SAC successfully provided entertainment for the campus community for yet another year. There is no doubt that SAC will amaze the campus next year with even bigger and better events.

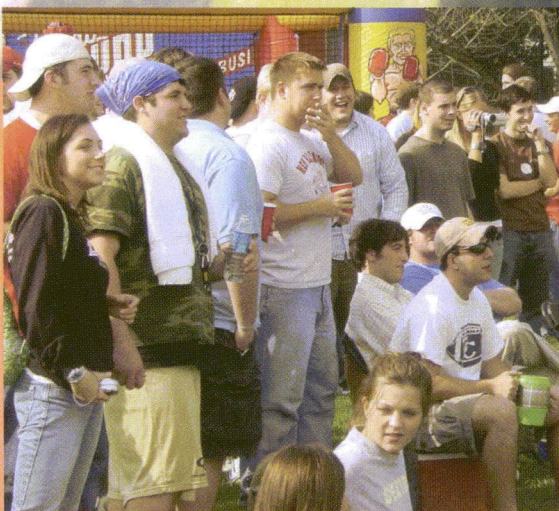

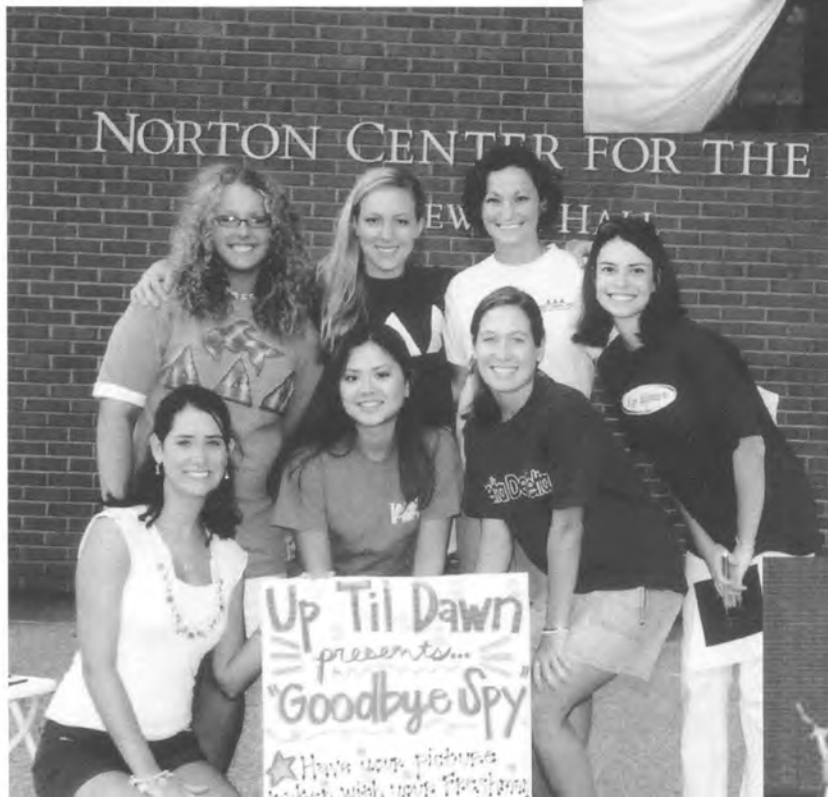

Beta Theta Pi

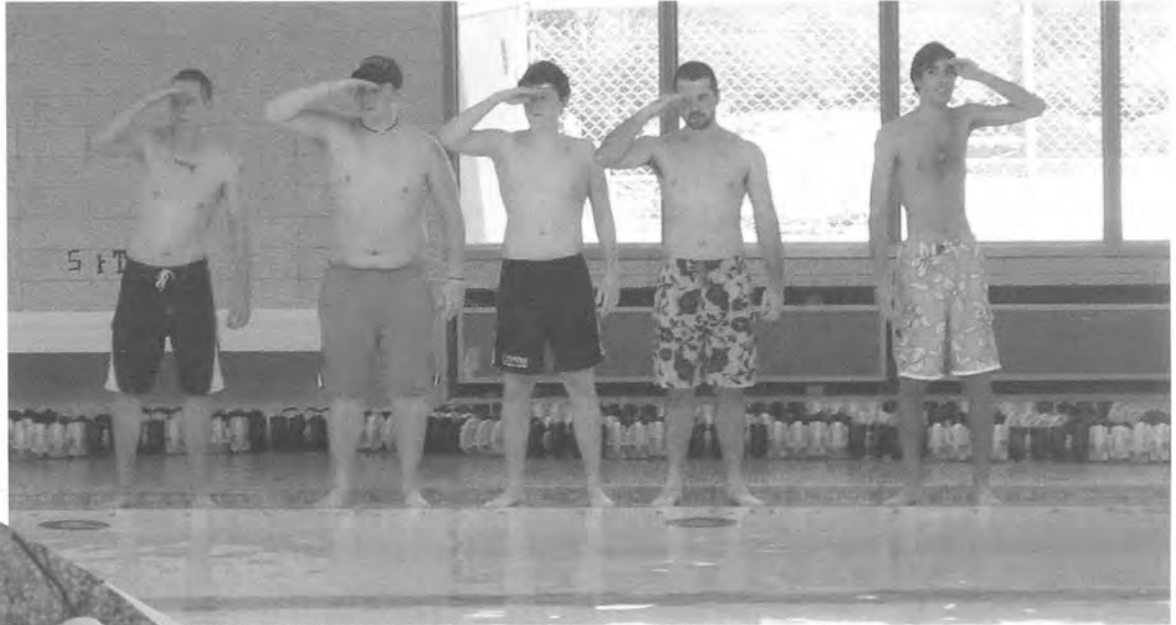

MEN'S BASKETBALL

The Centre Men's Basketball team finished the season with one of the top records in school history at 20-7. The team has not recorded 20 wins since 1989 and is only the fourth team in school history to reach that mark. Also, for the 6th straight season, the Colonels won their Holiday Tournament. The Colonels finished the regular season with the second best record in the SCAC and a third place seed in the conference tournament. The Colonels' season ended in the semifinal round of the tournament to the eventual conference champion Trinity.

The Colonels finished the season leading the SCAC in defensive rebounds/game (25.59), overall rebounds/game (36.7) and 3 point % defense (29.5%). The Colonels were 2nd in the SCAC in scoring margin (+7.8), 3 point field goals/game (7.33), and field goal % defense, holding opponents to 41.2% from the field.

Matt Nestheide received Freshman of the Year honors as well as being selected 2nd team All-Conference. Nestheide averaged 12 points (19th in SCAC) and 1.3 steals (12th in SCAC). He lead the conference in 3 point % shooting 51.3% on the year. He was also 4th in 3 pointers made with 58 on the season.

Reggie Magnusson and Coy Zerhusen were awarded honorable mention All-SCAC for their performances this season. Reggie averaged 13 points and 5 rebounds. He was 11th in scoring and 14th in rebounds in the conference. Coy averaged close to a double double with 10 points and 9.3 rebounds. He was 1st in the SCAC in rebounding and is currently 7th in SCAC history.

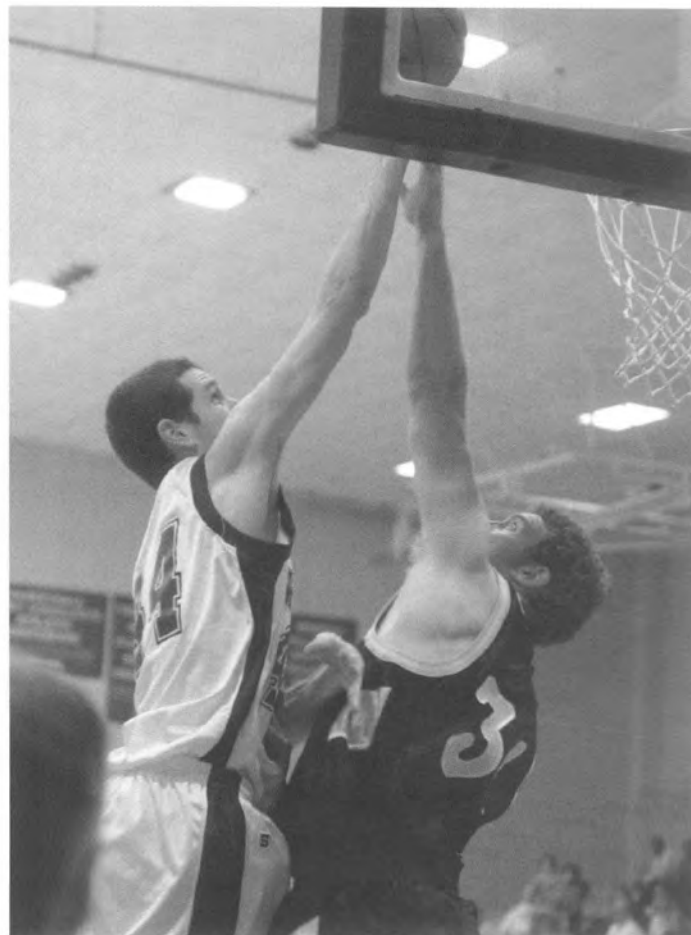


Right: Junior Adam Patterson takes it to the basket against a defender this season.

WOMEN'S BASKETBALL

The 2004-2005 women's basketball team finished the season with a 5-20 record and a 3-11 conference record. Senior point guard Amy Barlow finished her career at Centre with 990 total points. Barlow also leaves Centre in the SCAC record books with the second most career assists with over 400. She led the Colonels in assists with 3.1 per game.

Freshman Jayme Davis was the team leader in scoring and rebounding averaging over 12 points and seven rebounds in each contest. She ranked 14th in the SCAC in scoring and was ranked fifth in rebounding average. Davis was named to the Thomas More all-tournament team. Davis was awarded the team's Most Outstanding Player Award.

Sophomore Casey Geiman played her first full season for the Colonels and led the team in steals. She grabbed 83 steals over the season which ranked her third in the SCAC. Geiman also averaged over five rebounds and five points on the year and was named the Best Defensive Player for the team.

Freshman Sarah Sheeran was second on the team in scoring with 9.7 points per game. She was also third on the team in rebounding averaging 5.2 each game. Sheeran was named the player of the game at the Thomas More Tournament.

Lauren Clontz, a freshman post player, was awarded the team's Most Improved Player Award. She averaged 7.6 points per game and 1.9 rebounds per contest.

The women's team finished 5th place out of 21 teams in the regional championships in Atlanta, GA.

Eileen Schilling broke her own school record for the cross country 5K running an 18:32 at the Rhodes Invitational in Memphis, TN, and for the 6K running a 22:23 at the NCAA Division III National Championships in Eau Claire, WI. Eileen repeated as the individual winner of the Centre Invitational in a time of 19:11 for the 5K. She was named to the All-conference team for finishing second place overall in the conference championships in a 5K time of 18:44.

Lauren Arnold was named to the All-conference team for finishing 12th place overall in the conference championships in a 5K time of 19:35.

The women's team finished 4th place out of 10 teams in the conference championships in Jackson, MS. Lauren was named to the All-region team for finishing 21st place overall in the regional championships in a 6K time of 24:44. Eileen Schilling was named to the All-region team for finishing second place overall in the regional championships in a 6K time of 22:56.

Eileen Schilling, for the second year, qualified as an individual for the NCAA Division III National Championships by finishing second place overall in the regional championships. Eileen traveled to Eau Claire, WI where she competed and finished in 33rd place overall out of 215 of the best runners in the nation. The top 35 runners were named to the All-American Team, therefore, Eileen was named All-American once again; she was an All-American last fall as well with a 35th place finish. She ran a time of 22:23 for the 6K course.

FIELD HOCKEY

The Centre College field hockey team underwent a rebuilding year after losing seven seniors in 2003, four of which were Regional All-Americans. Coach Tom Hobbs recruited nine talented freshmen for the 2004 campaign, which featured the inaugural Centre College Invitational Field Hockey Kick-Off and the inaugural SCAC Championships hosted by Centre. Building team chemistry was a chief concern going into the season, and the Colonels faced several challenges along the way, as most young teams do. The amount of skill shown by the 2004 team was the best in recent history from top-to-bottom on the roster helping Centre to play very competitive matches against the best teams in the region. Against Wittenberg (who eventually made the NCAA tournament), the team was in the game until the last ten minutes. They played Rhodes (ranked second in the region) very tough and dominated possession in the SCAC tournament both out-shooting them and earning a plus-nine more penalty corner advantage. They also beat DePauw, who always has a strong program, in their final match. The Colonels went 3-15 on the season finishing third in the SCAC Championships. Four players were also named to the inaugural All-SCAC Field Hockey Team: Megan Jacob, '05; Ashley Distler, '08; Taylor Gray, '08; and Ann Guagliardo, '08.



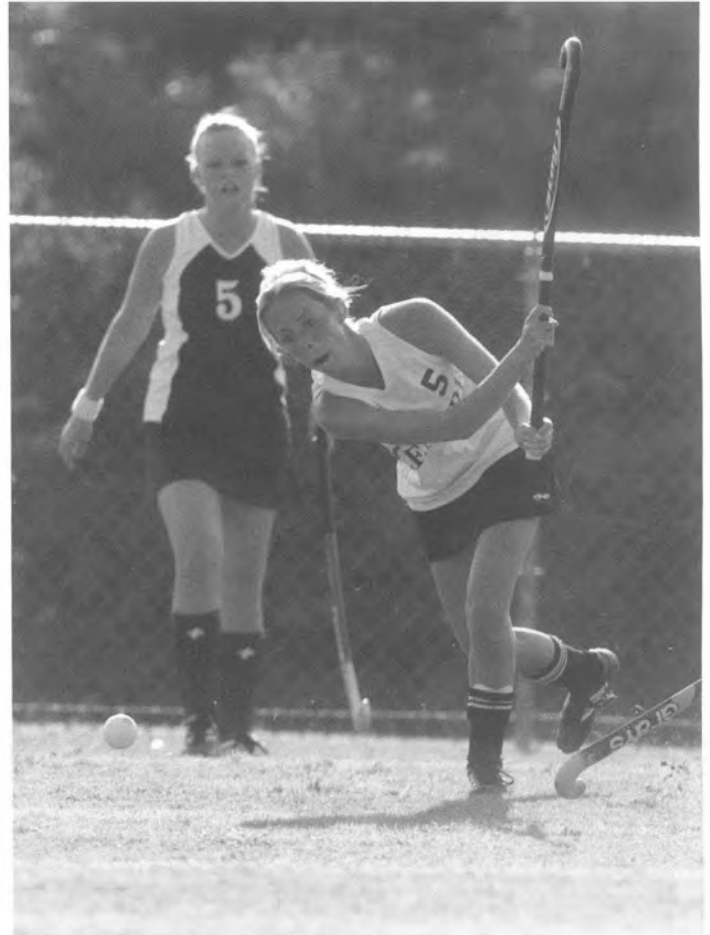

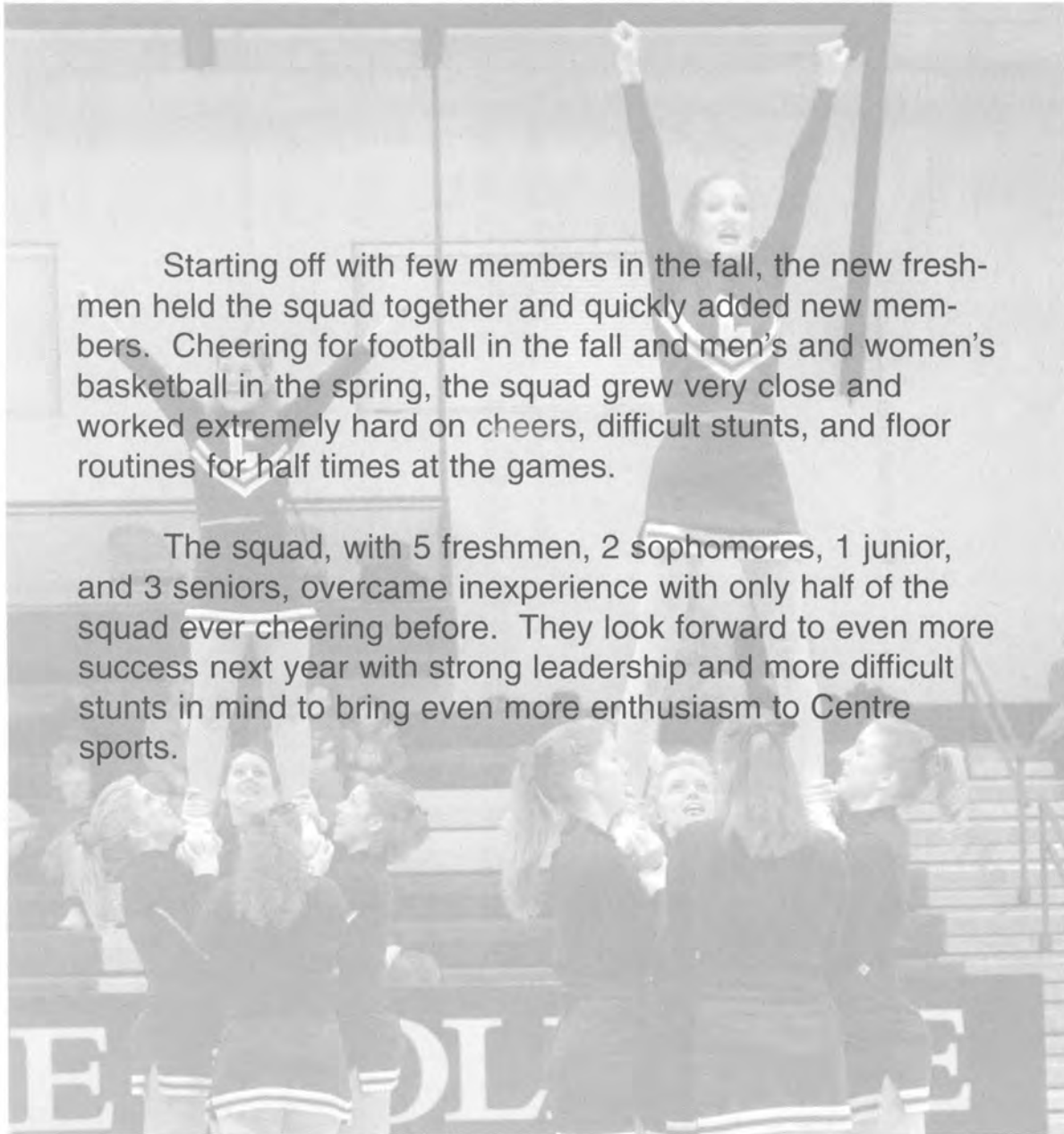

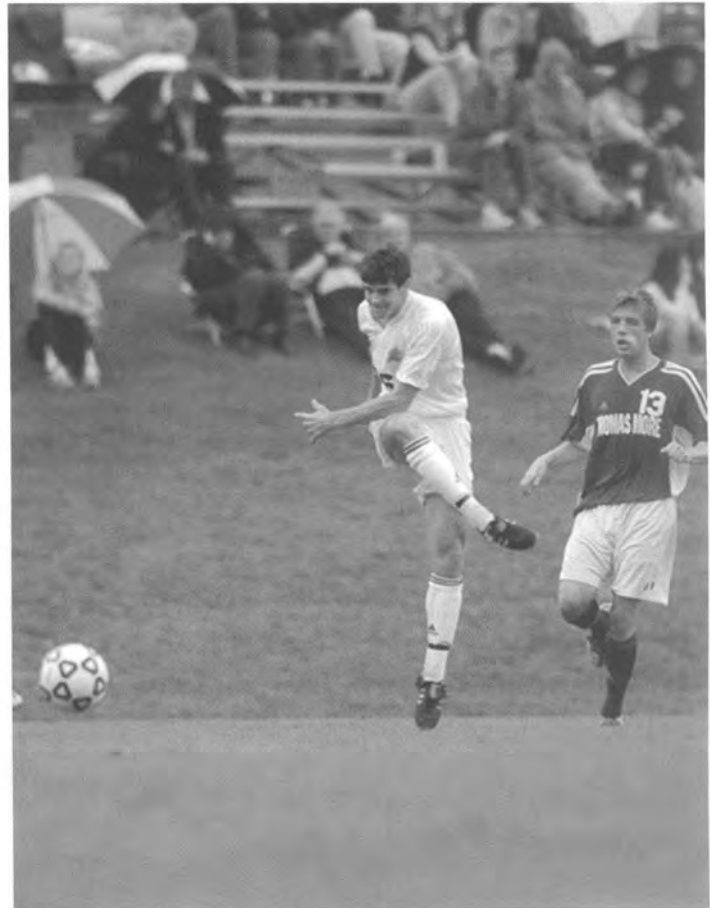

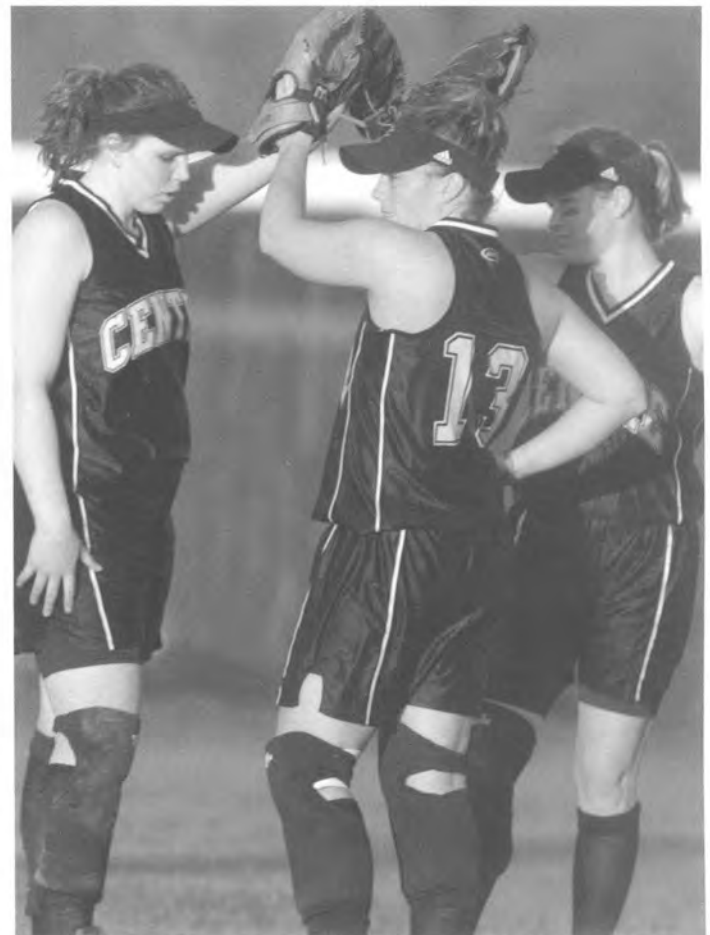

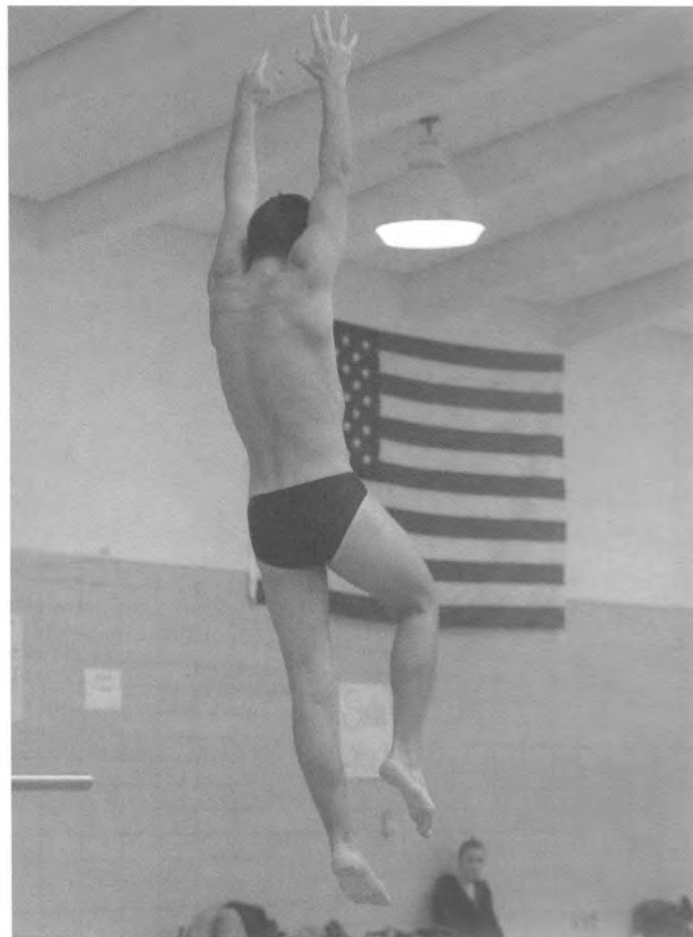

VOLLEYBALL

The 2004 women's Volleyball team finished this season at 28-12. The team was led by four seniors, Leah Ballinger, Whitney Faust, Danielle Norman, and Lisa Fryman, one junior, five sophomores, and three freshmen. The team had a great year defeating DePauw in three games for the first time in Centre Volleyball history. Other highlights of the season were knocking off Washington and Lee in three games to end their nineteen game winning streak and finishing the season with a 3-0 victory over conference rival Rhodes. While there were many individual honors, freshman Sarah Burger and senior Leah Ballinger were both named SCAC players of the week two times each giving Centre a player of the week for four of the nine weeks of the season.

As a team Centre won their opening tournament at Earlham College as well as both tournaments held at Centre College. The team had a perfect season at home going 10-0 knocking off big rivals such as Maryville, Thomas More, and Transylvania. Freshman Sarah Burger was named Southern Collegiate Athletic Conference Freshman of the Year and joined team mates Leah Ballinger and Whitney Faust on the All SCAC Team.

Burger was also named AVCA South Region Freshman of the Year, and she is the only athlete in volleyball history to receive this honor. She was also named to the AVCA South Region Team. The only other Colonel to receive this honor was teammate Leah Ballinger in 2000. The 2004 season has set a new precedent for Centre College Volleyball only to be built upon in future years.
