COLLEGE



History

CENTRE COLLEGE was chartered in 1819, and is, therefore, one of the oldest institutions of higher education in Kentucky, or in the South, having graduated the first class as early as 1824. The college has prosecuted its work successfully and without interruption from that day to the present. Not a year has passed in which it has not sent out graduates.

Central University was organized at Richmond, Kentucky, under a charter granted by the Legislature, March 3, 1873, providing for the establishment of an institution of the highest order, on the university plan. Under this plan, professional Colleges of Law, Medicine and Dentistry, and three preparatory schools were established, in addition to the College of Philosophy, Letters and Science.

In 1901, these two institutions were legally consolidated under the corporate name of "Central University of Kentucky," with agreement and provision to continue the College at Danville for instruction in Literature and in the Arts and Sciences, the same to be known as The Centre College of Kentucky.

The College has always been small in number of students, but has attained a high standard of scholarship, a very strong faculty and complete equipment for college work, and has had marked success in inspiring young men with ambitions and ideals for noble living and useful service.

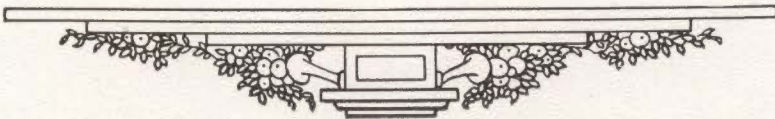
The Presbyterian Churches have, for nearly a century, received into their ranks many gifted ministers and workers from the students and graduates of Centre College and Central University, and since the consolidation in 1901, from Centre College at Danville, Kentucky.

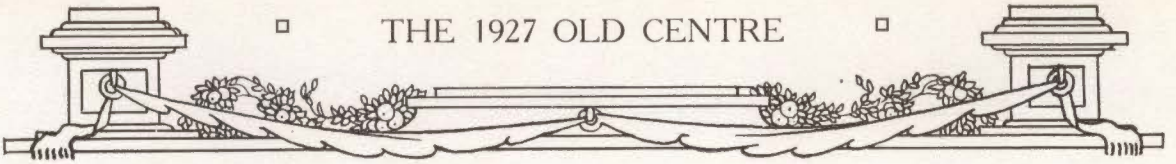
In 1918 the charter was amended, and the corporate name of the institution changed to its former name, Centre College of Kentucky.



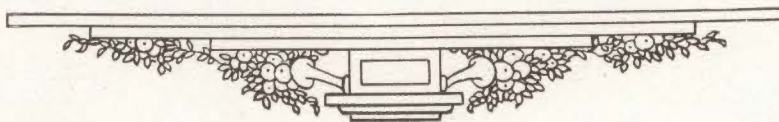


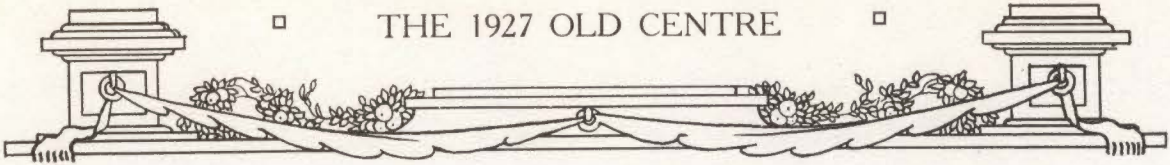

Senior Class History

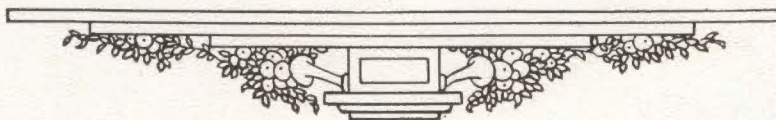

Junior Class History

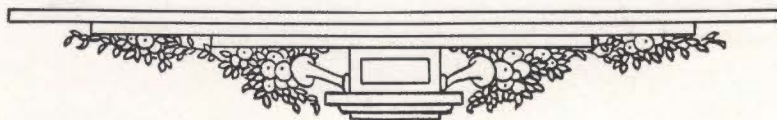

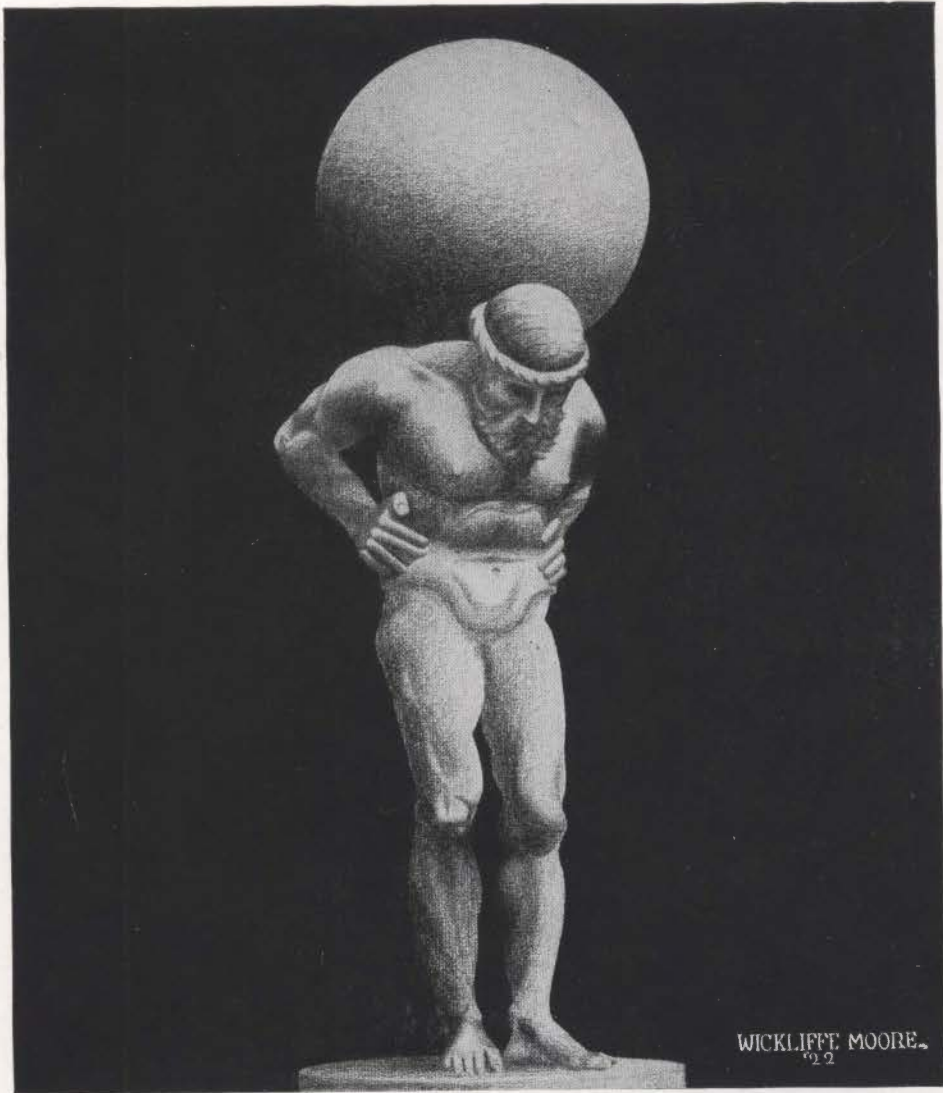
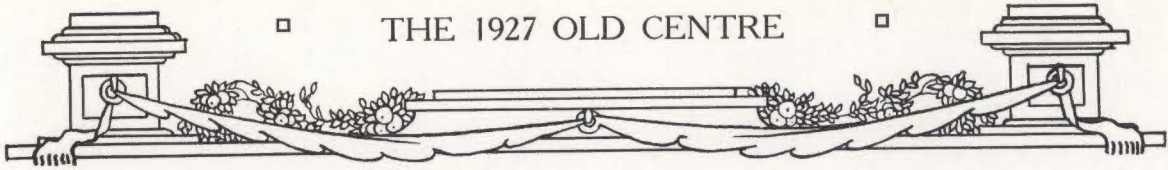
About this time other important movements were in progress among the student body and 'tis said that one of our class was instrumental in making at least one of the movements a success.

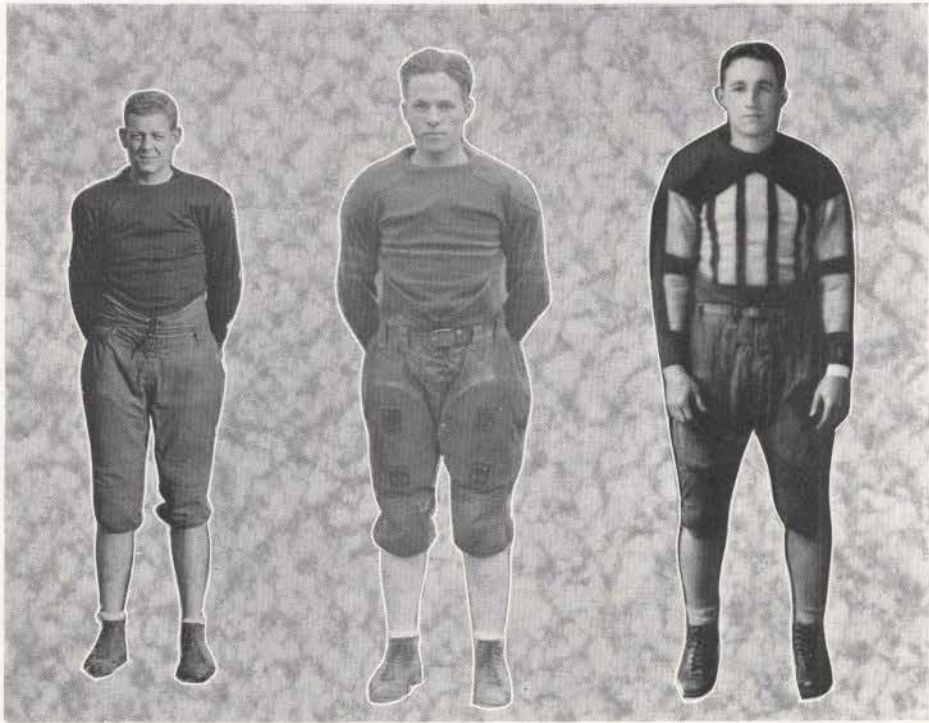
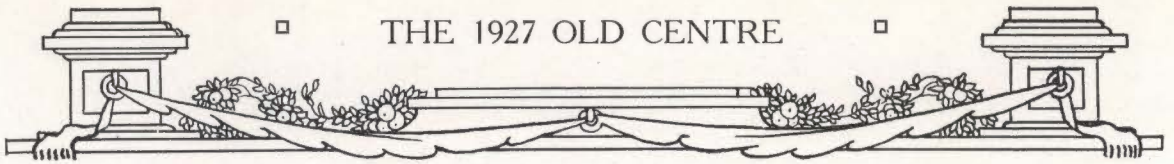
JIM PARRISH

McCLURE (Captain), *Center*

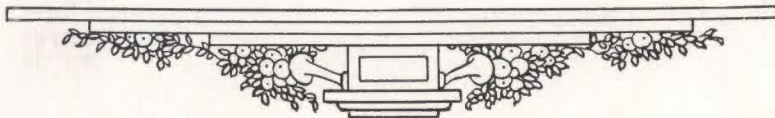

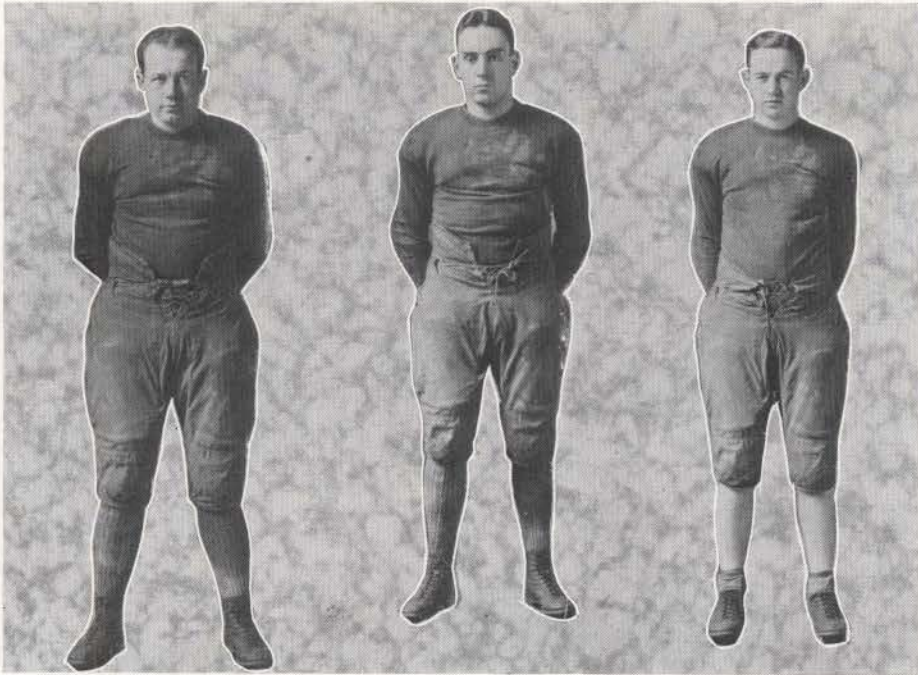
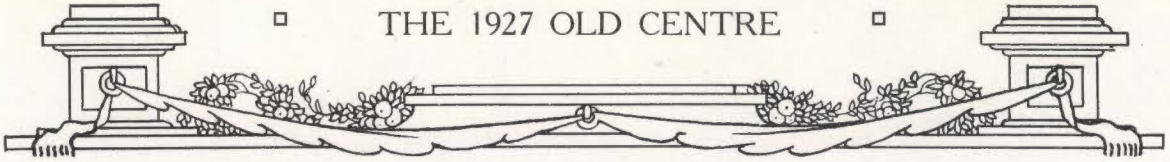
FAUREST, *Quarterback*

H. ALEXANDER, *End*

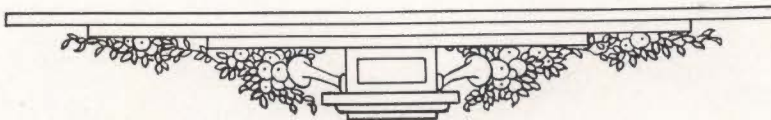

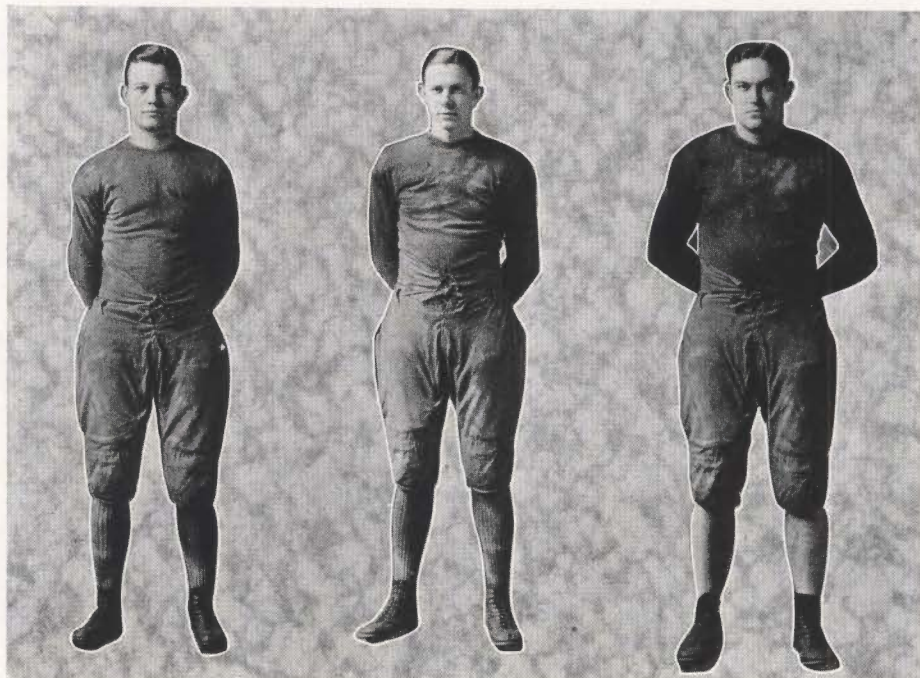
KAGIN, *Tackle*

CLARKSON, Guard

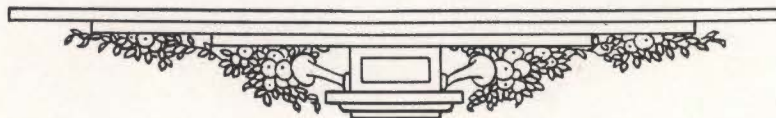

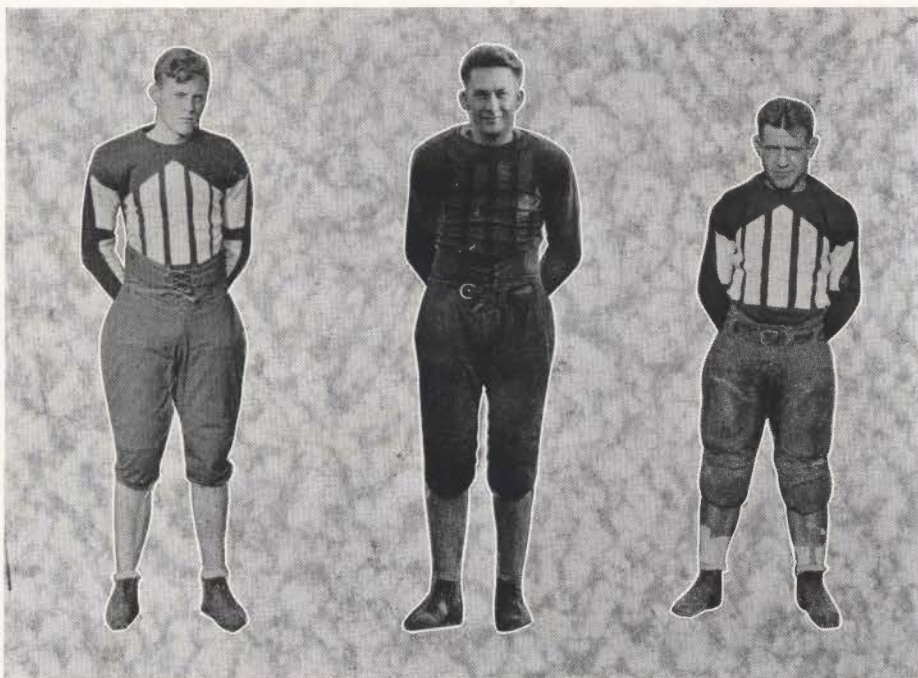
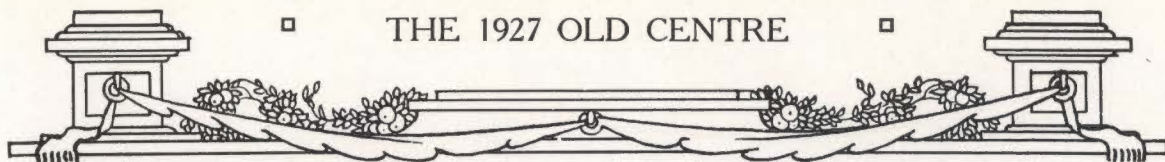
KNUCKLES, Guard

HYATT, End

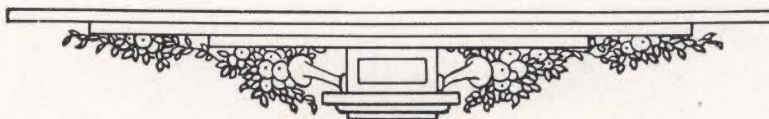

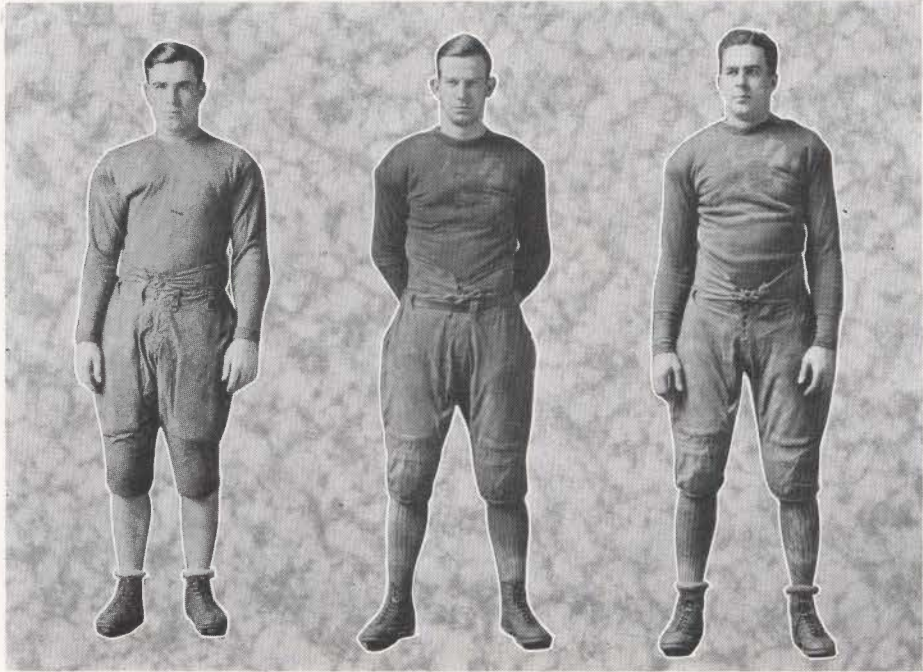
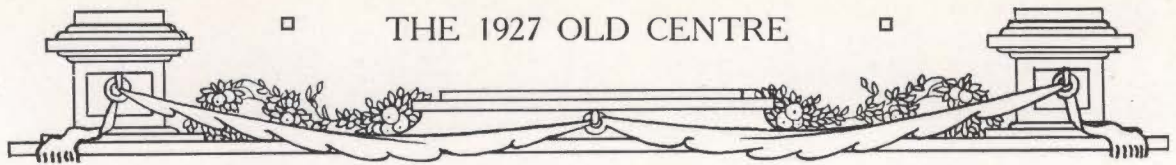
ESTES, End

LITRELL, *Halfback*

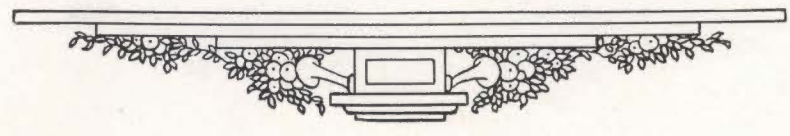

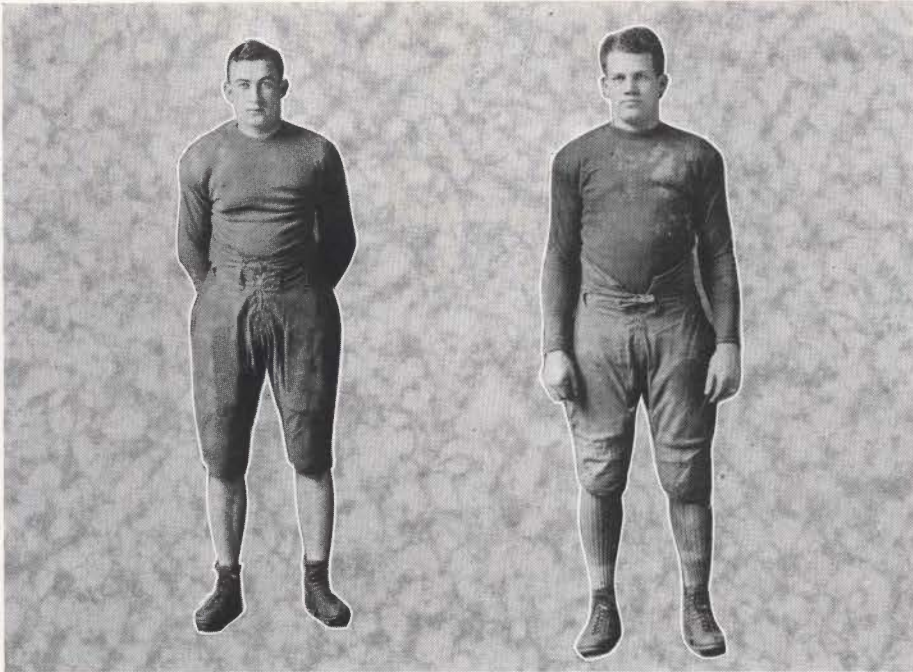
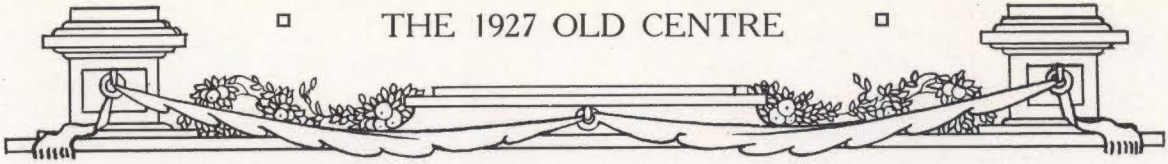
PARKER, *Guard*

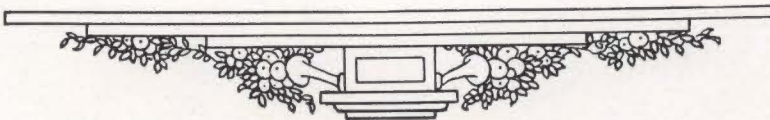


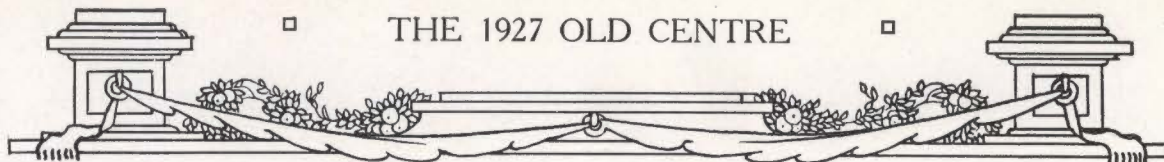
FENDLEY, *End*

The season was opened with Western Kentucky Normal, a team that was expected to offer but slight opposition to the "Praying Colonels." The game was played on a muddy field and was slow and uninteresting throughout. When the final whistle blew neither team had come near scoring.

October 2 found the Colonels in Winchester with the strong Wesleyan team to battle. The score of 7 to 0 in Centre's favor shows that it was a tough battle but with our boys rounding into shape they could not be stopped and the old Freshman combination of Goings to Littrell put over the counter that spelled defeat for the Methodists.

Centre played its last home game of the season October 9 against the "Stormy Petrels" of Oglethorpe College. The Petrels had just defeated Georgia Tech and were in midseason form. Oglethorpe, led by Captain "Nutty" Campbell, finally won out by a score of 12 to 0 in a game it will take a long time to forget.

The University of Tennessee, an old-time rival of Centre, gave our boys a fearful drubbing the next week. Lauer hit the line well but Centre could not stop the thrusts of the strong Volunteer backs and lost, 30 to 7.

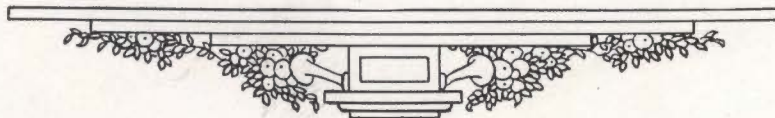

Centre received its hardest setback of the year the next week. We started like another Centre victory but the Michigan giants soon limbered up and swamped us by the score of 41 to 14.

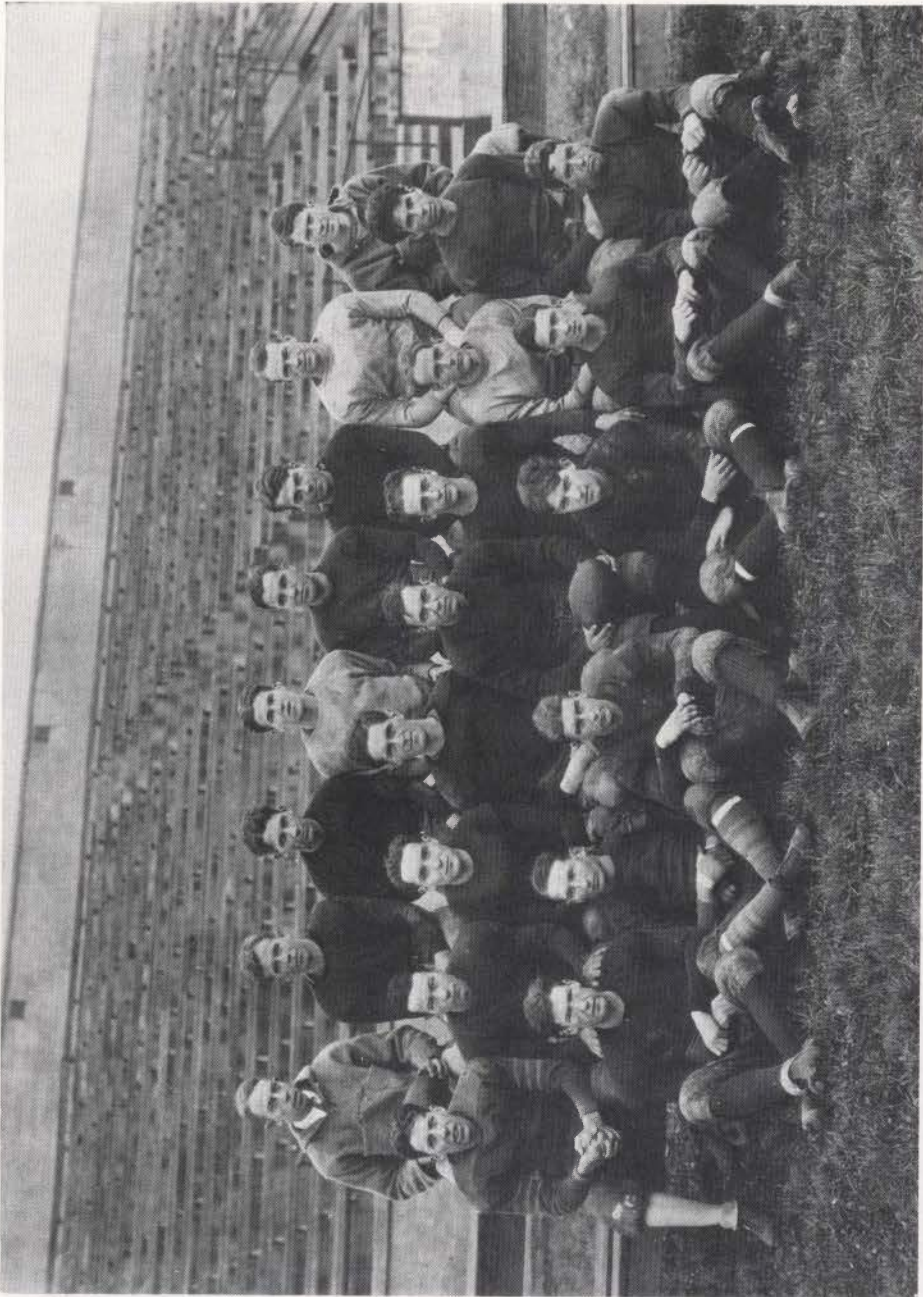
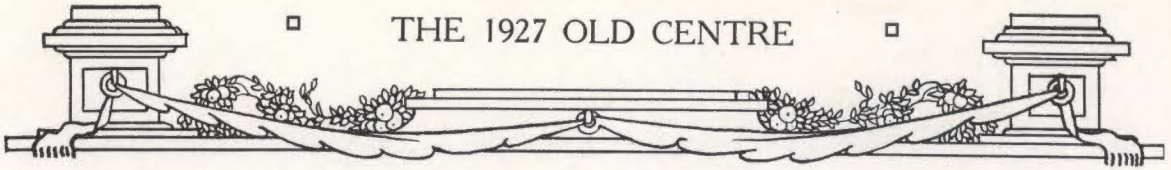

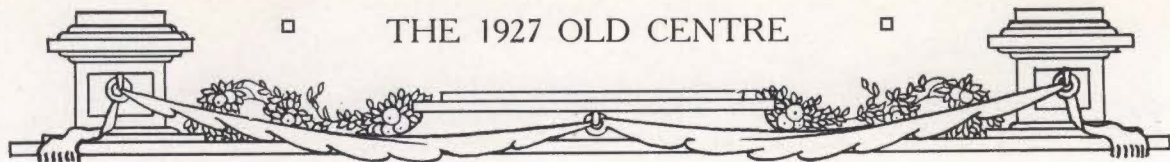


THE 1927 OLD CENTRE

Centre College is looking forward to 1927 as a banner year for the gold and white on the gridiron. The team of '26 was young both in years and experience and only three men will be lost by graduation.

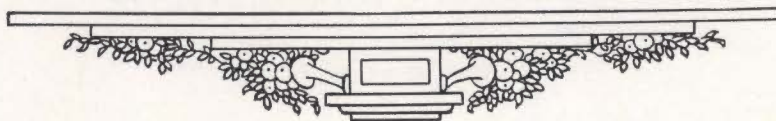

Basketball, 1927

CENTRE COLLEGE was represented by the best basketball team to bear the gold and white colors in five years, during 1927. Although approximately as many games were lost as were marked up on the winning side it must be admitted that the net game has been at low ebb at Centre lately and "Red" Maher's men did much to regain the lost Centre prestige on the basketball court.

Practice did not begin until after the Christmas holidays and with only a short week of preparation the Colonels engaged the strong Kentucky Wesleyan five at Winchester. Wesleyan had just trampled over State and was boasting the best team to ever represent the institution. A stirring battle resulted with the Methodists coming out on top after two over-time periods. The score: Kentucky Wesleyan, 32; Centre, 31.

Two days later the Colonels, playing on the home court for the first time, ran rough shod over Eastern State Normal and won out by a 47 to 19 count.

The next week the Centre squad set out for Louisville with high hopes of victory over U. of L. Two minutes before game-time word was received from Danville that Kelly Deaton was ineligible to play. Without their ace the Gold and White hoopsters seemed in a daze and Louisville won an easy 33 to 17 victory.

The next game was with Kentucky State and developed into the usual grudge battle. Centre was at a disadvantage on the huge floor but the men fought like fury and managed to hold a slight lead until the closing minutes of play. State won out in the final seconds by a 27 to 25 score. Deaton came into his own in this contest and registered 15 of the Gold and White points.

A tilt with the Danville Majors, an independent team composed of former college stars, was next for "Coach Red" and his boys. The Colonels annexed this game, 43 to 32, and gave a remarkable exhibition of individual brilliance.

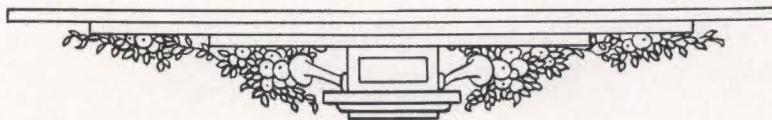
On February 1, Transylvania came to town and gave us a short workout. The Colonels trounced the Pioneers by a 57 to 27 score and hopelessly outclassed Coach Elam's men. Every man on the squad was given a chance and all showed up well.

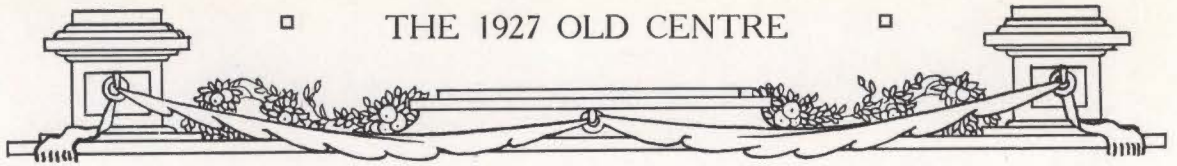
On the Southern trip the Colonels ran into an epidemic of hard luck. Union College defeated Centre by two points, Lincoln Memorial by one and Tennessee by six. Against the Volunteers the Colonels showed real basketball for a time, but the exertions of three games in as many nights proved too much for Captain Kagin and his men and they were forced to accept a 25 to 19 drubbing.

Returning from the disastrous trip the Colonels once again regained their true form and in a whirlwind battle took University of Louisville into camp, 34 to 32. Maggard, the slight forward, stood out in this fracas and contributed the winning margin by sinking two free throws in the final seconds of the fray.

After showing such pleasing form against Louisville, Maher's men again slumped. Against State the Colonels played like so many dead men and for the second time State College triumphed over Centre, this time by a 22 to 16 count. Thompson and Goings were about the only Colonels to play anywhere near their usual form in this contest.

Four games were played the next week with the gold-clad boys emerging on the





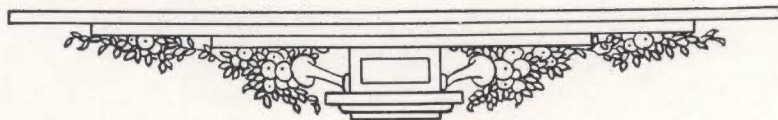

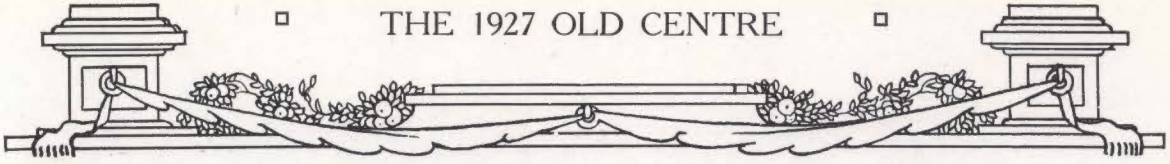
winning side of three of these. The week started bad when Berea took us into camp but then followed three great victories. Kentucky Wesleyan, Eastern Normal and Tennessee all fell before the fighting Colonels. Coach Maher saved his men as much as possible in these contests by using his second string players. Purdom, Thompson, Mowry, Durham and Byars started all of these games and performed as well as the regulars.

In the state tournament it was Centre's luck to draw the strongest team of all in the first game. Western Normal, coached by an old Centre court star, Ed Diddle, defeated the Colonels, 33 to 20, and thereby pushed Captain Kagin and his men to the sidelines. Deaton was put out of the game in the first ten minutes of play because of personals and this greatly hampered the offense of the Colonels.

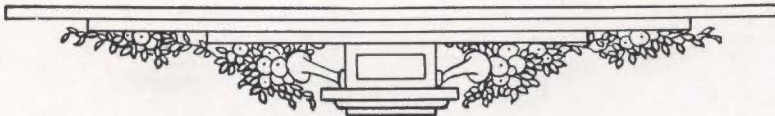
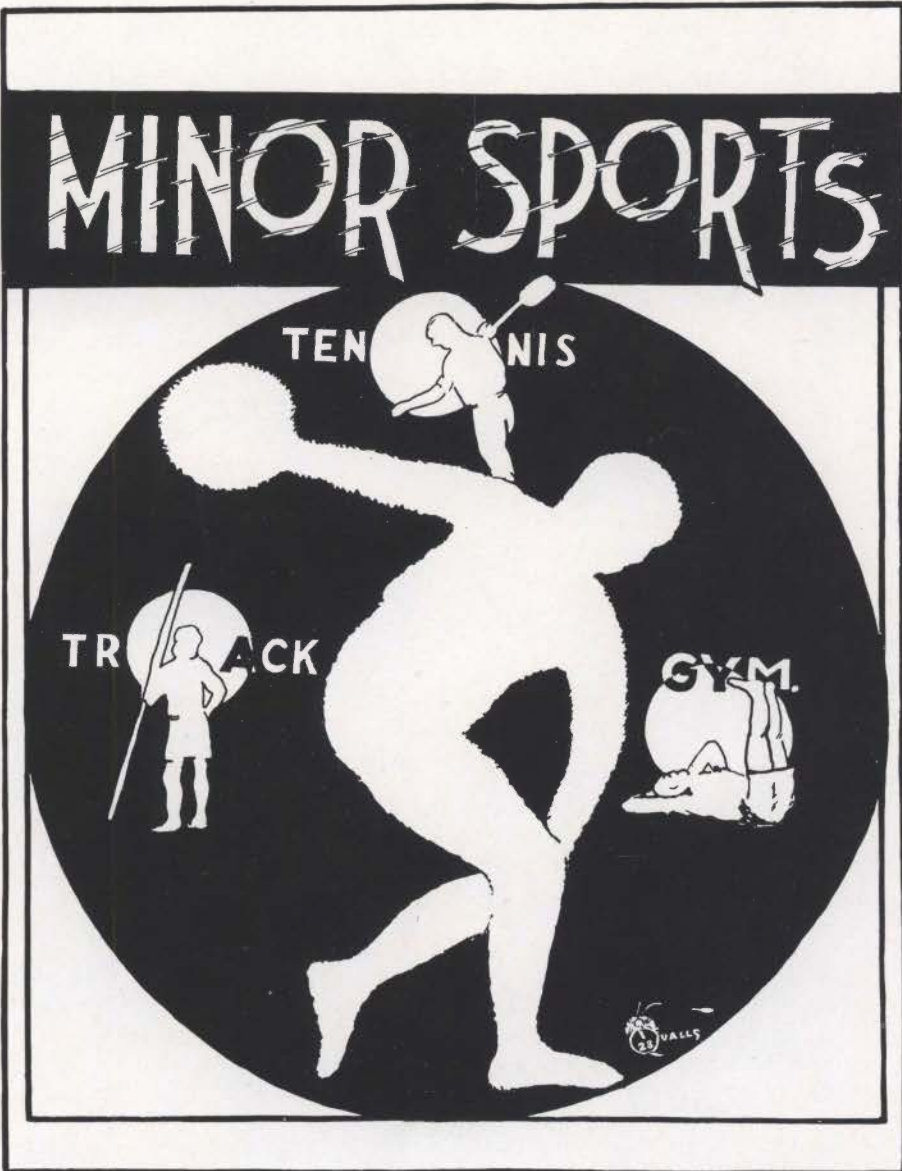
Only Captain Kagin is lost by graduation and in 1928 the Colonels are counting on the best net team in the history of the school.

The Freshman basketball team did not have a very successful season. For a long time it appeared that there would be no Frosh five, but finally Kagin was appointed coach and in the face of many hardships he placed a fighting team on the floor. Several of the freshman stars were playing with the independent team of the town and Kagin had only limited material. In Sayers and Shelton the Frosh possessed two reliable forwards and Dakin played well at center. The Frosh defeated Transylvania Freshmen on the home floor by two points in a whirlwind game and staged a great fight against the Jeffersonville Elks, a strong Indiana independent team. Against State the boys were outclassed and could not cope with Jeffries, Milward and company.

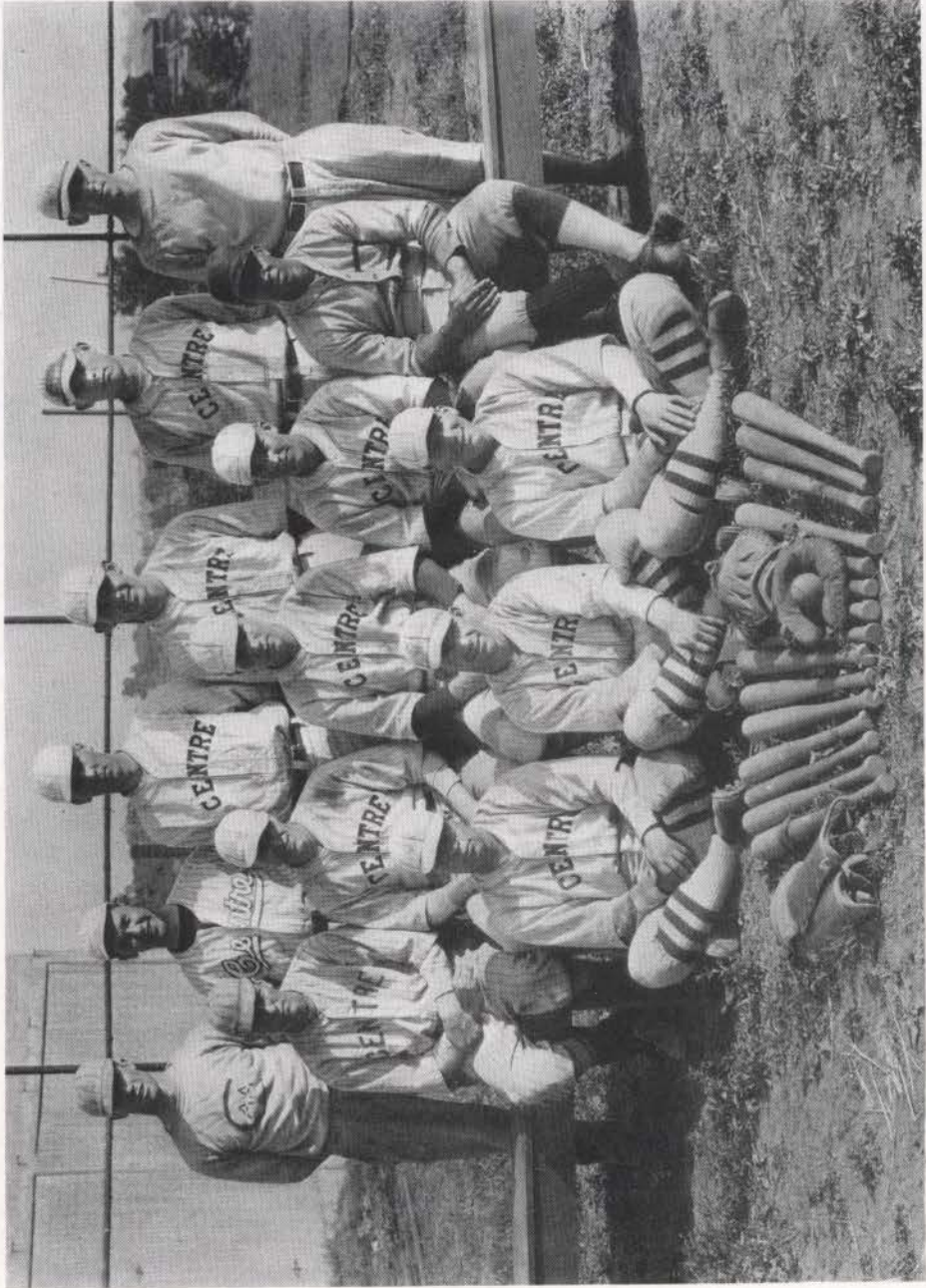
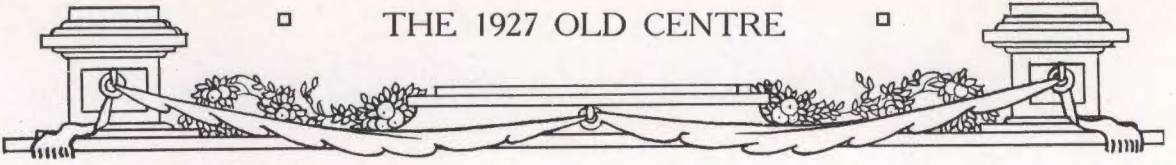




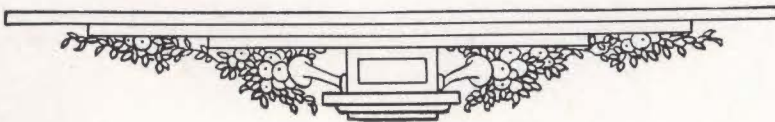

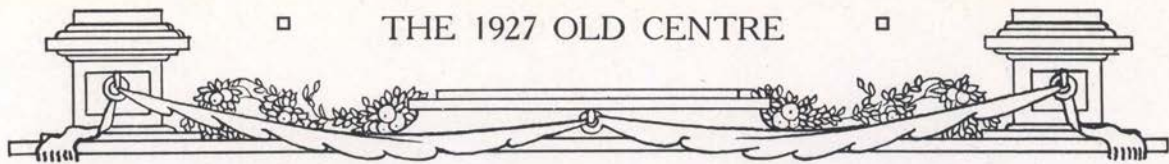


THE 1927 OLD CENTRE



1926 BASEBALL TEAM





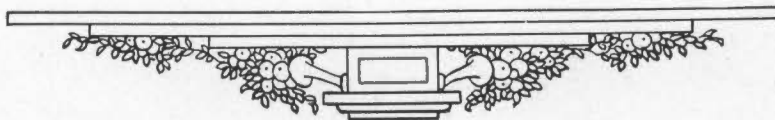
1926 Baseball Season

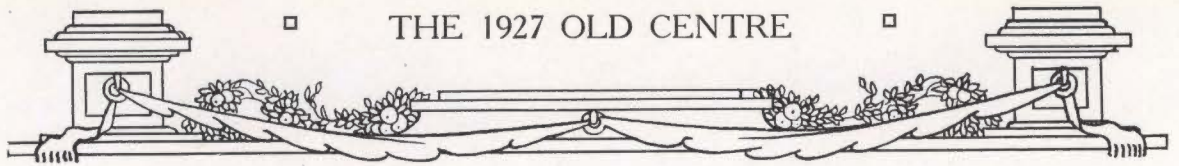
THE baseball team had an in and out season during 1926 and as a whole played only mediocre baseball. The team showed good form only in spots and these spots were altogether too few. However, several good players were developed and present prospects seem to point to one of the best diamond aggregations in the history of the school for 1927.

Two games were divided with Kentucky Wesleyan. The Methodists defeated the Colonels by a close score at Winchester but Centre came back when the Panthers came to Danville and fairly massacred them by a 15 to 4 score. Kentucky State was victorious in both contests, humbling the Colonels at Danville by 9 to 0 and at Lexington by a much narrower margin. Transylvania split even with Centre. The Pioneers defeated the Gold and White at Lexington in a slugging bee, but were not so fortunate when they came to Danville. Probably the best played contest of the season was with Eastern Normal at Richmond. The Teachers were victorious, 4 to 3, but only after a hair-raising battle that was not decided until the last man was out.

"Red" Maher coached the nine and he did a remarkably good job of it. The backbone of the team was Captain "Rabbit" Pace who was the catcher and at times guardian of the short field. Captain "Rabbit" patrolled his position in faultless style and hit well. Purdom at shortstop and occasionally third base; Burbank, pitcher, and Everett Smith, right field, also were outstanding. Smith has been selected as captain of this year's nine and he is being counted on to lead the gold and white to many stirring victories.

Six lettermen will return from the '26 team and they are being counted on to form the nucleus of the '27 outfit. Besides Captain Smith those who will be found on the team are Alexander, Hyatt, Petrie, Purdom and Estes. These men are all good sluggers and will no doubt drive many an opposing pitcher to the showers.



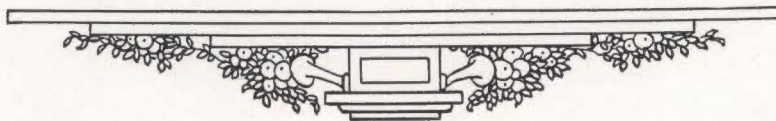


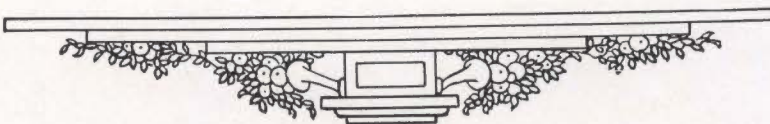
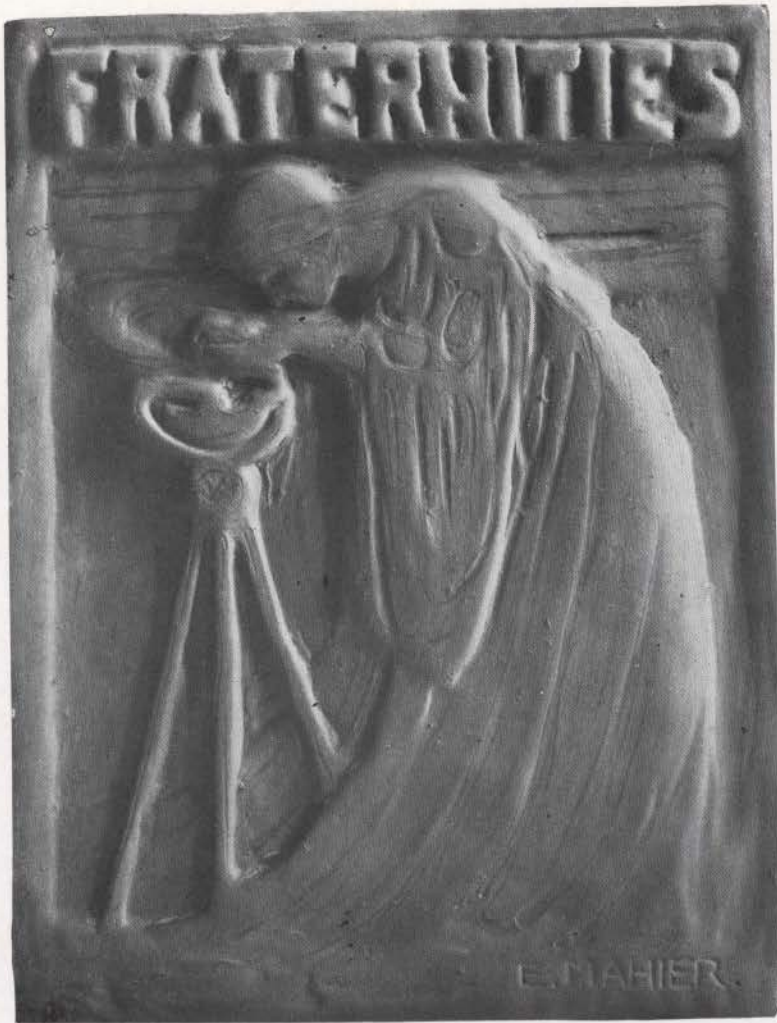
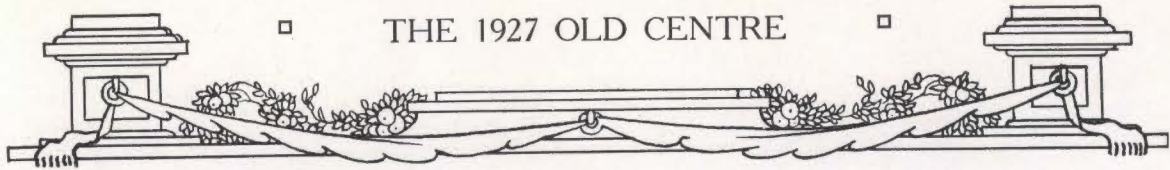

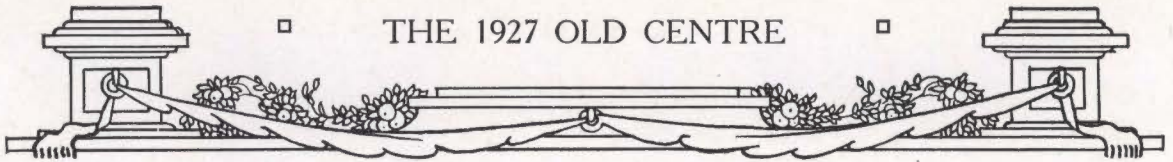
1926 Track
