S.), Rachel Hayden (Louisville, KY-Mercy Academy), and Meagan Haag (Louisville, KY-DuPont Manual) all scored for Centre.

Centre dropped its next game to eventual KIT Champion Lindenwood University 0-1, and then played DePauw in the consolation game. Neither team was able to score until Haag redirected a Rublein shot off a penalty corner in the first overtime, giving the colonels third place.

The Colonels finished the season with a competitive record of 8-9, and a third place finish in the KIT tournament. Preston and Lowe were named to the KIT All-Conference Team while Lowe and Haag were selected to the KIT All-Tournament Team. Lowe was also named to the Great Lakes All-Region First Team, while fellow senior Whitney Van Vactor (Louisville, KY-Ballard H.S.) was named to the All-Region Second Team. Both were ranked among the top ten in D-III in respective statistical categories: Lowe-#1 save percentage-0.0909, #2 Saves-261; Van Vactor-#10 tie Defensive Saves-9, Defensive Saves per game-#14-0.529.

Centre was named the NFHCA National Academic Team award winner, and placed a record 10 individuals on the NFHCA Academic squad.

Centre finished the season with a thrilling victory over Rose-Hulman for a share of the Southern Collegiate Athletic Conference championship. Both Centre and Trinity finished with an 8-2 record. Trinity received the automatic qualifier for the NCAA playoffs because of your head to head loss in mid-October. This is the first conference championship for Centre since 1995 when Centre (5-4-1) shared the title with Trinity and Rhodes.

Our senior class did an outstanding job in maintaining our morale throughout the season. They played with a great deal of passion and most importantly they had a blast. This group of seniors was unique in that they played with an intense focus in practice and games, yet they have a playful attitude in their approach to the game. The Colonels then tied Transylvania in regulation and lost on the first playoff hole during a dual match in Lexington. Ben Vaneria led the Colonels with an 83. Centre College Men's Soccer Team

The Centre College men's soccer team entered the 2003 season with high expectations. Following a strong 2002 campaign in which the Colonels achieved their first ever top ten national ranking, as well as setting new Division I, II, and III record for fastest back-to-back goals scored at 5 seconds, the 2003 team looked to expand on that success.

The 2003 colonels finished 11-6-1 with wins over NCAA Tournament Elite 8 finalist Dominican, a dominant Homecoming win over Sewanee, along with a sweep of conference foes Millsaps and Oglethorpe over Family Week-end. Individually, two defenders, Junior Stan Simek, and Senior Rhodes Thompson, were voted to the Southern Collegiate Athletic Conference Team. Simek went on to make the NSCAA Regional All-American team. Senior midfielder David Hewitt became Centre's first CoSIDA Academic All-American since 1992. A senior class of David Hewitt, Rhodes Thompson, Jordan Parker, Josh Haines, Jacob Sither, and Mike Weckenbrock finished 48-19-9 over their four years at Centre College.

Although the season ended just short of the NCAA Championships, there were any signs of things to come. The underclassman began to show their talent and with a bit of added experience in 2004, the team looks to return to the NCAA's following a four-year hiatus.

The Colonels had a successful season with an overall record of 8-6-1 and a 4th place finish in the SCAC. Highlights throughout the season included a 1-1 tie against Great Lakes Region opponent Wilmington (OH), and a 3-0 victory over in-state rival Transylvania and a four-game winning streak in the SCAC, which included defeating Rhodes College, a South Region Top Ten team to finish out the season.

Numerous Centre players were honored this season. In the last week of the season, senior goalkeeper Jessica Chisley was named SCAC Defensive Player of the Week while her teammate junior Maggie Ray was named SCAC Offensive Player of the Week. Post season accolades for the Colonels included Jessica Chisley being named SCAC Co-defensive Player of the Year, All-SCAC, and 3rd team All-Great Lakes Region. 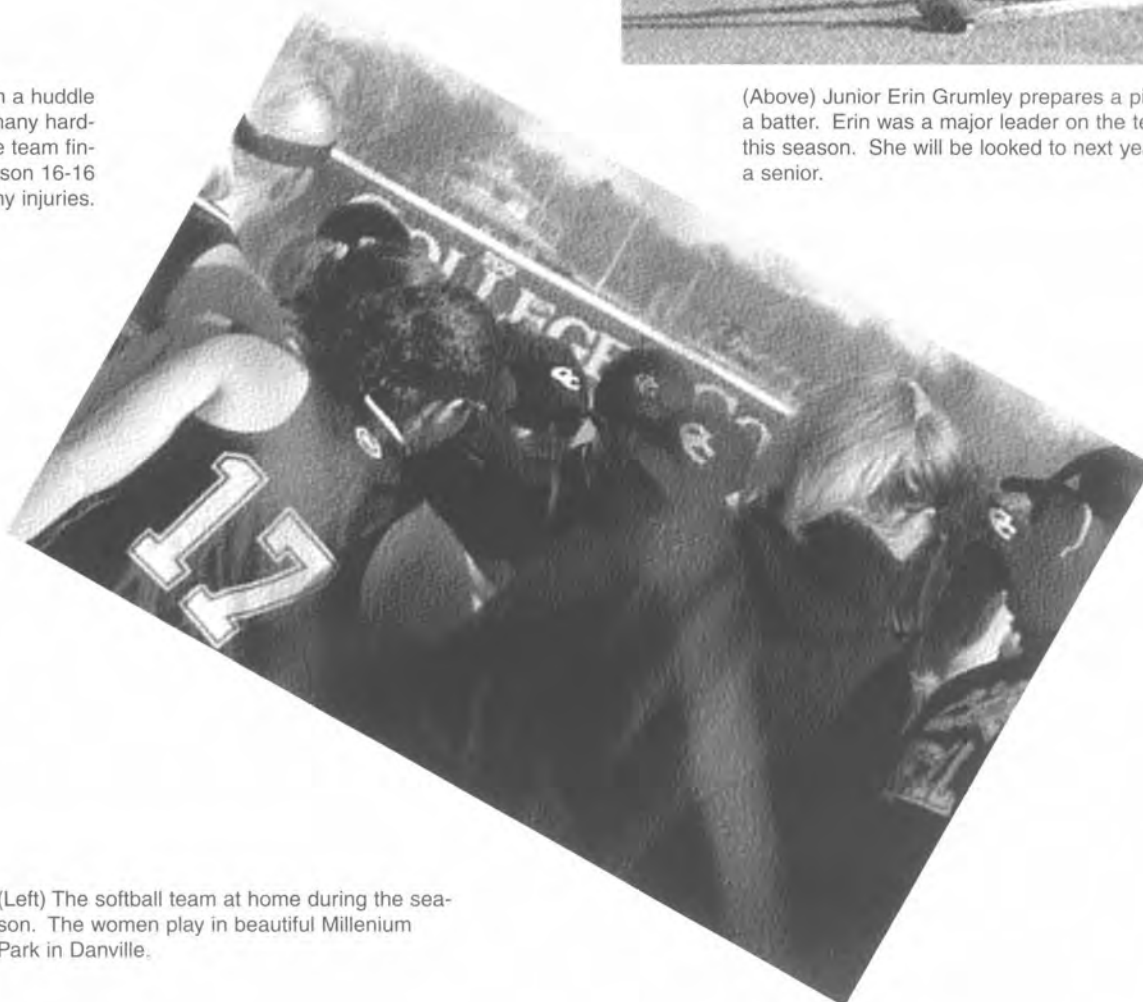

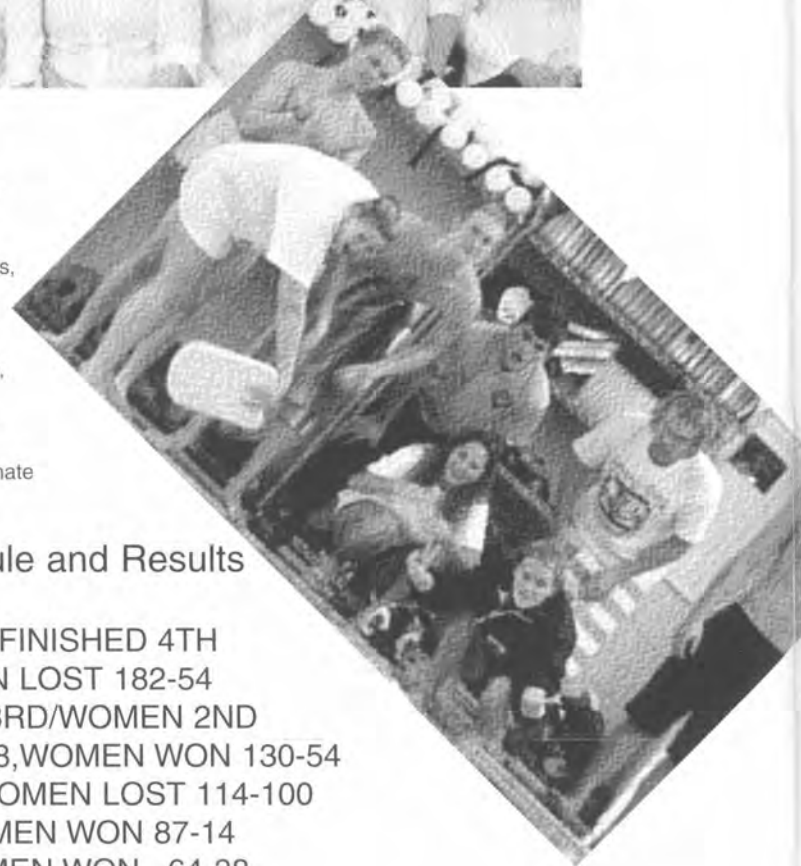

Centre College Track and Field

The women's track team enjoyed a great season. Eileen Schilling finished 1st place in the SCAC Conference Championships in the 5,000 meter race and the 10,000 meter race. She broke the conference record in the 10,000 meter race with a time of 37:56. She also earned All-Conference honors in both races. Eileen continued her winning ways by breaking the Centre College school record in the 5,000 meters-18:10. She also broke the Centre College school record in the 10,000 meters-37:41. Eileen qualified for nationals in the 10,000 meters. Eileen Schilling led the women's track team at the SCAC conference championships to a 4th place team finish. Sarah Moore earned All-Conference honors in the 100 meter hurdles by finishing 3rd place with a time of 16.36. She also earned All-Conference honors in the pole vault by finishing 3rd place with a vault of 8'0". Sarah then broke her own school record this season in the pole vault with a jump of 9'0".
