## Foreword . . .

### CENTRE'S 1947 FOOTBALL SEASON\*

Two football games won, one tied and five games lost is the record of the Centre Colonels for the 1947 season.


While this is by no means up to the standards of other and better football years it is, nevertheless, an improvement over 1946 when all games were lost. And the spirit of the 1947 squad was in every way better. The quality of play improved as the season progressed. The boys were in there battling every minute.

Head Coach Anderson and his assistants, Coaches Oliphant and Igleheart, greeted a large squad at the beginning of the training season composed pretty largely of fellows "out for the team," but without much football experience or apparent aptitude. It was a frantic rush against time to field a team of sorts for the opening game, September 27, from miscellaneous raw material unacquainted and uncoordinated.

### TOUGH OPPOSITION

For the most part the opposition was "tough." It should be stated that college teams nowadays are a far cry from the college teams of the pre-war era, before GIs, many with previous college and university experience, brought the power to so many of the small college squads. At least two teams on Centre's schedule in 1946 could have given many of the big university teams a busy afternoon.

Our Colonels, viewed objectively, although a pretty good college team, lacked the combination of size, speed, football "savvy," proficiency in fundamentals of football necessary to win consistently over high grade opposition. Playing with snap and go most of the time, even brilliantly on occasion, still the Colonels did not pack enough heavy guns to smash through or otherwise dominate the play when a little more offensive punch at the right moment would have earned some mighty important touchdowns.

#### GAVE THEIR BEST

Too light in the backfield for sustained drives and weak as a team on forward pass defense, games were lost that probably could have been won with just two or three of the right men in the right spots. Injuries to key men throughout the season worked a great hardship. But let it be known that the 1947 Colonels gave all they had in the best tradition of Centre teams of old. No Centre team of any day ever fought harder or deserved praise and support more.

Maryville and Mississippi College were too good for us in material and resources. Arkansas State was out of our class. The tie with Southwestern at Memphis speaks for itself. And we were too good for Tusculum and Bethel. It was nip and tuck between Centre and Hanover and Sewanee. With a better break or two here and there in our favor instead of the other way round, we could just as well have won from them.





### BASKETBALL GETS GOING\*

With five letter men returning from the 1946-47 basketball squad, Coach Harve Oliphant had a working nucleus available for the present season. Forwards Cunningham and Smith, Guards Brummett and Todd, and Hughes, center, were on hand. Lost to the squad were George Day, turned professional, and Ernest Hart recovering from a knee operation.

Between 60 and 70 candidates reported for initial practices which had to be held in day and night shifts. Several players of promise were uncovered although they were for the most part without college basketball experience. Of necessity the squad had to be cut to 18 men.

### WIN FIRST GAME

The season began with a bang when the new team under a new coach took the strong Oakland City, Indiana, College aggregation by a score of 45 to 35. Top scorers for the Colonels were Jim Hughes with 13 points, and Bob Hill with 11.

The 1947-48 edition of the Colonels is a hustler and should win a good share of its games. It is well taught by Coach Oliphant, who hails from Vincennes, Indiana, originally. He was captain of his basketball team and a Missouri Valley forward at Grinnell College, Iowa, graduating in 1936.

Oliphant's previous coaching career includes a year at Mt. Clemens, Michigan, High School, and four years at Adrian College, Adrian, Michigan. Prior to entering the Army in 1944, he was for two years a physical instructor for ASTP units at Grinnell. He is assistant professor of education and basketball coach at Centre.

### BRAZILIAN JOURNALIST TO ADDRESS STUDENTS TUESDAY, NOVEMBER 4

Dr. Hernane Tavares De Sa', Brazilian journalist, author, and lecturer, will address the students of Centre College on the topic: "Communism in Latin America," at a joint convocation on November

Dr. Tavares, born in Brazil in 1911, was the son of parents whose families had settled in the country in the 16th century. His father, who was in the Brazilian diplomatic service, traveled exclusively in Europe and North America. It was during these travels that Dr. Tavares gained his knowledge of English, French, Italian, and Spanish. He studied in Brazil, and at the University of Louvain, Belgium, 1929-1935, where he received the degree of Doctor of Medicine.

Since 1941 Dr. Tavares has been contributing to a column on United States—

Since 1941 Dr. Tavares has been contributing to a column on United States—Brazilian relations in the Jornal do Brasil of Rio de Janeiro. He has also had articles published in such North American periodicals as the Saturday Review of Literature, the New York Herald-Tribune, Asia and the Americas, and The Inter-American.

In 1943-44 Dr. Tavares was advisor in the Office of Coordinator of Inter-American Affairs, and during this time worked as consultant with Mr. Walt Disney on educational films for Latin America. In the summer of 1943 he taught a course on Brazilian Civilization at Mills College. In the fall of 1946 he lectured in colleges and universities in the United States, after which he returned to Brazil. In August of 1947, Dr. Tavares published a book entitled The Brazilians: People Of To-

If shoulder pads had been available for the cheerleaders, Swede Anderson might have sent the leather-lunged lasses into the ball game as his Centre College Colonels battered a hapless Bethel College football team into submission 33-6 last Saturday afternoon in Farris Stadi-

Joe Brummett gathered in Jim Mahar's opening kick-off on the five, then cut to his right behind a wave of blockers and streaked 95 yards along the sideline to give the Colonels an early lead that was never threatened. Briscoe Inman drilled the placement between the uprights.

Centre added two touchdowns in the second period. Jay Oatts, cast in the role of the invisible man, took a 25-yard pass from Charlie Long and scampered the remaining 15 to pay dirt as the Colonels delighted the fans with their specialty, the whiskered old sleeper play. Inman's attempted conversion was wide. Jim Daugherty, substitute halfback, set up the Colonels third tally when he intercepted Ralph Winsett's pass and sprinted 20 yards to the Bethel 20. A pass from Charlie Long to Mark Adams gave Centre a first down on the Bethel three. Adams blasted through center for the score and Inman's conversion boosted Centre's halftime lead to 20-0.

The Colonels started rolling again in the third period as they marched 41 yards for a touchdown with Billy Schooley culminating the drive on a six-yard jaunt around end. Inman failed to convert.

The Bethel offense came to life briefly midway through the final period. Fred Wallace intercepted a Centre pass and was downed on the Centre 34. Maurice Wheat flipped a short pass to Milt Newsome, who fought his way down to the Centre six. Wheat drilled a buck pass to Newsome for the Bethel score. Mahar's attempted conversion was wide.

The Colonels racked up their fifth touchdown in the waning moments of the game. Lyle Cline, fleet footed Centre halfback, leaped high to pick a Bethel pass out of the air on the Centre 15 and raced 85 yards to score. The Bethel defense was caught napping as Inman flipped a pass to Jack Reardon for the extra point.

With Adams and Brummett paving the way the Colonels started a sustained march with eight minutes left to go in the ball game. Mark Adams, ace plunger, broke thru' center, cut to his right and went 31 yards unmolested for the only Coloneis tally.

The Colonels almost pulled out from the deadlock, when on the last play of the game, Bush, a fine runner and substitute for Adams, grabbed a Lynx aerial and headed for pay dirt. However, he was stopped within inches of t. d. territory by being knocked out of bounds as the final gun went off.

As far as statistics are concerned, both teams had 10 first downs, but the Colonels outrushed the Lynx on the ground 182 to 108. One long pass completion gave Southwestern an edge in this department 63 to 22.






Wiseman picked up a touchdown late in the final stanza when Kampner aerialed to Cushman for six points, and the same combination worked for the conversion.

# DOCTOR GROVES INAUGURATED TODAY

The Inaugural and 1948 Homecoming program at Centre College was formally launched at 2:30 o'clock last Thursday afternoon, the program opening on the theme, "Science and the College." The following outstanding speakers were heard at this time: Walter J. Murphy, editor of "Engineering and Industrial Chemistry," and T. Hunton Rogers, member of the class of '14 at Centre, and director of research for the Standard Oil Company of Indiana. After the speeches, there was an open house at Young Science Hall, sponsored by Phi Beta Chi.

The re-opening of the newly renovated Young Science Hall was featured next on the program: Supper at the First Presbyterian Church, and addresses at 8 p. m. by Alexander Wetmore, secretary, Smithsonian Institute, and Sumner T. Pike, member of the Atomic Energy Commission.

Friday saw the following outstanding men speaking on these subjects: Dr. E. Fay Campbell, Secretary, Board of Christian Education; Dr. Frank H. Caldwell, President, Louisville Presbyterian Seminary, and Dr. Henry H. Sweets, Consultant Christian Education, "The Church and the College"; Mr. Cecil Gamble of the Proctor and Gamble Company, "Industry and the College"; and the Hon. Simeon S. Willis, Governor of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, "Government and the College."

The actual inauguration ceremonies will take place today, beginning at 9:15 a.m., with an Academic Procession from Old Centre to Boyle-Humphrey Gym where Dr. Walter Groves will become the 16th president of Centre College.

The principal address at the inauguration rites will be delivered by Mr. Tom Clark, Attorney General of the United States.

Delegates from such leading colleges and universities as Harvard, Yale, Princeton, Washington and Lee, Columbia, Dartmouth, Virginia, Northwestern, Johns Hopkins, and many others will be present for the inauguration ceremonies.

United States Senators from Kentucky, Alben Barkley and John Sherman Cooper, and Representative Walter H. Judd are expected to be present.

Following the inaugural ceremonies, there will be a luncheon in honor of Dr. Groves at the Goodall Plant.

The next event carded on the special

week-end program will be the Centre-Sewanee football game at 2:00 p. m., in Farris Stadium. After the game there will be a Homecoming Reception at the President's Home.

At 6:00 p.m. there will be an "Alumni-Alumnae" dinner at the Goodall Plant. The speakers at this dinner will be the president of the University of the South at Sewanee, Dr. Alexander Guerry, and President Charles E. Diehl of Southwestern University at Memphis.

The Homecoming Ball at 9:00 p. m. tonight in the Boyle-Humphrey Gym will be the final feature of the Inauguration-Homecoming program.

### OLD GRADS SEE NEW CENTRE

With the inauguration of Dr. Walter A. Groves as our President today, the climax of the 125th Homecoming of Centre College will have been reached. The faculty and students wish to take this opportunity to extend a warm welcome to the many old alumni and friends who have come to Danville to join in the Homecoming celebration and, by so doing, have helped toward making that event not only one which will be long remembered as the biggest and best of the year, but one of which the school can well be proud.

Just now the biggest project in progress on the campus is the complete remodeling of the Young Science Building. The job was started last summer, and although a great deal has already been done, it will still be some time before the work is completed. The building has been divided into departments with the Physics Department in the basement, the Biology Department on the first floor and the Chemistry Department on the second floor. The physics and biology laboratories have been completely overhauled, and much new equipment has been obtained for all three of the departments. The science building will be well equipped in every respect when it is finished.

The remodeling of the Breckinridge Hall dormitory has been completed and the building has certainly improved over former years. On the first floor is a large lounge furnished with couches, easy chairs, card tables, and a large new floor model radio-phonograph set. There are also lounges on the second and third floors for the convenience of the boys. Telephones have been installed on all three floors. In front of the building, new walks have been laid, replacing the original driveway, while in the rear,

ample parking space has been provided for cars.

A completely new recreational building has sprung up on the campus this year. It is located directly behind Old Main and has been affectionately called "The Hangout." Although the opening of the building has been delayed, it is expected to start operation sometime next week, or possibly sooner. Centre has needed such a place as "The Hangout" for quite some time, and it should be to everyone's liking. In the center room there will be two pool tables, a ping-pong table and a juke box to accompany the new dance floor. There will also be a lounge and reading room in the rear of the building. A snack bar has been provided along with a well equipped kitchen for the use of independent organizations and various college social functions.

Another stride forward, from the standpoint of the students, is the work of the Student Council and the Honor Council. The Student Council has become a well regulated functioning group representing the interests of the students. The men of the Student Council have done a commendable job on every problem put before them. The main work of the Honor Council has been the revision of the Honor System to the satisfaction of the faculty and students alike. The system now in use, along with the revisions which were accepted by the students at the beginning of this year, was first tried successfully for a short time last summer. So far this year, the system has been working very satisfactorily.

In an effort to further expand and develop Centre's well-rounded extra-curricular program, there have been a number of various clubs and organizations formed for the first time on the campus this year. The Sociology Department is offering a new course in Medical Care which will be available for the first time next semester. This is the first time such a course has ever been offered in a Sociology Department of an American university or college. Also formed for the first time here are the Camera Club and the Art Club. Both of these organizations are rapidly becoming popular with the students, and membership is high. At the beginning of the year the Y.M.C.A. and the Y.W.C.A. made plans for a series of Forum Discussions to be given periodically during the school term. Since that time, two such discussions have been presented, both of which were successful.



### ATTORNEY GENERAL'S TALK WAA HOST TO SEVEN HIGHLIGHTS INAUGURATION

On Saturday, November 15, 1947, Dr. Walter A. Groves was made the sixteenth President of Centre College. The program was held in the flower bedecked Boyle-Humphrey Gym where some 650 alumni and friends had gathered to witness the ceremonies.

The ceremony began with the Academic procession from Old Centre to the gym of some 150 representatives from various colleges and universities throughout the nation. They were garbed in their caps and gowns with colored hoods representing their various schools. Also in the parade were the trustees and faculty of Centre along with the notables and dignitaries who had delivered talks during the three-day celebration.

The highlight of the morning was a semi-formal address, delivered in large part extemporaneously, by U. S. Attorney General Tom Clark.

The Attorney General's address was an elcquent plea for freedom. Freedom, he asserted, cannot be taken for granted, but must be re-won by every generation.

Mr. Clark made frequent references to Chief Justice Fred M. Vinson, Centre alumnus. During the course of his address, Clark revealed that he is a descendant of Judge Samuel McDowell who presided at the conventions which brought Kentucky her statehood and first constitution.

### ANNUAL CANDLELIGHT SERVICE SUNDAY WILL FEATURE CHOIR

Christmas Candlelight Service, presented each year by the Centre choir in co-operation with the Y.W.C.A., will be given at 4:30 on Sunday, December 14, in the K.C.W. auditorium.

## KENTUCKY COLLEGES

Saturday, Centre had the honor of being host to 135 girls from seven Kentucky colleges for the state-wide Fall Play Day. Chartered buses arrived at 8:40 bringing girls from Kentucky Wesleyan. Nazareth, University of Kentucky, Berea, Eastern, Ursilin and the University of Louisville. Action began at 9:30 with elimination games of hockey and volleyball. Ursilin and the University of Kentucky were finalists in hockey with the University of Kentucky coming out on top. Although University of Kentucky captured the volleyball title, Centre's team made an outstanding showing in the afternoon finals. Rosemary McCarthy, Juanita Todd and Martha Kornfeld are a few of the girls who helped Centre's team work smoothly. After a state W.A.A. meeting and lunch in the K.C.W. dining room, the swimming match began. Marjorie Marshall and Martha Kornfeld won the relay for Centre and Georgianne Sisco represented Centre in side, back, and breast stroke form. The University of Louisville won the Australian crawl and Nazareth captured first place in the back crawl and the side stroke. Swimming ended at 4:15 and at 5:00 the buses returned 135 exhausted girls to their respective schools.

### SIG ALPH QUINTET WINS FRAT CROWN

The SAE basketball team sewed up first place in the fraternity division of the intramural basketball league when they came from behind to defeat the Sigma Chis 27-25 in a hard fought battle Tuesday night. The victory gave them a 6-2 won and lost record.

The Sig Alph victory came more as a result of teamwork in offense and concentration on defensive tactics than on feeding a single scorer and playing a faster, looser game. This point is borne out by the statistics released by the athletic office for the entire season. They show that only one of the Violets finished among the top ten scorers in the frat league. Dick Wilson, SAE pivot man. wound up the season in second spot with 64 points, three behind the Beta's Andy Blane.

In total offensive work the Sig Alphs also trailed the pack with 268 points, or an average of 33.5 points per game. This mark was fourth behind the 38.6 average of the Betas, the 35.1 for the Dekes, and the 36.1 of the Sigs. The Phi Delts brought up the rear with a 30.5 average.

Only when defensive averages are consulted do the Sig Alps show their winning margin. They allowed their opponents only 236 points or 29.5 per game. The Phi Delts ranked second in this department with a 35.0, the Sigma Chis were third with a 35.2 average, and the Dekes were fourth with a 36.1 defensive average.



The Phi Kappa Tau Fraternity has received permission from the Centre College Board of Trustees to re-establish the Delta Chapter of Phi Kappa Tau which was chartered in 1914 at Centre.

Donald W. Dilley, Field Secretary for the National Fraternity, arrived at Centre last week in preparation for a selection program designed to procure for the fraternity, eligible students from Centre's non-fraternity men to form a nucleus for the new group. After the initial rush Banquet-Dinner at Beaumont Inn eight Centre men accepted the White Trimmed Norman Shield with a gold star, pledge pin. The men are as follows:

David W. Beggs, Thomas Seward, Charles Wright, William H. Logan, Richard A. Bittman, Arthur P. Eberts, William B. Cheney, Jr., and Stephen Russin.

The rush week outlined by the Inter-Fraternity Council and Mr. Dilley will continue until Saturday. February 28. and any further additions to the above pledge class will be announced.

Phi Kappa Tau was founded at Miami University, Oxford, Ohio, March 17, 1906. The Old Delta Chapter at Centre was the first chartered chapter outside of the State of Ohio, and holds the position of fourth in order of foundings in the fraternity.

The Delta Chapter discontinued activity on the Centre Campus during the depression in 1932.

The plans for reformation of the fraternity at Centre were started two years ago by Ewing Bowles, Centre Alumni and president of the Ohio Company, John Cotton, Centre Alumni and past president of the Phi Kappa Tau fraternity, and Herbert Meyers, Delta Alumni and business manager of Centre College. These men directed the campaign for subscription to the housing fund which is under the same contract that the other five fraternities on the campus hold. The campaign has been successful in that the required amount (\$12,000) has been raised toward the construction of afraternity house in the prescribed "Frat Row" at Centre.

The Inter-Fraternity Council gave Mr. Dilley permission to go ahead with a shortened rush period after he had met and become acquainted with the nonfraternity men on the campus. Mr. Dilley said, after meeting a good portion of the student body, "I find the calibre of Centre man as high as I have ever seen."

Richard J. Young, executive secretary for Phi Kappa Tau, en route to Miami, Florida, for the installation of a new chapter, arrived on the campus Thursday to attend the Banquet-Dinner held at Beaumont Inn, in Harrodsburg at 7 p. m. to open the rush week.

### "DEAR RUTH" CHOSEN FOR SPRING PLAY PRODUCTION

Show Will Appear Sometime In May

Professor West T. Hill announced Thursday morning that the Broadway hit, "Dear Ruth," will be the spring production of the Centre College Players Club. The exact date for the play has not as yet been fixed, but Mr. Hill set May 20 as the approximate date of the production.

Last semester there was considerable criticism of the production of "The Little Foxes" and in an attempt to supply the college with a well-rounded dramatic program, Mr. Hill has set up a schedule of one serious and one light dramatic production for each school year instead of the usual two heavy productions.

"Dear Ruth" differs from the usual comedy play in the fact that it is divided into two acts of three scenes each, instead of the usual three acts. The play, throughout most of its length, takes place in the Georgian setting of a living room. It depicts the war years, and concerns a fifteen-year old girl who writes servicemen, using her older sister's name and pictures. Complications arise upon the arrival of one corresponding serviceman. The play proceeds from this point with an unfaltering stream of wit. "Dear Ruth" ran approximately three years on Broadway and at one time was being played by fourteen scheduled road companies, which should, in itself, attest to the popularity of this farcical comedy.

The cast will consist of five boys and five girls selected from the ranks of the Players Club. The casting will reportedly be held sometime next week, and the greatest of emphasis is being placed on this difficult job.

Tryouts for the newly organized bowling league were held Tuesday afternoon at 4:00 p. m. The league is being directed by Coach Anderson in conjunction with C-Club. If it is possible there will be two four-team leagues bowling alternately on Tuesday and Thursday afternoons.

### STUDENT HANGOUT COMPLETED

A bigger and better new student hangout has recently been made available to Centre men and women on the Men's Campus. The 120 foot white frame building is situated directly behind Old Main. The hall has a well furnished reading and lounge room with a piano and a large space with tables and chairs, also used on occasion for the smaller dances. There is a juke box to furnish music when the "Centre Music Makers" are not giving out. The reading and lounge room is kept furnished with periodicals by the Centre Y.M.C.A. There is also a kitchen and snack counter where breakfasts, luncheons, and snacks can be had throughout the day until ten at night.

## CENTRE AGREES TO INSTALL NAVAL ELECTRONICS UNIT

Following Lt. (j. g.) Rote's discussion last week on the advantage of an Electronics Unit, Centre College has agreed to the establishment of a Naval Reserve Electronics Unit in the Young Science Building.

The Physics Department will receive equipment including four or five transmitters, a portable transmitter, a 16 mm. sound on film projector, sonar, and radar equipment.

A 500 watt station—twice the strength of WHIR—is planned which will operate on both military and amateur frequencies in code or voice. The station will be used as a part of a nation-wide hookup once a week for a two-hour period. The movie projector can be used for both entertainment and instructional purposes.

The unit is to be organized under the Naval Reserve. Although there will be no pay, veterans can retain their present ank and longevity pay. Those who join will not be subject to military service and can resign at any time.

The staff chosen for the unit is as follows:

Coach Carl Anderson, Commanding Officer.

Bob Holland, Executive Officer.

Mr. Ellis, Electronics Officer.

Mr. Durham, Communications Officer.

In expressing his view on the new unit, Dean Davis said, "I feel that this installation is a very important one. The implications are more far reaching than at first appears. For example, among the equipment is listed a 16 mm. sound on film projector, something which we sorely need and the cost of which we cannot at this time afford. Also, I believe that a little ingenuity on the part of the boys can fashion a public address system that will be most useful. Many of the Eastern Colleges now operate a college network of radio programs—this equipment would enable us to join them.

"In addition to these purely material gains there is the added experience and scientific knowledge which each of the boys engaged can secure. The top limit on size is in the neighborhood of 40 men, so I urge all interested men to join in this program."

### SIGMA CHI WINS DISTINCTION

The Zeta Zeta Chapter of Sigma Chi at Centre, has won the annual National Sigma Chi Scholarship Trophy for the second time in succession, marking the first time that any Chapter in Sigma Chi has repeated twice in a row. Presentation of the trophy will take place in January, the presentation speaker being Major General Patrick J. Hurley, Grand Consul of Sigma Chi and former United States Ambassador to China.

The local Sigma Chi Chapter also won the Yerkees Scholarship Trophy for posting highest grades on the Centre campus.

### HONOR COUNCIL CLAMPS DOWN

Code To Be Strictly Enforced For Rest Of School Year

A special meeting of the Faculty Discipline Committee, the Student Council and the Men's Honor Council was called Tuesday, December 16, by Dean Davis and was held in his office. The three groups met together for approximately two hours to discuss what should be done with the Men's Honor Code. The final resolution that was adopted was to keep the system in effect until the end of the year on a trial basis.

It was brought out that the system as it is now employed is not functioning up to the desired expectations although as a whole it is meeting with its greatest success this year since its innovation in 1945. Most of the failure of the system seems to be found in the Freshman sections of required courses. The Honor Council has refrained from serious action this year, feeling that perhaps the reported violations were merely a hangover from high school days and that after some time at Centre the students would realize that cheating is just not done at Centre. However, the Honor Council feels that enough time has lapsed and from now on definite action will be taken against reported offenders.

Most of the complaints against violation of the system came from students who felt that it was unfair to them when some members of the class cheated. The Council advises all such students to present evidence and names of such classes and violators to them for further investigation and action. The faculty is also being asked to co-operate more fully with the system by closer scrutiny of tests before and after they have been given. The Council has been assured of full faculty support.

It is hoped by all members of the Student and Faculty governing Committees that the students will help make the honor system work as effectively as it does in many of the colleges and universities throughout the nation. It is for the student alone that the system has been voted in at Centre and it is up to the entire student body to make it work and keep it here as a fine part of the Centre tradition. The Honor Council makes the plea for co-operation so that we shall have an honor system among honorable students instead of a beat the Prof system where nothing is gained.

### 1947-48 ARTIST SERIES

Students at Centre will have the opportunity of hearing two outstanding individuals and a symphony this season. Under an agreement with the Danville sponsors of the Artist Series, special performances are given for Centre College students. On October 30, Patricia Travers will be featured with her violin; on April 14, R. Firkuschny, pianist, is scheduled, and the Saint Louis Little Symphony closes the series on May 12.





### BRIDGE TRYOUTS NARROWED DOWN

The National Intercollegiate Bridge Tournament is an annual contest of Contract Bridge in which men and women undergraduates compete for a Championship title and trophy awarded by the Intercollegiate Bridge Tournament Committee.

The colleges and universities invited to enter the tournament are those accredited by the Association of American Universities, as listed by the United States Department of Education. The tournament has the endorsement of the Association of College Unions.

All competing colleges play a set of eighteen prepared hands, sent by mail to the committee. These are scored by a recognized expert. The sixteen highest ranking pairs in the Tournament are then invited to a face-to-face final round, to be played within the near future at Chicago, Illinois. For the purposes of the tournament, the United States has been divided into eight zones on the basis of the geographical proximity and numerical distribution of the more than three hundred accredited colleges invited to participate. The sixteen pairs qualifying for the finals will represent two colleges from each of the eight zones.



## A BRIEF HISTORY OF CENTRE'S GRIDIRON ACCOMPLISHMENTS

In the spring of 1880 the first intercollegiate football game to be played in the South was called at Lexington, Kentucky, between Centre College and Transylvania College. Since that day, sixty-eight years ago, Centre has maintained her interest in college football and has done her part in adding to the glory of the game.

Centre's teams from 1919 to 1924 gained great national recognition, but other teams and their coaches are remembered with equal pride.

The Centre eleven was undefeated for the years 1893 to 1896. On that squad were Dickie Van Winkle, one of the South's great ends, and George Colvin (later president of the University of Louisville), whom Centre men rate with "Bo" McMillin. The teams of 1911 and 1912 are remembered for such stars as Jimmy Carl Ramsey and the Seelbach brothers.

Robert L. (Chief) Myers gave Centre her winning teams from 1918 to 1924. Coach Myers brought a group of stars to his alma mater that time has not yet dimmed. From Texas, where he had been coaching in high school, he brought "Bo" McMillin, quarterback; Matty Bell, an end; Sully Montgomery, a tackle; Red Weaver, a center; and Bill James, a tackle. These boys, together with Red Roberts of Somerset, Kentucky, formed the heart of the Centre team. The Colonels during these years won impressive victories against such great teams as Kentucky, Virginia, Clemson, West Virginia, V. P. I., and Tulane.

In 1918, Centre obtained the part-time services of "Uncle Charlie" Moran, a National League umpire, and "Chief" Myers took the position of Athletic Director. From 1918 to 1924 Centre placed three men on Walter Camp's first All American team. They were "Bo" McMillin, Red Weaver, and Red Roberts. Herb Covington and Minor Gordy gained national recognition from 1921 to 1924.

The crowning point of all these years was of course the Centre-Harvard game played on October 29, 1921. The following description of the winning plays of the game is quoted from the 1922 "Old Centre": "Roberts kicked off for Centre at the beginning of the third quarter. Chapin caught the ball on the two-yard line. On the second line-up the Crimson punted and Bartlett caught the ball in mid-field and brought it back to Harvard's 45-yard line. Harvard was penalized here for tripping and the ball went up to her 30-yard line. On the first line-up McMillin took the ball, and after breaking through Macomber, Chapin, and Kunhardt and with a thrilling sprint in which he skillfully dodged three of the crimson's secondary defense,

crossed Harvard's line for the touchdown." The Colonels continued to carry the fight to the Harvard eleven throughout the remainder of the game. Thus, Centre—a school with less students in its entire enrollment than were on the Harvard squad—had accomplished what the great universities in the land had for five years tried in vain, to defeat the mighty Crimson of Harvard.

Moran left Centre in 1923, but "Chief" Myers stayed on long enough to turn out a Southern championship team in 1924. The high point of the 1924 season was the defeat of the University of Alabama, 17-0. On that great Alabama team were such men as Johnnie Mack Brown, Probst, and "Pooley" Herbert.

In 1929, Ed Kubale, one of Centre's "greats" on the teams of 1921-24, was named Head Coach of the Colonels. During his ten-year stay he coached the Gold and White to fifty-one victories as against twenty-eight defeats and four ties.

Quinn Decker master-mined the Centre teams from 1939 until he enter the U.S. Army in 1942. That year marked the last season in which Centre competed in college athletics until 1946, when Coach "Swede" Anderson re-activated the Colonels.

Centre fans are dreaming of a white Christmas, when again the Prayin' Colonels will be operating with a prayer, and more.

### PRANKSTERS ACQUITTED BY COUNCIL

Nine Men Await Action Of Disciplinary Committee

Last Thursday night at 10:15 the Student Council arrived at their final recommendations on the "Goat Case" which had been turned over to them by action of the Faculty Discipline Committee. The recommendation of the Men's Council was complete exoneration. The actual substance of their recommendation is now in the hands of the Faculty Committee awaiting final action.

The Council meeting started at 7 o'clock and the accused men were called in for personal interviews, individually, starting at 8:45. Each man was questioned by the members and the accused men were given a chance to express their feelings. After the last man was examined, the Council deliberated for another hour before reaching their final decision of "no penalty." The final written draft was signed by the Council at 1:10 a.m.

Donald MacDonald, acting as spokesman for the Council's action, stated that the Council felt that in reaching its decision that "we have done the most just thing," and added that each member stands ready to defend the position taken. He also wanted it made clear that the Council in no way wishes their decision to be construed as a sanction of the recent Student Strike or of further such affairs as the goat episode. Mr. MacDonald said that "The Council would ordinarily be extremely critical of any men taking part in the breaking of school rules deliberately, and if we are allowed to deal with any future cases severe punishment will be inflicted."

The actual text of the Council's recommendation is as follows, and should be of great interest to every student:

Recommendation to the Faculty Discipline Committee from the Men's Student Council

Subject: The suspension of the students involved in the Hallowe'en incident at the Kentucky College for Women on October 31, 1947.

After a thorough investigation and careful consideration of all available facts relating to this case, we the members of the Men's Student Council rec-

ommend that the students be completely exonerated from any penalty. This decision was arrived at for the following reasons:

- I. The Student Body was not notified by the faculty that there was any change of policy regarding the perpetuation of the tradition of entering the K.C.W. dormitories and depositing a goat on Hallowe'en.
  - A. The following is quoted from the Centre College Student's Handbook under "Traditions" "By this time the Freshmen have been indoctrinated' by the 'C' Club, which is in charge of the Freshman program. At Hallowe'en it has been rumored that a certain four-legged animal, and even some two-legged animals, have been seen running down the halls of K.C.W."
  - B. The 1946-47 Centre Annual gave a complete page to the 1946 Hallowe'en incident of that year.
- II. The Dean of Women admitted in the presence of Dr. Groves, the College Discipline Committee, and the Men's Student Council that she aided, or at least condoned, the entering of the K.C.W. dormitories on Hallowe'en, 1946, thereby continuing a precedent for future Hallowe'en incidents.

These facts clearly indicate that the entering of K.C.W. and the placing of a goat in the halls on Hallowe'en is considered traditional.

Our recommendation is based purely upon the above facts.

We do, however, take exception to the following: (1) The men were accused, tried and convicted without their being called to defend themselves; (2) The quotation from Dean Davis' letter to the parents of the accused men, "Enclosed is a copy of the action taken by the Faculty Committee on Student Discipline regarding the action of your son in direct contradiction of the authority of the college and the desire of the Student Council." The Student Council was not consulted, had no voice in the original decision, and was not originally aware of the decision of the administration to change policy in this matter.

It is our sincere belief that this decision will best serve the interest of the College.

### STUDENT STRIKE STALLS STUDIES

For some three hours last Tuesday morning the wheels of educational progress at Old Centre were at a standstill. Virtually the whole male student body picketed the classrooms on the men's campus, protesting the suspension of ten boys by the Faculty Disciplinary Committee.

The suspensions came as a result of a traditional Hallowe'en prank, the placing of a goat in the West Hall lounge at K.C.W.

The first demonstrations began at eight o'clock, when students arriving for first-hour classes were handed printed leaflets urging them not to attend their classes. Later, the male student body met in the chapel at Old Main and voted unanimously for complete exoneration of the men suspended and trial of future offenders of the discipline code by the Student Council or indefinite continuation of the walk-out. This decision rendered ineffective a compromise measure decided upon the night before the strike by Dean Davis and the Student Council.

The strike continued with 100% cooperation while negotiations between the Student Council, Dr. Groves and the Disciplinary Committee were in progress. The conference was hurried because of an eleven o'clock deadline set by the students for an answer to their demands.

At a second meeting of the student body, Donald MacDonald, president of the Men's Student Council, presented the decision of the Disciplinary Committee as follows: Re-instatement of the suspended students, reference of the offenders to the Student Council for trial, and remission of the Council's decision to the faculty Disciplinary Committee for approval.

These measures were accepted by the student body by a strong majority vote and the strike was terminated.

This was the second strike in Centre College's history, the first occurring in 1933 when the students walked out in protest of the dismissal of two faculty members.

The strike received nation-wide atten-

The strike received nation-wide attention as news of the classroom boycott was flashed out over Associated Press wires throughout the country.






