


For the past several years, ACW has strived to serve as a unifying organization for Centre's women. ACW (the Association of Centre Women) sponsored campuswide activities for the college community and mixed scholastic with social interests in their projects. The Big Sister/Little Sister program, Octoberfest, Red Lite Revue, a Valentine's Dance, Spring Picnic, and Tutoring children at the Christian Children's Home kept members busy throughout the year. 
FALL INTRAMURALS


