








Verdi Congress







The RAC


The Father



The Effects Of Gamma Rays On Man-In-The-Moon Marigolds






Three One-Acts


Frankenstein


















Carnival










Greek Day




Football




Cross Country

The team finished the season with a 3-6-2 record. Outstanding players included Tad Linder who won the Offensive Award and


Willie Johnson who won the Midfield Award.

next year.






















Swimming








Men's Track


Basketball





The Colonels posted a 16-9 overall record, the best percentage since 1920.






Women's Basketball


Baseball

The 1978 Centre baseball team climaxed their 12-13 season by winning a share of the CAC championship, their third in a row.


















Softball


Men's Tennis










Women's Tennis














Social Board
















Association Of Centre Women









Interfraternity Council



















Sigma Alpha Epsilon












Currents In Student Thought: Ripples





A Well Or Waves In For most of us, coming to Centre means much more than just seeking a good education. Because our community is small, we are given greater Freedom to discover and express our individuality. We shy away from conformity, yet we strive for a sense of community. 


Well, not quite — we are afforded some "luxuries", like maid service (which consists mostly of having your trash emptied) and, of course, we don't have to cook our own meals. However, we wait longer than if we should have to. We wait in line to get in and we wait in line to get served. What we are served has been prepared in a facility which is obviously inadequate. Murphy may be able to keep us from sneaking into the kitchen for evidence, but she can't relieve our stomachs.

As if the frequent stomach aches weren't enough, headaches also occasionally confront us. Restraining rules impinge upon our lifestyles. Some feel we are forced to conform to a certain code, irregardless of individual differences. Students expressed the need for improvements in the library, the residence buildings, food services and career counseling and advising.




























Education






Fine Arts

Dr. Somville directed a modern dance class which presented a magnificent program at the end of Spring term.




Religion

















History

sion.















Public Affairs







Psychology


English And Philosophy

Dr. Hazelrigg was on sabbatical winter term, while Roberta White and Milton Reigelman presented papers at the convention of scholars.


