One of the major events on the calendar for the Black Student Union was a trip to the Martin Luther King Jr. Memorial.

The Black Student Union of Centre College was organized in 1966 and has developed over the years a threefold purpose. Its first major objective is to provide social and financial support programs for black students enrolled at Centre. Social support programs involve activities such as meeting monthly to discuss student concerns, planning activities together, and participating in activities with black student unions on other campuses. By informing its members of scholarship and summer opportunities for minority students, information which otherwise would not be made available, this network of financial support aids in the retention of some students who have financial difficulty. This objective realizes the necessity for such support programs to help enrolled students make the transition into the Centre community.
The second major objective of the organization is to assist in the recruitment of more minorities at Centre. The organization believes that true education and empowerment cannot take place in an isolated environment and realizes the importance of multiple perspectives in educational pursuits. By actively participating in recruitment at targeted schools and college fairs, it hopes to help increase minority enrollment. One of its recent undertakings is to organize the Black Student Union Alumni Association to assist with recruiting and establish a regional, if not nationwide, network of black and white alumni who are willing and able to assist in this effort. College support of such efforts increase the likelihood of their success.
The final objective of the Black Student Union serves its educational purpose as a functioning student organization of the college. Membership within the group is not exclusive to blacks and other students' ideas and membership will only help in the effort to work together. By presenting campus-wide programs which seek to promote better race relations, the entire campus benefits from such programs on Black History, Brotherhood-Sisterhood, and other contemporary topics of importance. Many of the activities are funded by Student Congress and sponsored in conjunction with other student organizations. Securing speakers, films, documentaries, and other media are used to encourage discussion about many relevant concerns and their relation to individuals, the college community, and the nation.

With that victory, the team clinched their first CAC title since 1985 and despite the fact they were excluded from the playoffs, they found great solace in watching the Rhodes' players cry.
Jeff Bezold was named first-team All-American and the CAC defensive player of the year. Other players named to the Conference team included Mark Brown, Gary Fields, Mike Clevenger, Keith Tarter, Mike Goodyear, Kenny Klusman and Jeff Allen. With the leadership of four seniors, Teri Hartlage, Sheila Lloyd, Michelle Vaugh, and Susan Yates, the Lady Colonels overcame several early-season obstacles in order to return to championship tournament play for the second consecutive year,

Under the guidance of first year coaches Cindy NobleHauserman and Bob Rhodes, the ladies ended their season with an impressive $22-8$ record. Key wins included defeats over Campbellsville, Rhodes, Maryville, (3 times), Marymount, and Concordia.

The Lady Colonels beat Maryville College 59-56, consequently winning the Women's Intercollegiate Athletic Conference tournament title. They then went on to beat Marymount by 15 points and Maryville $73-63$, to earn a quarter final berth. With an impressive win over Concorida, Centre advanced to the 1990 NCAA Division III Final Tour Tournament.
