
Athletic Director


Student Manager


. Halfback

MURRELL SUMMERS Halfback



Resume

HE first game in the new stadium was played against Carson-Newman. The weather was unusually hot, and the Jefferson City boys, used to such conditions, threw a scare into the Colonels by holding them to the lowest score on their home ground in the past seven years. Centre struggled to the tune of 13 to 0.

The following week found our boys entertaining the mighty Clemson Tigers.

The husky boys from South Carolina threw a bomb into the Colonels' midst when they crossed the Gold and White goal line in the first quarter. The Tigers could not hold their advantage, and with Covington's fine end running as an incentive, we swept to a 28 to 7 victory.

Centre never hit a real stride until the Oglethorpe game, when the team functioned as a unit and every man turned in a great exhibition of football. The defensive work of Chinn and the

terrific line plunging of Summers featured a well played 29 to o win.

With such an exhibition of high-class football, Centre left the following Wednesday for Philadelphia, where she met her only defeat of the year at the hands of the University of Pennsylvania. The first half was Centre's on downs, five to their one, but a miss in the machinery allowed Pennsylvania to score a field goal for the only points of the first half. The second half found the Gold and White unable to function smoothly, and several fumbles permitted the Quakers to run wild, and score three touchdowns. The defeat was due in part to Pennsylvania playing its best game of the season, while Centre played its worst.

On November the third, fourteen thousand football enthusiasts stood out in a heavy rain to see the annual classic between Centre and Kentucky State. The game was played in a sea of mud and, though outweighed twelve pounds to a man, the fighting, crying, praying Colonels sent the State boys back to Lexington on the short end of a ten to nothing score. The line was impenetrable, and the backs gained at will. Especially brilliant was the performance of Hope Hudgins. The next four games were played on foreign territory. Sewanee was the first victim, but a failure to catch a signal gave Sewanee a fifty-five-yard run for a touchdown, which was

the only blot upon a 20 to 6 victory.

Centre revenged the defeat of last year when she ran roughshod over the powerful Auburn team. In this game the Birmingham people were given a rare treat. They saw football as it should be played. Rabenstein flashed as a future star, and Captain Kubale led the team to a well-deserved victory, the score being 17 to 0.

On November 17th, the Louisville fans saw one of Centre's best games of the season. It found the Mayfield boys, Covington and Lemon, at their best. The whole team played well, and romped

to a 19 to o victory over Washington and Lee.

The last game of the season was played the Saturday following Thanksgiving day. Centre had suffered from a too strenuous schedule and a long trip to Athens, Georgia. The University of Georgia presented a strong, shifty team, and Centre was lucky to get a 3 to 3 tie. Lemon's place kicking featured and saved the day for Centre.


After the game the letter men met, and elected Herbert Covington next year's captain. "Covie" was the mainstay of the team, and well deserved the honor. We are all expecting Chief and


Covie to make next year the best that Centre has ever known.

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
JAMES E. GREEN, Forward and Guard




JOSEPH DOOLEY, Forward

February 20th saw V. P. I. fall before Centre, and on the 21st Centre lost the second game of the season to Kentucky State.







The next day Hicks let the visitors down with two hits and won easily, 7 to 1. Centre left the next day on her Southern jaunt. On the following day, Hicks relieved Holland in the first inning and held Carson-Newman scoreless while Centre came back and won the game in the ninth inning on a two-bagger by Rip Collins. The Colonels were rained out of their two games with Oglethorpe. Returning home, Centre won a notable victory over Kentucky State with the aid of Dewey Kimbel's mighty stick, and the timely hitting of Kinky Leathers. Covington, Green, and Peterson played good games, while Holland had State eating out of his hand.







ertson also broke a state record by running the 440-yard dash in 503/4 seconds. The relay team, composed of Mountjoy, Robertson, Berryman, and Kimbel, set a record at 3:26.

Centre won the Maryville meet, made a creditable showing in the S. I. A. A. meet, with several firsts, and placed second in the Florida Open; Berryman winning first in the 100 and 220, while Leonard, a Freshman, lost the Pentathalon by one point. Mountjoy won first in the pole vault against Maryville, tied for first in the state meet, and second in the S. I. A. A. In the high jump, Uncle Dick took first in the state, Maryville, and S. I. A. 

Gordy—Shot-put, discus, javelin. Second year. Minos is the team's strong man in every sense of the word, scoring most of our points in the weight events.


Robertson—440, 220, hurdles, relay. Second year. Robbie came out late and only took part in the state meet, where he starred by breaking a record. We will miss him this year.


Sharon—Pole vault, javelin, discus. Second year. Joe came through in fine style this year, and next year we expect even better from the world's fattest pole vaulter.

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

The membership of the club now comprises sixteen men, including Profs. Meier and Diez, honorary faculty members.


Meetings are held every two weeks, and the programs are rendered in Spanish.


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


HISTORY

The motto, "Wisdom is the principal thing; therefore, get wisdom," which Jeremiah Chamberlain, first president of Centre College and the founder of the Society, bestowed upon the organization, still serves to spur her members on to greater efforts for Centre and for Chamberlain.




With the start she is getting now, Deinologian's future, let us hope, will be to turn out statesmen, orators, and writers who will surpass those of the past.



PHI DELTA THETA



BETA THETA PI


