






Dance the Night Away













Formerly known as the Fraternity Quadrangle, the three Greek Revival-style fraternity houses on the south end of campus once known as Beta, Sig, SAE, Deke, Phi Tau, and Phi Delt, became dormitories bearing the names of Cooper Ganfield, LaMotte, Tyler Stevenson, and Vinson, respectively.

William Arthur Ganfield served as Centre's president from 1915 to 1921; his tenure brought the College national recognition academically as well as in athletic endeavors. Adlai Ewing Stevenson, Class of 1859, Frederick Moore Vinson '09, and John Sherman Cooper '22, arguably three of the College's most politically prominent alumni, served the United States government in capacities as Vice President, Supreme Court Chief Justice, and Senator. Edward Golladay LaMotte '29 and Robert Stokes Tyler '44 were both trustees who came to prominence as successful businessmen.

Homecoming was a time to celebrate the present life of the College, as well as a time to honor our past. By dedicating these houses, the College paid tribute to a long line of alums and friends who have helped to further the College's mission of excellence in education.

































































The Colonel Track Teams Race Through Another Successful Season





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
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The Invitation




The invitation had been extended once again to go beyond the boundaries of our physical campus, and "Come In" to life.
