Penny Glass was more than just the post office supervisor for 20 years. For many, she embodied the very reasons for which we chose Centre College. From her jelly-bean contests to birthday cards for each student, Penny went out of her way for everyone who walked through the PO doors. Even while hospitalized in her last months, she greeted her visitors with that same bold smile and daring sense of humor. How many of us left her side with a hand-made greeting-card candy box, feeling that all was right in the world?

In an article published in the Herald-Leader, Art Jester wrote that "the most enduring part of education doesn't always come from books or classes. Sometimes it comes from people who exert a rare kind of influence. Because they make you feel important, your selfconfidence grows and with it your ability to achieve and treat others with warmth and respect." Words so true and beautiful could describe no one better than Penny. It will be a long time before anyone passes by that post office without thinking of the kindness and goodness of Mrs. Glass.

Charles Vahlkamp, Hazelrigg Professor of Humanities, has taught French at Centre since 1967. He has lived and studied extensively in France, serving as residential director for Centre's overseas program in Strasbourg. He also has led five travel-study programs in France for Centre students. During these experiences, Dr. Vahlkamp has shown his students how versatile his knowledge is, as well as a distguished taste in culinary art.
Well-versed in French history and culture, Dr. Vahlkamp is the author of studies on Voltaire and the Enlightenment. He also teaches courses in film history and criticism. In addition, Vahlkamp held various leadership posts at Centre. He served on the eight-member executive committee of the Faculty Athletics Representatives Association of the NCAA. Vahlkamp received bachelor's, master's, and doctoral degrees from Vanderbilt University.
Many thanks to Dr. Vahlkamp for his incredible mark on foreign studies at Centre. His influence has shown new worlds to hundreds of students.

Robert Weaver began his tenure at Centre College in 1972 as a professor of music. In addition to the standard music theory and history courses, he also taught piano, harpsichord, and organ. He has also served as department chair. Dr. Weaver's charm lies in his nacent fascination with not only piano, but also classical organ and choral music. As a long-time tenor in the Presbyterian choir, he has contributed greatly to the musical tradition at Centre and in Danville. His expertise in religious music made him an invaluable resource to faculty and students both.
Dr. Weaver's most memorable moments at Centre were those spent teaching 5week courses in Europe. Prior to the blossoming Strasbourg program, Dr. Weaver acted as guide and teacher in cities as grand as Berlin, Vienna, and Paris, and places as humble as a French monastary, where he and his students witnessed an entire rotation of religious Offices.

In his retirement, Dr. Weaver will divide his time between study and service by attending courses at Centre and volunteering at a literacy center.

Charlie Campbell was one great teacher. Most students never knew this, and now even more never will, but Dr. Campbell was perhaps the most sophisitcated professor of his time. His unique teaching style made every class a seminar, a time for exploring econimics in ways that defied reason, but inspired independent thought the likes of which rarely were achieved in any classroom.

Dr. Campbell has taught at Centre since 1968. He holds the Paul G. Blazer Professorship in Economics. He regularly taught courses on monetary theory and policy, macroeconomic theory, public finance, and the history of economic thought. His research interests include free market applications to publicly funded activities, especially airport construction. He apparantly has an office in Virginia that he goes to twice a month and makes a few million in the process.

Perhaps most beneficial to Danville, he conducted a comprehensive economic impact study to evaluate the role that Centre plays in the economy of the local area.

A cum laude graduate of Marshall University, Campbell received his doctorate in economics from the University of Virginia. He is a member of Omicron Delta Epsilon, Delta Sigma Pi, and the American Economic Society.

The Centre choral program was very active in performance in the 2000-2001 school year. In the fall, the Centre Singers, Men's Voices, and Women's
Voices, all under the direction of Dr. Barbara Hall, performed both separately and combined for the Family Weekend Concert, the Holiday Concert, and Lessons and Carols at the Presbyterian Church. The Centre Singers, along with four instrumentalists, ended the fall term with a concert tour, travelling to such places as Washington, D.C., and Historical Williamsburg, Virginia, among others.

Mr. Paul McGahie from the Cincinnati Conservatory of Music assumed directorial responsibilities for the winter and spring terms during Dr. Hall's sabbatical absence. The winter term choir included Centre students, faculty, members of the Presbyterian Church choir, and Danville community members. The term culminated in a performance of John Rutter's Requiem, accompanied by a chamber orchestra and featuring Mrs. Rebecca Miller as soloist.

Mr. McGahie instigated several changes in the spring term that resulted in the formation of three separate performing forces. This division enabled the choirs to cover a wide range of repertoire intended for both larger and smaller groups. ## COLONELS UPSET NO. 2 TRINITY; END SEASON AT 5-5

The beads of sweat from pre-season preparation and hopes became tears of joy and sadness as the Centre College football team took a ride on another roller-coaster season. In the end, a balanced 5 - 5 record remained along with memories players and fans will never forget.

The season began on a positive note, with a promising 39-22 victory over new rival Earlham. However, the fall of the first hill the team experienced was steep and progressed downward for the next three games. Following a gut-check 6-3 loss to conference rival Rhodes, Centre then lost to Washington \& Lee and Sewanee.

At this point, the Colonels' season looked bleak as they headed into the toughest stretch of their schedule with a record of 1-3. However, the Colonels showed true grit as they walked off Millsaps' field wih a 29-17 homecoming romp over the Majors, who had a 3-1 record entering the game.

Next the team marched down to Maryville, Tennessee only to disappoint the home team with a homecoming loss. The game went down to the wire as the Colonels entered the fourth quarter facing a $10-0$ deficit. After the score reached 17-7, quarterback Drew Mildren ('02) hit Jeremy Gomez ('02) for a 58 -yard touchdown strike to bring Centre within three. The Colonels continued with the tears of joy motif with a historical, gut-wrenching victory over the mighty Trinity Tigers at Centre's Homecoming. The Colonels were down 21-18 going into the fourth quarter, but that changed when Joe Guthrie ('02) caught a 15 -yard touchdown pass from Mildren with only 37 seconds remaining. The Tigers were tamed, giving the Colonels a 25 21 victory over the \#2 team in NCAA Division III, Trinity.

Centre then had two close losses to DePauw (30-23) and Davidson (20-17), then ended the season with a 27-14 victory over the Rose-Hulman Engineers in which the Colonel defense racked up four interceptions.

Eight Colonels were placed on the All-SCAC Football Team, including Special Teams Player of the Year Brian Britt. Centre will get an early jump on next season as they travel to Munich, Germany during June 2001 to play a German professional team. The team will then return in the summer heat to prepare for another great year of Centre College Football.

# Men's Soccer Denied 4th Straight NCAA Bid 

## Despite 15-4 Mark in Toughest Conference

The Centre College men's soccer team entered the 200 season with both high expectations and the personnel to return the Colonels to their fourth straight NCAA Tournament appearance. Under the leadership and guidance of nine stellar seniors and a plethora of freshmen, the team tore through their opening schedule, compiling an impressive 5-1 record. After suffering a heartbreaking 4-3 overtime loss to nationally-ranked \#2 Trinity, the Colonels rebounded to win six straight games. During this impeccable run, Centre knocked off in-state rival Transylvania and conference foes Millsaps, Oglethorpe, Hendrix, and Rhodes. Overall, the team ended the season with 15 victories and only lost four times, each of which by a one goal margin. In addition, the team's $6-3$ record in the nation's most dominant soccer conference, the SCAC, bolstered the squad to a third place finish and a \#21 national ranking.

The Colonel's season was unexpectedly ended, however, as the NCAA Tournament Selection Committee seemingly overlooked Centre's school record 3.4 goals per game while playing the nation's most difficult schedule in
all of Division III soccer (according to RPI). Not to be deterred, though, Centre celebrated their many team and individual awards, as Jay Flynn ('01) and Tanner Wann ('01) landed First Team All Conference and Second Team All Region honors. Mike Weckenbrock ('04) was the conference's only freshman to collect All Conference awards, as he joined the members of the Second Team. Kyle Cheatham ('01) rounded out the Colonel's honoraries by garnering a spot on the Third Team All Mid-East Region squad. Centre's Weckenbrock, Flynn, Matt McGoron ('01), and Russ Guffey ('01) also ended the season atop the SCAC's individual leader boards, while Mike Kretz ('01) was honored with the Conference's Player of the Week award.

The men's soccer team is eagerly awaiting the 2001 season, and even though the Colonels will lose nine seniors to graduation, a number of talented underclassmen will return to continue Centre's soccer dominance and avenge the NCAA's tournament oversight with a national championship.

## One More Step...

## To A Championship And Respect For Men's Basketball

After losing three seniors and three starters from a team that finished 14 11 (9-9) during the 1999-2000 campaign, the Colonels came to the hardcourt this season with nothing to lose and respect to gain.

The Colonels began the season with road losses to two NCAA Division III nationally ranked opponents: Maryville (19) and Hanover (21). Despite the slows start and an insulting sixth-place ranking in a preseason conference coaches' poll, the Colonels delivered promising results and began their quest to hush the critics with two impressive home wins against perennial conference powers Rose-Hulman and DePauw.

The remainder of the season would unfold in a similar manner as Centre finished the season 10-3 (8-1) at home and only 4-8 (4-5) on the road. Two home wins gave the Colonels a championship of their own annual Papa John's / Hampton Inn Christmas Tournament. Freshmen Rob King and senior Brian Britt received alltournament team honors, while Britt was named the tournament's Most Valuable Player. The only home losses for the Colonels came in lapses against Oglethorpe and Thomas More, and in a "barn-burner" with long-time rival Transylvania in front of a capacity crowd of "Centre Crazies."

Despite the Colonel's home success, their road struggles haunted them throughout the season. The Colonels were in the thick of the SCAC title race with only a trip to Rose-Hulman and DePauw standing between them and their first title since 1993. However, the road woes again plagued the Colonels with a $75-73$ loss at Rose-Hulman vanquishing their hopes of a conference championship.

The Colonels were led all season long by a starting line-up of three seniors and two juniors. Brian Britt (01) led the team in scoring (12.5 PPG), assists (4.9 PG), and steals (84) while breaking the school and conference career steals records, as well as the school's career assist record. Drew Park (01) turned in another solid year-long performance on both ends of the court 11.7 PPG and consistently shutting down opponents' big guns. After recovering from an apparent career-ending leg injury suffered toward the end of the '99' 00 campaign, Scott Guttery (01) (5 PPG, 5 RPG) came back to the hardcourt bringing his intensity, love of the game and a second chance attitude. Rounding out the starting line-up were Matt Mooney (02) and Doug Donaldson (02). Mooney finished the season fourth on the team in scoring at 11.2 PPG. He also placed second in the SCAC in three-pointers made per game (2.5) and fifth in 3-pt. percentage (37.1). Donaldson finished second on the
team with 11.8 PPG , and led the team in rebounds by pulling down 5.2 per game. Freshmen Rob King, James Booker and Jason Atwell consistently played productive minutes for the Colonels throughout the year. King ended the season with 7 PPG and 32 blocks, while Booker and Atwell tallied 4 PPG apiece. Juniors Luke Coffey and Wes Samons, sophomores Alex Bomba and Andrew Moore and freshmen David Hewitt, Jordan Sucher and Solomon Parker rounded out the Colonel roster.

The Colonels 2000-2001 season produced many exciting moments for the team. Although they fell just short of their conference championship goal, the team had a great year and created a firm foundation for the future of the men's basketball program. The team finished in fourth place in the SCAC, just two games out of first place. Three Colonels were also given individual honors. Britt was named to the all-conference second team, while Donaldson was given Honorable Mention status. King was named to the all-first year team. However, the team felt they did not receive the respect they earned. They will undoubtedly return to Sutcliffe Gym with a strong returning base and a good recruiting class to regain the position of dominance with which Centre dominance has long been associated.

## With a "Sweet" Ending to a Successful Year

The Lady Colonels women's basketball team completed their most successful season since the 1989-90 season when that team made it to the Final Four in the NCAA Tournament. The program's last appearance in the tournament was in the 1990-1991 season. The women ended their season this year with a $20-5$ record, including a $14-4$ mark in conference play. This was a major turnaround from coach Jennifer Ruff's first year just three years ago when the team finished with a dismal $5-20$ record. The excellent win-loss record led to a well-deserved bid to the NCAA Tournament.

The Colonel's chance of getting a tournament bid came down to the last conference game of the season. Centre faced DePauw, who was number one in the conference at the time, on DePauw's home floor. The game was a battle in which the women took control of and defeated the Tigers for the conference title, which gave the Lady Colonels an automatic NCAA tournament bid. Fortunately, Centre's first round game was played at home against the Saints of Thomas More College. Centre maintained a lead throughout the game until the Saints made a run to go ahead in the final seconds of the game. With composure, the team stayed together and pulled through with the win when Jennifer Patterson hit a last second shot under the basket. From there, the team traveled to Maryville, TN to compete against the Lady Scots of Maryville College. Maryville had previously handed Centre their only non-conference loss of the season. Centre defeated Maryville with confidence and with the support of many fans that made the journey. Baldwin Wallace College in Berea, OH , near Cleveland, was the site of the Sweet Sixteen. The women traveled to play Ohio Wesleyan in hopes of advancing to the Elite Eight; however, they fell victim to the Battling Bishops, who eventually advanced to the Final Four. The Lady Colonels played with heart but could not pull through for the victory, despite the enthusiasm of the dedicated Centre followers in the stands.

The women accomplished a lot throughout the year. In addition to the team success, three players received post-season awards. Sarah Green (02) made the All-SCAC First Team, Molly Alvey (01) earned a second team all-conference nod and Amy Barlow (04) was named to the SCAC All-First Year Team. The team has a bright future, as it graduates only two seniors, Jordan Sutton and Molly Alvey.

The women's 1600 m relay team of Jackie Walisa (04), Natalie Postel (04), Dana Patrick (04), and Rachel Jones (03) took the record from 4:16.41 (1998) down to 4:10.16 at the SCAC Championships. The women's 3200 m relay team of Walisa, Postel, Aubrey Durbin (03), and Cary Kemp (01) lowered the record from 10:33 (1994) to 10:18 at the Cumberland Invitational.

The only record to fall on the men's side was the 800 m Relay of Eric Heyman (03), Ryan New (04), James Booker (04), Lorenzo Engleman (04), which went from 1:29.98 (1999) to 1:28.97 at the Mountain Laurel Relays (Sewanee).

The track \& field team concluded their season with the SCAC Championships at DePauw University. The men finished in fourth place while the women took fifth place.

The dynamic duo of freshman Sean Smith and James Booker took 3rd and 4th in the 100 m dash, and 3rd and 2nd respectively in the 200 m dash. Heyman also placed 7th in the 100 m dash, while New took 7th in the 200 m dash and 5th in the 400 m dash.

In the 400 m hurdles, Centre dominated the field, taking three of the top four spots. Joe Guthrie (02) brought home the team's only 1st place finish, while Sam Allen (01) finished a close 2nd and Charlie Farnsley (04) took 4th place. In the 100 m hurdles, Guthrie finished 2nd and Allen finished 6th. Other scorers included Nate Jebsen (03) in the 1500 (8th), Carter Conley (02) in the javelin (4th), and Andrew Smith (02) in the discus (8th). The men's 400 m relay team took 4th despite a very costly baton exchange. The 1600 m relay team also took 4th in a very close finish.

The women's team was led by a young but very talented group. Patrick took 7 th in the 200 m dash and 7th in the shot put. Walisa placed 4th in the 400 m dash, while Postel took 7 th in the 800 m run and 4th in the 1500 m run. Moore took 3rd in the 100 m hurdles and 4th in the 400 m hurdles. Jones took 6 th in the 100 m hurdes, 8 th in the 400 m hurdles, 5 th in the 400 m dash, and 7 th in the long jump. Meridith Holbrook (03) placed 3rd in the high jump for the second consecutive year. Eva Bookjans (03) took 7th in the javelin throw. The women's 400 m relay team (Jones, Moore, Walisa, Patrick) placed 4th while the 1600 m relay team (Walisa, Postel, Patrick, Jones) placed a close 2nd.

The Colonels had to play without Hobbs, due to a freak accident to his hand, but came out with their best score of the spring season on day one. Fifner fired a surprise 72 to pace the Colonels the first day with the team shooting a 300 to be four shots back from perennial powerhouse Oglethorpe. The Colonels shot 307 on day two to finish well off the place and a tie for fourth place.

The women struggled throughout the year but did show signs of life at times. Jenny Thomas (03), and Emily James (03), paced the ladies much of the year while senior Ashlee Miller led the ladies with the wisdom she had accrued on and off the course through her year tenure with the team. The ladies missed All-Conference softball star Summer Milliner (01), for all but the conference tournament, where she played relatively well considering the layoff. The ladies were disappointed to miss Thomas for the conference tournament due to mono but still made a respectable showing, ultimately finishing seventh.

Both teams have most of their squads coming back for next year but will miss the senior leadership. The men look to win conference next year as they have four seniors who are hungry to win one for themselves and veteran coach Herb McGuire.

Some of the fans at one point had a sign reading: "If it was easy, everyone would do it." At the end, the runners ran down a chute bordered by stands, with huge lights shining on them. The announcer, via a loudspeaker system, would give each entrant's name as they ran the chute, then say, "You are an IRONMAN!" Tom and I were so exhausted when Kyle finished, I couldn't imagine how he felt. They had a tent for people needing medical attention, including IV's, and I wondered if they took non-participants. It was an exhilarating day, one I don't happen to want to duplicate in the near future.
