CENTRE-WESTERN NORMAL


The Colonels opened their 1930 season at home against the Teachers with an impressive 31-0 victory. While it was their initial game and the day was suited for anything but football, the Gold and White gridders displayed a brand of ball that would have done them credit at mid-season.


Every style of attack was resorted to and all were effective, with passes gaining many yards. Coach Kubale inserted most of the squad in the line-up during the closing minutes in order that all might gain actual playing experience. The play of the line was especially good.

CENTRE-TENNESSEE

In their second start, the Colonels went up against the powerful Tennessee Volunteers, and after a great fight, lost 18-0. The score was hardly indicative of the play in the game.

Centre opened the game by taking the kick-off and marching down the field for five successive first downs, only to lose the ball on an attempted pass over the goal line. From then on it was a gruelling battle with most of Tennessee's advances being made on passes. The Dodd-Hackman duet sang the Colonels' death knell by their brilliant work. Dodd punted and passed with the accuracy of a rifle, and the great Buddy smashed the line for yard after yard.





The Colonels also played an inspired game with every man playing super ball. Their attack was clean, but vicious, and five of the Vols were removed because of injuries. Centre's biggest handicap was the lack of substitutes to stem the toll of play and the extreme heat.

CENTRE-CHATTANOOGA


In their second game against S. I. A. A. opposition, the Colonels stepped back into winning stride to defeat the University of Chattanooga, 7-6.


They waited until the closing minutes of the fray to pull this one out of the fire. The 'Nooga boys had scored early in the game on a blocked punt, but had missed the point after touchdown. Late in the second half, Grabruck took the ball over for Centre's lone marker, and Ches Shearer, who had been held out of the game because of a broken finger, went in and converted the kick for the winning margin.

CENTRE- ST. XAVIER

In the first nocturnal contest that a Centre grid team had ever played, the Colonels met the Big Green of St. Xavier at Cincinnati, and defeated the Irish 6-0. It was easily the most thrilling game that the Gold and White was in all season.

The two teams battled on even terms for two quarters with neither showing any marked superiority. Then, in the third frame, Nemecek smashed his way through the center of the





St. X line and plowed up the secondary defense for 41 yards. With the ball in scoring position, the Colonels took four plays to put over the only marker of the game. Both teams opened up in the last period with a torrent of passes, but each attack was halted before the goal could be crossed.


The most outstanding features of the games were Nemecek's great drive and the work of the Centre line. The Colonel forward wall was next to impregnable. The night air was perfect for football, and the Colonels adapted themselves to the lights remarkably well.

CENTRE-NORTHWESTERN

The Colonels made their first northern invasion since the memorable series against Harvard when they met the Northwestern Wildcats in Dyche Stadium. The Purple squad was rated as one of the strongest teams in the country, and no one expected the little band of Gold and White gridders to do anything but put up a fair game against them. This they did, and what was more, scored on the Wildcats for the first time of the season. The final count was 45-7.

It was just a question of too much man power that the Colonels had to solve. One sports writer described the Northwestern team as a "team of fullbacks". The Colonels furnished the great crowd with thrills all through the game, and set them wild when they scored Centre's lone touchdown.





Ches Shearer played a wonderful game, punting, passing and running the ball in a manner that won him honorable mention as All-American. Several times he nearly broke loose for touchdowns in returning punts.


CENTRE-LOUISVILLE




College Little Giants 53-0 in the homecoming game. This game marked the best work of the Colonel scoring machine for the season.



CENTRE-KANSAS AGGIES





Resume of 1930 Football Schedule

Coach Kubale's second year at Centre furnished more proof that football is definitely on the upgrade at Centre College. Facing a mighty hard ten-game schedule, the Colonels dropped but three of them and those only to teams that ranked with the best in the country. There were few better teams in the country than Dick Handley's Northwestern Wildcats, and Tennessee finished fast to prove they had one of the best teams in the South. While "Bo" McMillen's Kansas Aggies were defeated, it must be admitted that they carried a lot of power.

Centre's showing in the State S. I. A. A. loop was again most convincing. The touchdown scored on her by Chattanooga this year made but the second in the last two seasons in Association games. Besides a dynamic offense, it would seem that the Colonels are learning at least the rudiments of defense.

Nine letter men will be lost by graduation this year, and their loss will be most keenly felt, but the excellent prospects from the Freshman team should off-set their going considerably. Those who have worn the Gold and White for the last time are: Grabruck, Shearer, May, Moore, Owen, Waddle, Bourne, Nemecek and Boyle. Grabruck, Shearer and Nemecek are all-State S. I. A. A. men, and Shearer was given honorable mention on several all-American teams this last year.

Kentucky Wesleyan was the first to feel the power of the first year men's attack, going down under a 21-0 score.


The second game was with the Young Vols at Knoxville, Tenn. The Lieutenants were finally defeated 6-0 after a vicious tooth-and-nail battle.







The 1930-1931 Colonel court team enjoyed a good season, winning nine and losing four of their regularly scheduled games, finishing second in the State S. I. A. A. race. Their record against Conference teams was six victories and one defeat. In the two tournaments that the Colonels played, they were eliminated in the first round of each, losing to Western

Normal in the State tourney 37-35, and going down before Howard College in the S. I. A. A. play-off 47-36.

The Colonels started off fast with four straight victories against Union, 42-29; Sue Bennett, 37-17; Georgetown, 32-29; and Louisville, 42-30. Their next three games took them on an invasion of Ohio, where they lost all three. St. Xavier defeated them 30-19; the Cincinnati Elmo Club, made up of former college stars, dropped them 68-37; and Wittenberg University winning by 41-24.


A winning stride was again struck as the Gold and White successively beat Transylvania, 24-23; Wesleyan, 34-28; Louisville, 37-28; Berea, 35-26; and Union, 53-35. Kentucky Wesleyan avenged their earlier defeat by a 44-33 victory following the Berea contest. This was the only game lost in the State race.

The ability to come from behind in the second half, after a slow start, marked the Colonels' play throughout the season. This was shown in the second Louisville game, when, with but seven minutes to play and Louisville leading 27-20, the Colonels came from behind to win 37-28. In both of their tournament games the Colonels allowed their opponents to get away to a big lead only to make it up in the second period.

Six letter men played their last game in the Howard contest, with graduation taking Captain Ches Shearer, Grabruck, May, Wilson, Bininger and Sayers. The other two members of the squad, Bravard and Turney, both letter men, are Juniors.





Track, Spring 1930

Track in 1930 was still a minor sport and suffered because of the attention given to spring football and baseball. The season, however, while not conspicuously successful, was moderately so. There were but two meets in which the Colonel cindermen took part: the State meet at Georgetown and the dual meet with Berea. The latter went to Berea and Centre finished third in the State affair.

The team, captained by Fred "Lefty" Arnicar, was made up almost entirely of Sophomores. There was an abundance of material for the dashes and weight events, but practically none in the distance runs. In those events in which they entered men, the Colonels almost swept the first places in the State meet. Hasara won the 100, 220, broad jump and ran on the winning half-mile relay team. Arnicar took the weight events, setting new State records in the shot-put and the discus. Hasara was second high point man for the meet.






Gym Dandies


he Farm and the Farm Home

Over two hundred farm tasks are now performed by electric power. And farmers, rural service executives of power companies and agricultural engineers of state colleges and universities are finding new jobs for electricity daily.

The farm business is a household enterprise at the core. The farm and the farm home are a single unit — where the kitchen range is productive capital, quite as much

as a team of horses or a hay-rake Electric power is of even greater assistance in the farm home than in the field. Over half the current used is applied to kitchen, laundry, and household cleaning. Although the American farm is highly powered in the field, modern engineering did little for the women of the farm until the advent of electric power. For every hour of farm work performed by engines and horses, even now three hours of man and woman power are required. It is in that twothirds of farm work that electric power can be used to substitute for human labor.




