## Elmer Rabenstein

"Roundy" has been handicapped this year by an injury to his knee, which he received in the Clemson game, and it was not until the Auburn game that he once more donned the moleskin. It was after this game that one of the Birmingham papers said: "Rabenstein, the Kiski flash, played like a Roberts, Fletcher and Barron combined." In this Auburn game, and again in the Washington and Lee game, "Roundy" performed brilliantly. His line bucking, broken field running, and passing make him an able running mate for "Covie."

## Webster Seeley

"Webb," although he had played center, proved his versatility by playing end, tackle and guard in a most acceptable manner. Seeley was a bit weak on offense, due to his inexperience, but his defensive playing was of the highest type. Many critics ranked his defensive playing with that of the famous "Bo." "Webb" was one of the stars of last year's freshman team, and was only kept from a regular berth by the number of experienced letter men from the year before.

## Murrell Summers

"Jake" was the hardest charging man in the backfield, and we feel sure he could have butted his way through a stone wall. He is a line-plunger par excellence, and he makes good interference for his teammates. Despite his size, he is fast and a clever man at dodging would-be tacklers. ## Hope Hudgins

Hope, a lad who has practiced dodging the "Texas Bulls" so much, is at home on the gridiron with the pigskin under his arm, dodging, straight-running and squirming by his would-be tacklers. Hope played well in all the games, but it was in the State game that he was particularly good. On that wet and slimy field, Hudgins repeatedly slipped around the ends for long gains. ## Robert L. Thomasson <br> Fullback and End

## Basketball Season, 1924.



T the beginning of the basketball season, Coach Nicholson had seven letter men around which to build a winning team. The season was late in starting, and the coach's system was new to the team, so he had to work hard and fast. That he procured splendid results was shown by the fine playing of the team in the S. I. A. A. tournament. Much credit is due Coach Nicholson for his work.

Centre opened the season with Kentucky Wesleyan on January 12th. In this game Coach Nicholson saw that his team had the edge, and accordingly he gave all the players a chance.

January 17 found Bill Shadoan's Valparaiso team facing Centre. This team proved to be the best basketeers to play on the local floor this season. They edged out Centre in the final minutes of play by a very close score.

February 2, Centre played Transylvania. This game was a thriller, Centre winning by one point.

The Gold and White lost a hard-fought game to West Virginia on February 5th, after having a big lead early in the game.

In our gymnasium on February 9th, the team lost to Kentucky State, but not without giving the boys from Lexington a hard fight. State excelled us in team work, but they never could make our boys quit battling.

Centre's next move was a short trip to Western State Normal at Bowling Green, where they lost by one point. The following two nights were passed with the University of Louisville and St. Thomas at Louisville. Both were Centre's victims. The work of Dooley and Covington stood out in these two games.

February 20th saw V. P. I. fall before Centre, and on the 21st Centre lost the second game of the season to Kentucky State.

The Gold and White was not denied a Southern trip. Centre entered the S. I. A. A. at Macon, Georgia, and there proved her real worth by defeating the University of Chattanooga and Newberry, going into the finals with Mercer on February 28th. Centre's long journey and strenuous season were telling on the players, and she was forced to bow before the strong Mercer five in a very close game, in which Mercer had the advantage of playing on her home floor.

March ist found Centre closing the year with an easy victory over the University of Louisville at Danville. The timer's gun at the end of the game closed another successful basketball season for "Old Centre."







## 1923 Track

 HE past season has, in every sense of the word, been a success. The first meet was an easy victory over Maryville at Knoxville, Tenn, In the State meet, Centre won over her Kentucky rivals by a good margin. In this meet Kimbel broke the State record by making the mile in $4: 3 \mathrm{I}$. Robertson also broke a state record by running the 440 -yard dash in $503 / 4$ seconds. The relay team, composed of Mountjoy, Robertson, Berryman, and Kimbel, set a record at $3: 26$.

Centre won the Maryville meet, made a creditable showing in the S. I. A. A. meet, with several firsts, and placed second in the Florida Open; Berryman winning first in the 100 and 220, while Leonard, a Freshman, lost the Pentathalon by one point. Mountjoy won first in the pole vault against Maryville, tied for first in the state meet, and second in the S. I. A. A. In the high jump, Uncle Dick took first in the state, Maryville, and S. I. A. A. Berryman took first in the 100 and 220 in every meet he entered, covering the 100 in ro-flat. Robbie took second in the 220 , besides his record-breaking performance in the 440 . Kimbel was generally good for first in the half and the mile. Gordy won many points in the discus and shot-put. Sharon accounted for first in the javelin in the Maryville meet.

Mountjoy-Pole vault, hurdles, high jump, relay. Third year. Captain Mountjoy made a very inspiring leader, and led his team through a successful season.

Kimbel-Mile, half-mile, and relay. Fourth year. Preacher is an old dependable, and his graduation will be Centre's loss. We wish that we had him back with us this year.

Berryman-100, 220, broad jump, relay. Second year. Berry is a flash in the sprints, and we look for him to lower some Southern records this year. He should make a fine captain this year.

Gordy-Shot-put, discus, javelin. Second year. Minos is the team's strong man in every sense of the word, scoring most of our points in the weight events.

Robertson-440, 220, hurdles, relay. Second year. Robbie came out late and only took part in the state meet, where he starred by breaking a record. We will miss him this year.

Sharon-Pole vault, javelin, discus. Second year. Joe came through in fine style this year, and next year we expect even better from the world's fattest pole vaulter.
