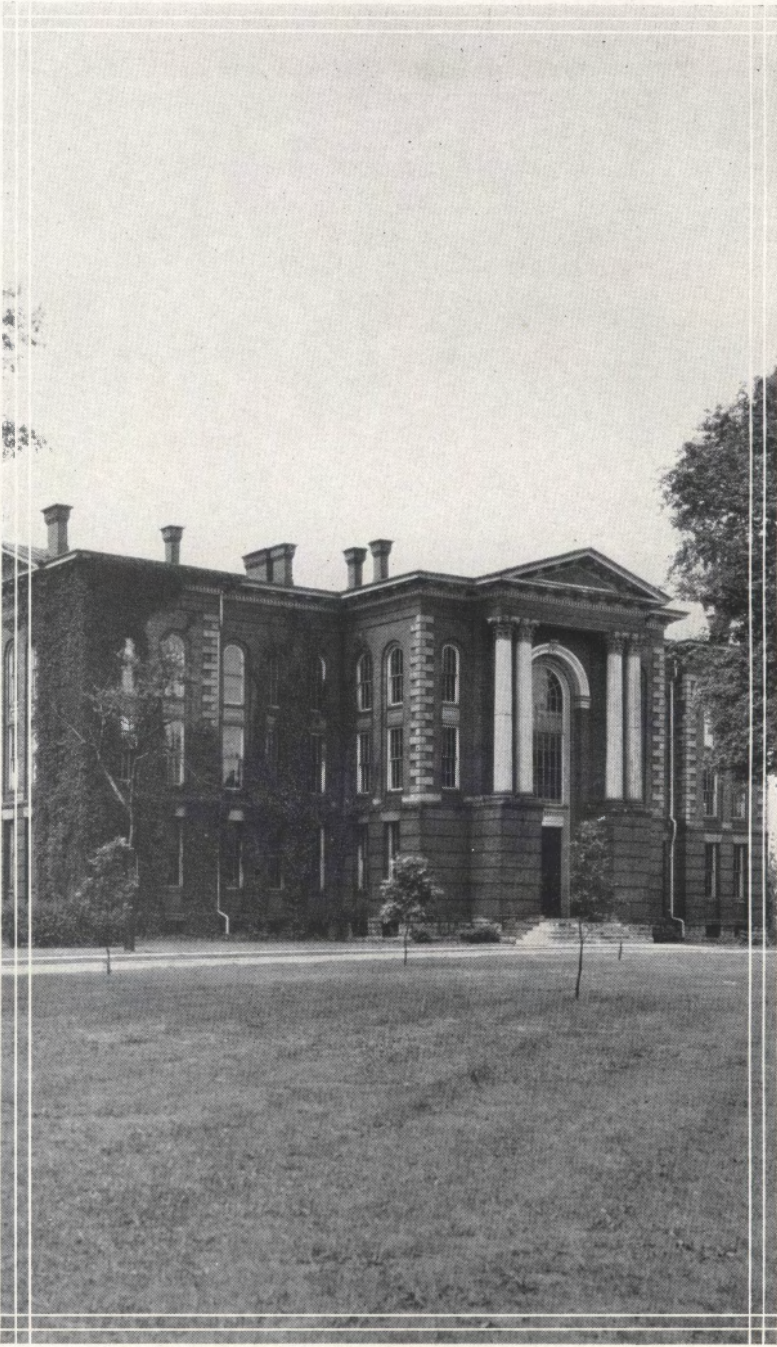
AERIAL VIEW OF CENTRE CAMPUS
Looking North from 2000 feet





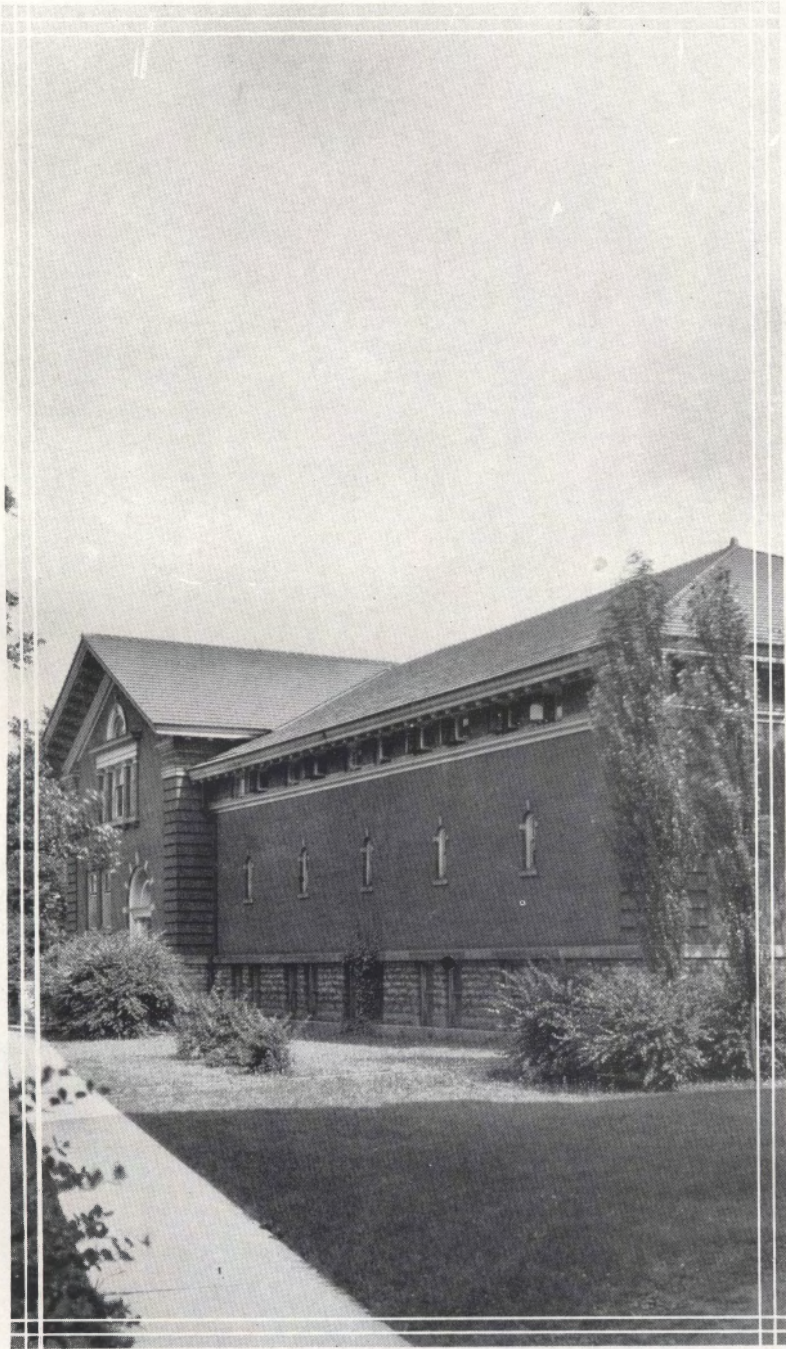
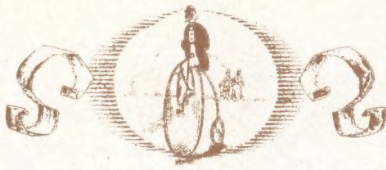

CENTRE 7 MURRAY TEACHERS 0

A new comer to Centre's schedule opened the local season when the Murray State Teachers knuckled down in front of the Colonels in the latters' campaign blow-off. Head-man Carlisle Cutchins fetched across the state a right squad of footballers to meet Ku's crippled eleven, and were subdued only after a torrid sixty minutes of play.

The Cononels were crippled by the absence of Dal Long and Vivian Nemecek, and had the use of Elmer Hendren for only a few minutes. Those few minutes were a plenty, however, as little "Scooter" provided the pay-off margin by a thirty-yard flip to Boots Kottler who went on a personally conducted tour for the other twenty and a touchdown. Charlie Barksdale nudged one through the goal posts for the point-after.

In the fourth quarter the Colonels were called upon to do a stalwart piece of goal-line defending. The Teachers held the ball on the one-yard line with first down, but their chance was lost after four pokes at the line that totaled exactly nothing.

CENTRE 0 XAVIER 7

The handicap of trying to play a first-rate football team sans the services of a consistent punter was amply illustrated when the Colonels went down before the Xavier Musketeers at Corcoran Field, Cincinnati, by a score of 7-0, principally on the strength of three blocked punts and a less-than-thirty-yard average on the other boots. Vivian Nemecek, Long, and Hendren were still casualties, and there lay the difference.

The final canto was the thrill-producer in that it was the one in which the Musketeers won the game by an off-tackle smash on the part of Hall McPhail, and also it was in this period that the Colonels brought the parishoners to their feet by a pass and run that was good for 93 yards only to have their efforts nullified by an officials' congress that returned a verdict of null and void on the strength of circumstantial evidence that Charlie Barksdale had grounded a knee just after taking Kottler's pass. When the returns had come in from all precincts, there seemed to be some dissension with the jury's findings, but as they pay off on the referee's judgment in most cases, history remains as written.

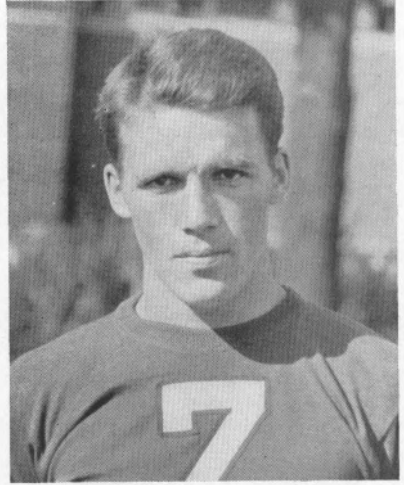
CENTRE 21 TRANSYLVANIA 7

Preparatory to their calling on the Eastern trade, the Colonels took advantage of several brief but sufficiently lucid moments to subdue the recalcitrant Pioneers from Transylvania by a tally of 21-7. they got what they went after, and that's all Roosevelt did.

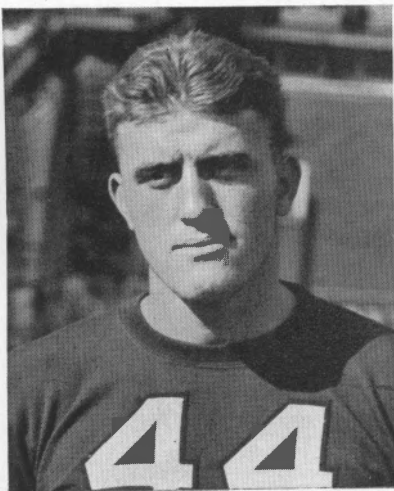

He transacted one piece of business himself and turned the rest over to Dal Long and Buddy Eline. Smilin' Charlie Barksdale added the three points bonus by bunting them over the bar from placement.

Transy's mark came when Endman Schwalm cradled a rolling blocked punt and scampered down the sidelines for forty-two yards and a tally. Transy, however, could chalk up but a single first down to the Colonel's ten, gaining eighteen yards as compared with Centre's 206.

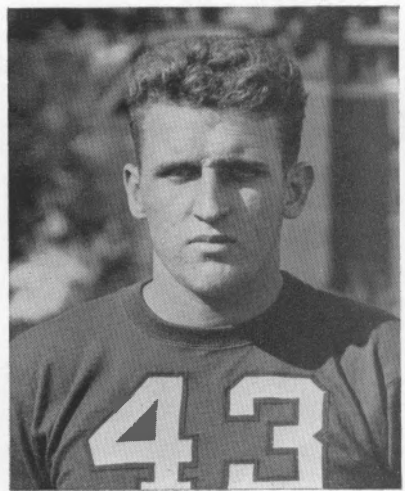
CENTRE 0 BOSTON 6

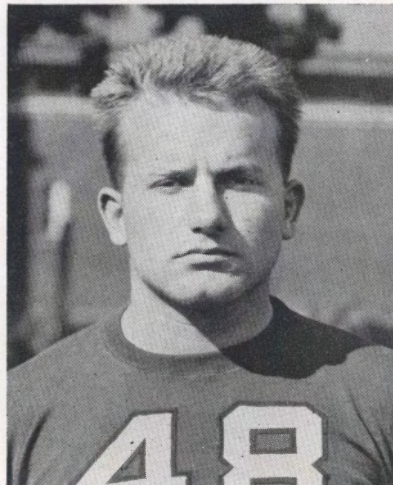


GROUCHO MARKS—Center

DAL LONG—Tackle

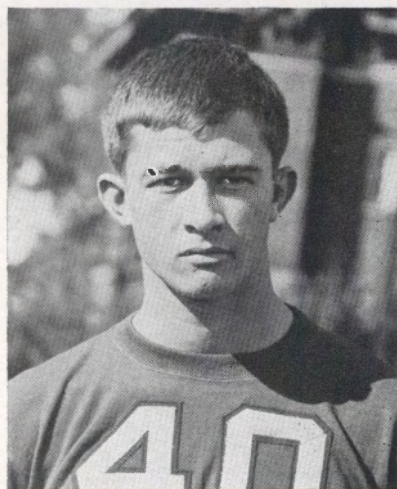

Late in the final chapter Johnny Freitas, the quarterbacking gentleman who slipped the arithmetic to his cohorts in the most secretive of manners, gathered in a sixty yard punt from the toe of Vivian Nemecek, wandered aimlessly from side to side on the field, and then scampered sixty-five yards to the Colonels pay-off stripe.

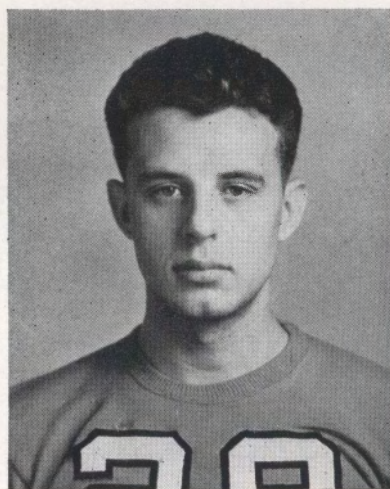
CENTRE 2 BIRMINGHAM-SOUTHERN 0

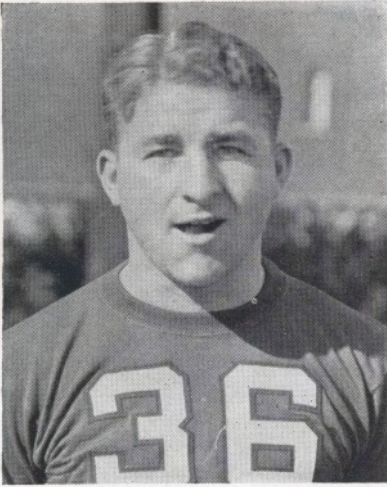

VIVIAN NEMECEK—Halfback

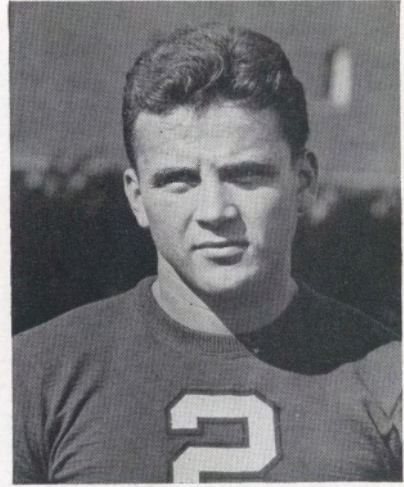

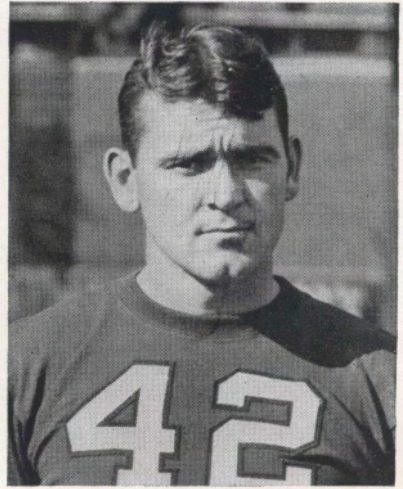

CENTRE 13 JOHN CARROLL 7

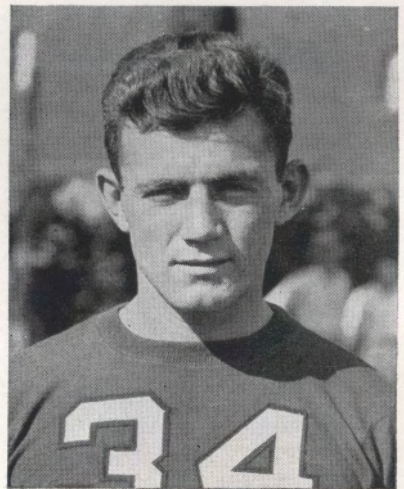

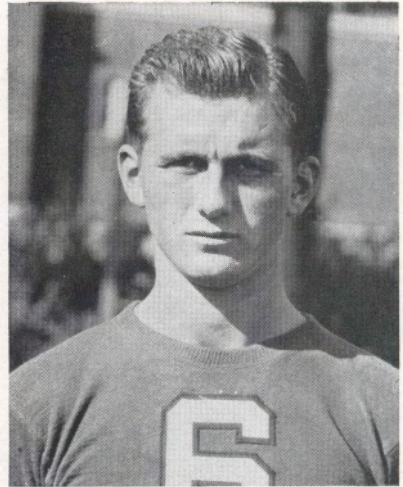


BUCK MOODY—Halfback

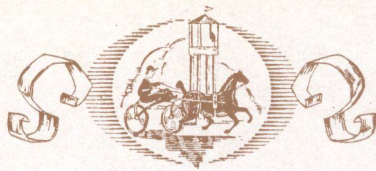

During the fiscal football year 1932, the Centre Colonels went to bat exactly nine times, registering six wins, and dropping three contests. In doing this, they met some of the best sectional opposition there was to be had; Mercer, from over Georgia way; Boston College, from the land of the Cape and the cod; Birmingham-Southern, one of Alabam's better elevens; Xavier, the very tough Irish of Cincinnati; John Carroll, from the Lake Erie breakwater; and the Chattanooga Mocassins from just around the Bend. These, coupled with several very deep "breathers" made up the Centre roster of opponents—a very tough list, indeed. The Colonels record is not one to be snickered at, but ladies and gents, take a look at the '33 lineup!

The season opens October 6th with Transy as our charming adversus, and then, beginning October 12th the Gold and White shirted boys will cross the paths of Boston College, Furman University, Xavier, Pittsburgh, Birmingham-Southern, Washington and Lee, Georgetown, and Chattanooga. Maybe that sounds easy when you say it quick—and perhaps Mr. Pacific's Ocean would make a good golf course, too.

The quality of the competition for 1933 needs no enlarging upon, so lets look at the Colonels for that period.

Left from the wars of '32 are "Bull" Edwards, Barksdale, Long, Hendren, Hamilton, Converse, Boyd, Anderson, Lancaster, Eline, Nemecek, Moody, Snyder, Cassity Meade, Hollis Edwards, Henn, Meadors, Giles, Stigall, Downes and Marks. The Lieutenants' only reverse of the season was at the hands of the University of Louisville freshman eleven, and was "one of them things." The Centre crew was clearly the superior of their rivals, but couldn't untrack themselves long enough to do any more business at the payoff post than one touchdown, which was not quite enough—the margin of victory being 7-6.

In the tie game, with Western Normal Frosh, the Looies really showed what a powerhouse they had. With the tally reading 19-6, the locals on the Republican end of that count, and but seven short minutes to go, the Looies took the ball away from their adversaries and proceeded to smash two touchdowns over and tie up the ball game. The first came as a result of a blocked punt on the part of Mons. "King Bee" Bartlett, and the final was under the personal direction of "Red" Kennedy, the skeeter from Louisville who did a beaucoup job of work at the quarter post for the Looies.

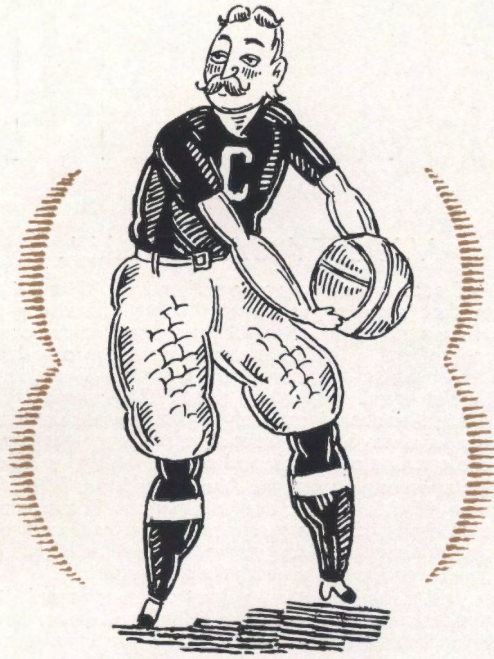
For the rest of their competition, the budding Colonels slapped Georgetown's first year team around by a score of 34-0; and showed but slightly less respect for Eastern's Baby Maroons. Transy's Pioneer Boy Scouts had gotten so used to pushing their Varsity around that the Looies took the full sixty minutes to convince them by seven points.

Some especially likely looking prospects graduated to the Varsity ranks to help "Ku" and his veterans through their schedule for 1933. In the line there were Asher, Kidd, Gore, Ramsier, Kitchen, Branham, Ensminger, and Goodrich who served notice that they would make someone hard to catch this fall, while Kennedy, Sullivan, and Bartlett did plenty of backfielding and don't intend to stop. Some first stringers will come from these men, while the rest will furnish Kubale with the reserve strength that he will need.

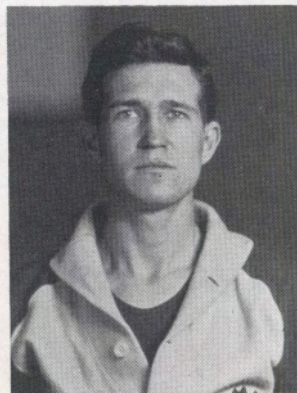

The Centre basketball season was, to use a rather indefinite but very apt phrase, one of them things. The men that reported to Coach "Mutt" Nemecek in mid-December gave indications of being as fine a group of cage artists as had represented the Gold and White for several unpaid dividend periods. There were several men who had played together in high school, and others who had been steady, consistent players. There were but two letter-men; Tommy Jones, flashy little pint-sized forward on the 1932 five, and captain of this years quint, and Worley Hawthorne, high-pocketed man-of-all-work who had burned up the scholastic courts as a member of the Kavanaugh High School team four years ago. Hawthorne, however, was not available until the opening of the second semester because of scholastic difficulties.

The first contest was a warm-up with the Alumni and the Colonels, with but five days of practice, dropped the game 46-36. After the holidays the Colonels swung into their regular schedule, and proceeded to drop six more games with a regularity that was amazing and unexplainable. Xavier, Berea, Wesleyan, Georgetown, Transy, and Louisville all polished off the Colonels, always by narrow margins, but nevertheless, they won.

Then the Colonels went to Barbourville to meet what appeared at that time to be one of the toughest teams in the state in Union College's five, and upset the dope by playing forty-minutes of fighting, clawing basketball that won them their first game, 40-36. It looked as though the boys had at last found themselves, for the Berea Mountaineers came to Danville to be filed in the same drawer 31-30.

The second semester opened and brought Evans and Hawthorne to the squad to take the places of several who were dropped because of grades and discipline. The first game this new

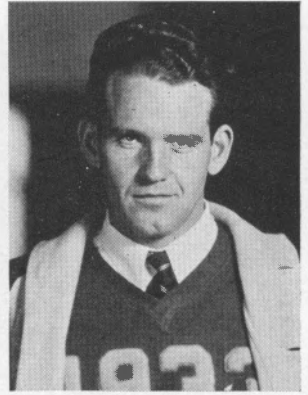

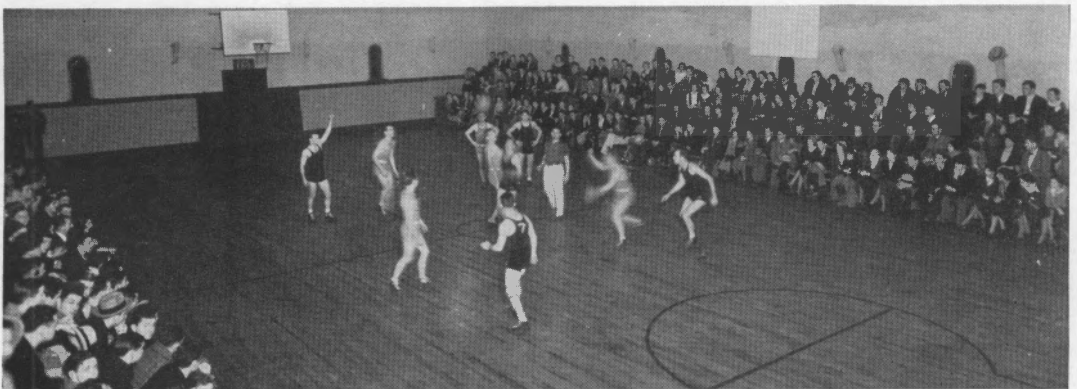
five played was lost in an overtime period Wesleyan, 34-31. This was quickly followed by defeats at the hands of Louisville, Transy, Union, and Georgetown in the state race, and by the University of Chattanooga in the Dixie Conference tournament at Chattanooga.

The state tournament at Winchester found the Colonels facing the dreaded Murray Thorobreds in their first-round game, and the wise money rode with the Thorobreds to take the game going away by any number of points they wished.

Moral victories just "ain't", but as close an approach to such a thing as is possible was gained by a scrappy, fighting bunch of Colonels who battled the Murray five to a fair-thee-well only to lose in the last minute and a half, 34-31. The lead in the battle changed hands nine times, and the score was tied five times. It was in this game that the new five first worked as a team, and they were the talk of the tournament because of their neryv stand, many people insisting that the Gold and White boys were the better five on the floor.

Especially encouraging was the development of several of the boys who will again be available next year. Clell Coleman, Joe Pat Ireland, and Farmer Downes, by their work after the reorganization of the team, showed that Centre can rely upon three hustlers next year, at least. Country Evans, after a long lay-off, finally came into case in the closing games of the season and will be a real threat on the floor next year. Worley Hawthorne, after two years of in-and-out work, finally untracked himself, and, in the Murray game, played the kind of basketball he is capable of and should cause more than one headache next year. Little Tommy Jones, always steady and dependable, will be back, and with the sure-to-improve teamwork, will ring the hoop a-plenty. Freckles Hamilton should again be in there somewhere with his grand floor-work and his "Carr Creek" shots. Groucho Marks and Carter were coming along fast as the season closed and may find places for themselves in the lineup.

VARSITY BASKETBALL GAME BY FLASHLIGHT

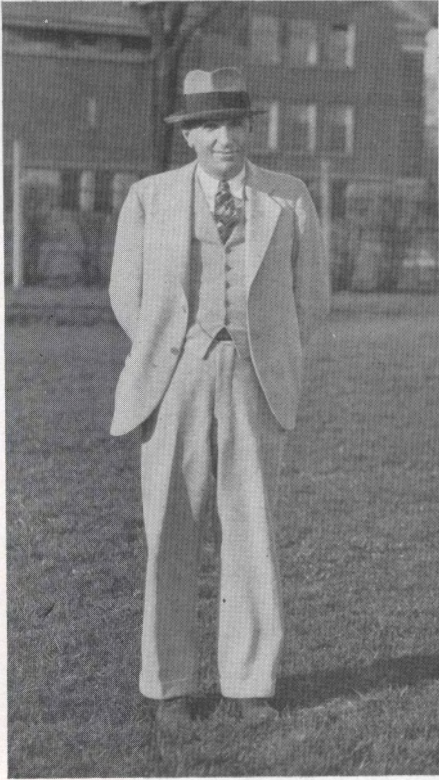




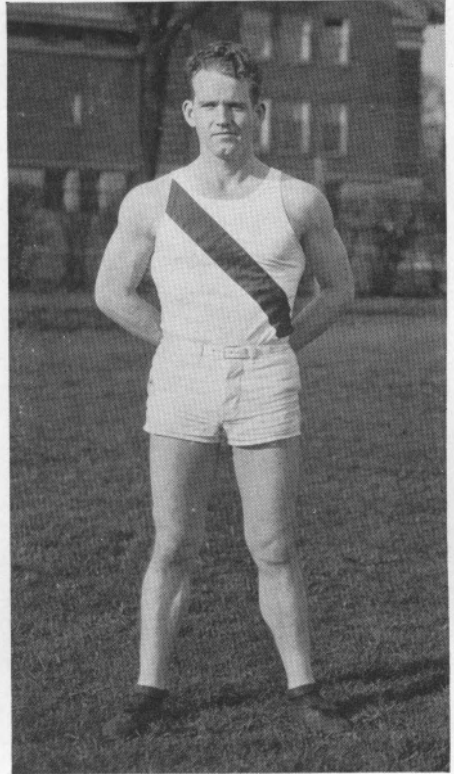

The Colonels opened against Vanderbilt at Nashville and went down by a score of 60-30. Centre gave the Commodores plenty of competition in several events, however, as Andy Hasara broke the tape in the 100-yd. dash and won the broad jump, while "Lefty" Arnicar took both the shot and discus.

The Colonels' next meet was with Berea, but was cancelled when disaster overtook the Gold and White team enroute. Dal Long suffered a broken leg in a rear-end collision, and was out for the rest of the season.

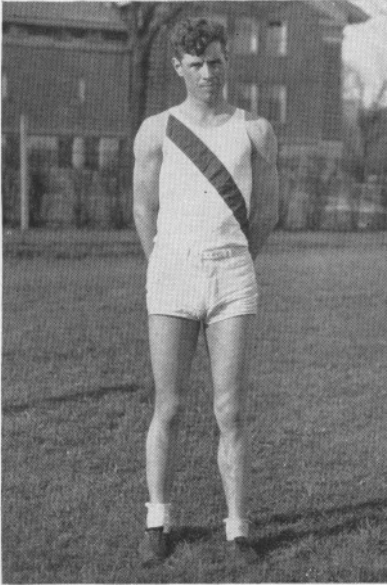
Following this, the Colonels met Georgetown, and won the meet easily. Their next meet, with Louisville, they dropped by a close margin.

The season's finale, the state meet, held at Centre, was a thriller from start to finish with three teams fighting for the first place. Louisville was slowly pushed back, and it was not until the final event that the winner was decided when Berea wound up with 51½ points to Centre's 51. Centre's veterans again came through to roll up a large point total, Hasara taking the hundred and broad-jump, and Arnicar the shot and discus. The Colonels swept all places in both these weight events.

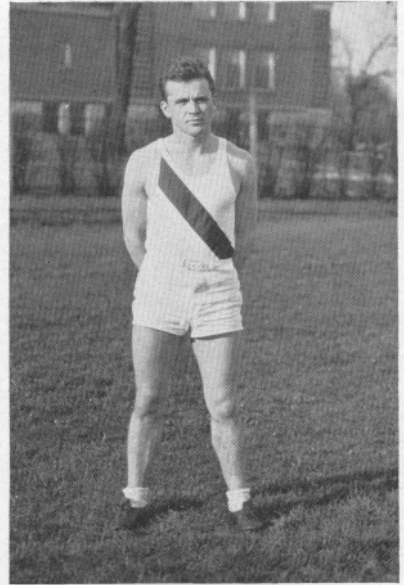

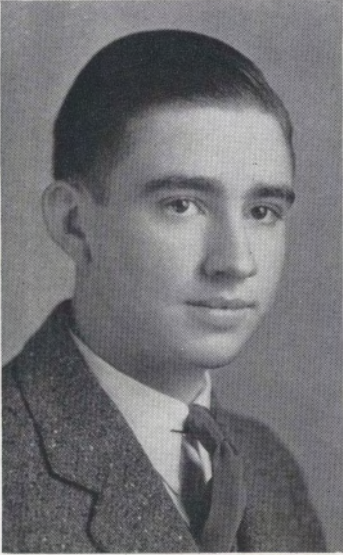
Other meets on the Colonel card for the rest of the year are Berea, Maryville, Louisville and Georgetown, and the state meet.

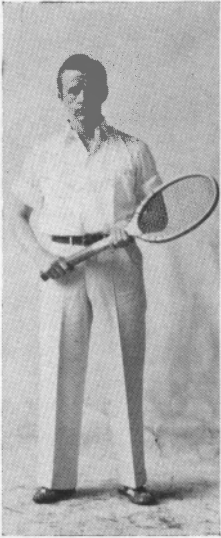

Cress Lynn rendered good service to the team until he was forced out of competition by a trick knee that folded up under him early in the season.

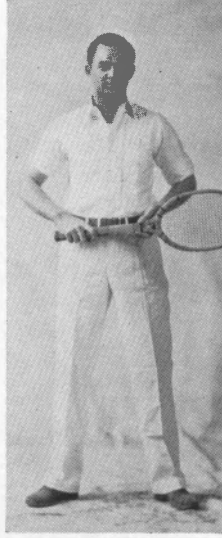
The Colonels, for the first time in many years, were undefeated in the state.

W. for all the material we had to have from there. But she got it for us, and on time, too—something practically unprecedented on the part of an assistant. So, youse guys and youse gals, here it is—maybe good, maybe not so good, but good or bad, our best. It's a departure from custom; far enough, we hope, to prove entertaining now and again, and yet not too far to spoil its effectiveness. It's yours—we hope you like it . . .

1924 the organization was taken over by Prof. Jack Sterrett of the English Department who has, but for a single year while on leave from his duties at Centre, had charge of the club and its productions.

It is one of the most popular organizations on the campus, and competition for membership and roles in its productions is most keen. The name was changed in 1930 to The Centre College Players. In this year it competed with many other collegiate dramatic organizations in a contest staged at Northwestern University.

The club has been well managed, is self-supporting, and has a distinct asset in its complete stage and lighting system in the Woman's Department auditorium. This stage and its many features was designed and paid for by the club. The lighting system is equal to that of many metropolitan theatres, and is the product of much research and work on the part of Charles Thurmond, '32.

The Players have set a high standard in their productions, doing such works as Shakespere's "Comedy of Errors," "The Show-Off," "The Importance of Being Earnest," and "The Swan." Several of their productions have been taken to other towns and have been enthusiastically received.

HOCKEY

Hockey was the sport that started the annual vieing between the Colonelettes and the Gym Dandies last fall. The call was issued for hockey squads soon after school opened, and there was a hearty response from both sides.

The first game was held on October 27, after several weeks of practice, and the Colonelettes came off the field victorious only after a hard fought game ended 4-3 in their favor. The second contest in the series was played on November 3rd, also ending in a victory for the Colonelettes, the score being 3-2.

The Gym Dandies seemed to find themselves after this and came back with a drive their opponents could not stop, taking the last three games and thus winning the series. Their first victory was an easy one, the score being 7-3; their second was another of those close affairs, ending with a 4-3 count; while the fifth and deciding game went to the Gym Dandies 5-1, the game-fighting Colonelettes being swept before their faster rivals. This game, played December 1st, gave the hockey championship of the school to the Gym Dandies.

Both sides will suffer from the loss of several seniors, among whom are Leo and Jeanette Adams, Elizabeth Cheek, Levada Smith, and Elizabeth Johnson. Leo Adams was high point scorer and an outstanding Gym Dandy player.

The other two leading fall sports also ended in victories for the Gym Dandies when that team took both the tennis and swimming titles. The fall tennis tournament was held in the latter part of October under the direction of the two tennis captains, Mary Coleman and Evelyn Marcum. The tournament, as a whole, was an exciting one and resulted in several upsets. The biggest surprise came when Jeanette Adams defeated Mary Coleman in the third round. Another upset came when Jane Jeffries defeated Jeanette Adams. Miss Jeffries in turn was beaten by Leo Adams in the finals. Miss Adams displayed some excellent form throughout the tournament, plainly outclassing her opponents all the way through the brackets.

The swimming meet was held under the direction of Jeanette Adams, Gym Dandy captain and Ellen Van Winkle, Colonelette leader, in the latter part of October. The Gym Dandies again proved a little too strong for their rivals.

Mary Nelson, a freshman, carried off the honors of the meet, while Jeanette Adams and Evelyn Marcum took second and third places. The latter two are seniors. The meet included events in diving, strokes for form, races, and stunts.

The Colonelette basketball squad maintained its record of three years' standing, again annexing the cage title in the series between the two teams by winning three of the five contests.

Practice for basketball began the first of December when about thirty girls answered the call. A few weeks later the squad was cut down to twelve for each team and intensive drill began.

The first game was held on January 20 when the Colonelettes dropped the Gym Dandy by a score of 24-18. The latter turned in the next game, however, and drubbed their rivals by an even grater margin, winning 27-15. The Colonelettes came back to win the title in the next two games, both by good margins, while the Gym Dandies took the finale, played on March 6th, by a tally of 28-27 in what was by far the fastest and most interesting set-to between the two teams.

Both teams will suffer next year from the loss of several star players in the senior class. The Gym Dandies will lose the services of Leo and Jeanette Adams, Harrison Holloway, and Mary Coleman from their first team; while the Colonelettes lose Elizabeth Johnson, Gertrude Buck, and Elizabeth McIntyre. All of these girls except Mary Coleman have been active members of their teams for four years.

Jane Ross was captain of the Colonelette basketeers for this season, while the Gym Dandies were led by Leo Adams. Miss Keep, athletic director, coached both teams.

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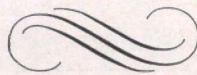
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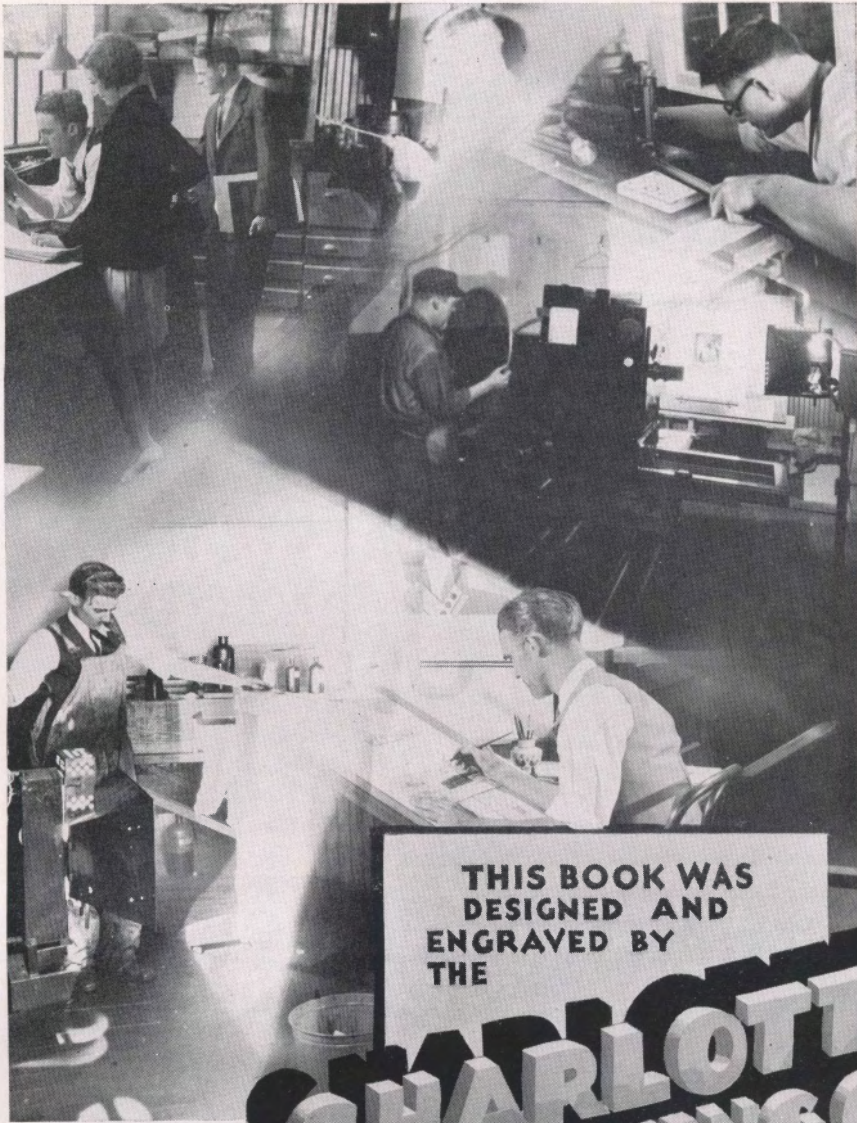
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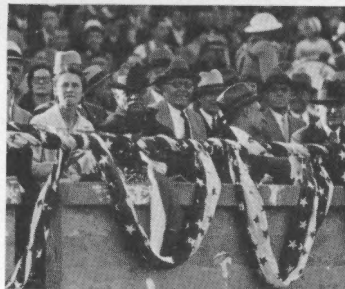
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The little bootblack viewed the three pennies he had just received for shining the shoes of the elegantly dressed man.
