DR. RICHARD I. RUSH
Dr. Richard Irwin Rush, '60 served as professor of chemistry and department head at Centre College from 1927. Dr. Rush pursued with distinction the ideal of a Christian scholar-teacher. He was highly competent and respected in his own field, active in research, and a dedicated teacher.

His 34 years of service to Centre was the longest of any member of the present Centre faculty. He was chairman of the Centre faculty research grant committee and had served as chairman of the school's scholarship committee. In 1954, he was voted by Centre students as "the most popular professor."

A Dr. Richard I. Rush Memorial Scholarship Fund has been established at Centre. The fund will be used for a scholarship for a deserving chemistry student.


PROFESSOR DWIGHT STEERE
For over fifteen years, Mr. Dwight Steere served as the chairman of Centre's department of music. An accomplished musician, he set and achieved high standards of performance for himself and for his students. But his concern for the college extended far beyond his own teaching responsibilities. He was a broadly educated man, deeply interested in every measure which promised to enhance the effectiveness of the college.

Under Prof. Steere's direction Centre choirs gained prominence through annual concert tours into many states. He was the author of two books dealing with music for Protestant worship. He was also organist and choir director at the First Presbyterian Church, Danville, and president of the recently established Danville Community Orchestra.


DR. EARLAND RITCHIE
During his fifteen years at Centre, Dr. Earland Ritchie demonstrated a genuine devotion to his duties as a teacher and a deep concern for the intellectual growth of the young people whom he taught and counseled.

While he spent most of his career as a college teacher, Dr. Ritchie took an active part in the movement to improve the quality of instruction in the sciences in the elementary and secondary schools. He will be remembered particularly as an earnest Christian and active churchman.
